PRESBYTERIAN SOCIETY PRESENTS BOOK REVIEW BY DR. JAMES MILLAR

An event which is being anticipated by the people of this community is the "coffee" on the morning of January 10th at which Dr. James Millar will give another of the book reviews in the series sponsored by the Women's Society of the First Presbyterian Church. The coffee hour will be at 10 a.m. followed by the review from 10:30 to 11:30 in the social hall of the Christian education building of the church.

During the course of his travels Dr. Millar met Sir Flinders Petrie whose book "Seventy Years in Archaeology" he has chosen for this second review. He cites Sir Flinders as an outstanding example of a self-educated man whose native ability and perseverance enabled him to make such outstanding accomplishments that he was knighted by the British government. Flinders Petrie will be remembered for his work in archaeology in Egypt.

Dr. Millar's ability as a speaker is known to virtually everyone in this part of the country where heavy demands have been made on his time for speaking engagements by schools, churches, civic organizations and fraternal groups since his coming to Roseburg a little over a year ago as pastor of the First Presbyterian Church. Dr. Millar is also known nationally for his lecturing under the Good Citizenship Foundation which takes him to schools and universities throughout the United States.

The Women's Society feels most fortunate to present Dr. Millar in this series of three book reviews. The proceeds will be used for purposes of benevolence and Christian education.

Patterson Cuts Vacation; Says Too Much Work

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Paul L. Patterson, who had expected to take a few days off before the Legislature meets next Monday, showed up for work unexpectedly this week.

"I'm supposed to be in Palm Springs, Calif., right now, but I had to change my plans in order to get my message to the Legislature written," the governor said.

He added there is so much material to put in his message that it's now a problem to decide what to eliminate.

The Legislature meets at 10 a.m. next Monday. Governor Patterson will be sworn in for his new four-year term at 2 p.m. that same day, and then will deliver his message.

His budget, for the two years beginning next July 1, will be announced at noon next Saturday.

This budget will show a deficit. In his message he will suggest means of relieving the deficit.

Four Persons Rescued As Plane Crashes At Sea

HONOLULU (AP) — A twin-engine Cessna charter plane crashed at sea five miles west of Molokai Island Monday night and within an hour four of its five occupants had been rescued.

The Coast Guard said there was no sign of the fifth.

The plane was flying from Molokai to Honolulu with pilot and four passengers when it apparently developed engine trouble. A Coast Guard plane dropped life rafts and an air force helicopter picked up the four survivors.

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Douglas County In Sixth Place Population-Wise

Douglas County, one of the fastest growing in Oregon, now has the sixth largest population of all subdivisions in the state, State Board of Health estimates reveal.

The county has gained about 13,500 persons in the half-decade since the 1950 federal census, bringing its population to slightly more than 68,000.

The estimate of state and county population was made on vital statistics and migration checks, board statisticians said. Accuracy of past board estimates has shown error of less than 2 per cent in 1950 in comparing totals of the federal census and state estimates.

Since 1950, Douglas has passed Jackson County, population-wise. Douglas had a total of 54,549 in 1950, while Jackson had 38,510. The Jackson population now is estimated at 64,500 on the basis of a 10.6 per cent increase. Douglas increase amounted to 24.8 per cent.

The local county now is on the heels of Washington County, which is in fifth place in the state. In 1950, Washington was peopled by 61,269. In the past five years, it has increased 19.4 per cent to 73,600.

At the same time, Douglas pulled away from Linn, which had 54,317 in 1950, only 23.3 less than Douglas. Linn increased 10.6 per cent to 60,000.

Other southwestern Oregon counties registered these approximate gains:

Coos: 42,265 population in 1950, 25.3 per cent increase, now 54,500.

Curry: 6,048 population in 1950, 57.6 per cent increase, now 9,500.

Josephine: 26,542 population in 1950, 11.8 per cent increase, now 29,500.

Lane: 125,776 population in 1950, 15.8 per cent increase, now 146,000.

The state as a whole is said to have gained nearly 10 per cent from 1,521,341 in 1950 to 1,662,680 in the board estimate.

Right-To-Work Legislation Heads Lawmakers' Slate

The back-to-work season opened this week for state legislatures with many of them headed for consideration of "right-to-work" bills.

So-called "right-to-work" laws already are on the books of 17 states. Generally, they outlaw labor contract arrangements for a "union shop" or similar provisions requiring workers to join unions.

An Associated Press survey shows steps to enact such legislation are expected in at least nine states and moves to cancel or change such statutes are expected in at least five others.

Legislators met Monday in six states — California, Idaho, Louisiana, Montana, Ohio and Tennessee. They soon will get to work in 39 other states.

Scores of new faces will be seen in the capitols. The elections last fall touched off a broad political shakeup.

The lineup of governors was 29 Republicans, 19 Democrats. Now it's 27 Democrats, 21 Republicans.

There also is a fairly close balance between states where legislatures are dominated by one party or the other. And in five — Connecticut, Massachusetts, Montana, Pennsylvania and Washington — Democrats control one house and Republicans the other.
