

Harriman Splits With Rauh, Says Washington Newspaper

WASHINGTON — The Washington Post and Times Herald says Gov. Averell Harriman of New York and Joseph L. Rauh Jr., who was prominent in Harriman's effort to obtain the Democratic presidential nomination in 1952, "have parted political company in spectacular fashion."

The story says Harriman ordered Rauh out of his New York office in December and in the preceding exchange took a verbal crack at Adlai Stevenson, the 1952 nominee and the man Harriman publicly says he is backing for 1956.

In Albany, N. Y., Harriman declined comment on the report he and Rauh had "parted political company," but he denied that he had ordered Rauh from his office and described the newspaper account in general as "perfectly ridiculous."

Rauh, a Washington lawyer and leader in Americans for Democratic Action, ran Harriman's successful campaign in the 1952 District of Columbia presidential preference primary. He declined comment on the newspaper story, which gave this account of the reported Harriman-Rauh incident.

After the November election Sen. Lehman (D-Lib-NY) asked the governor-elect to speak at the annual

ADA banquet in New York in observance of the birthday of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Lehman and Harriman were co-chairmen for the January 1954 affair.

Harriman did not give Lehman a definite answer. Later he turned down a repeat invitation extended through Arthur Schlesinger Jr., another ADA leader.

Rauh then called at Harriman's office to discuss the bid further but Harriman said he did not want to hear any more about it.

The gist of what Rauh had to say was that the ADA only wanted in effect to honor Harriman, long an ADA contributor, and that Harriman's refusal to speak "might be misinterpreted."

At this Harriman shouted in anger that "I'm not running out on ADA the way your friend Adlai Stevenson did." There was no elaboration.

Taken aback by the remark which came without previous mention of the 1952 presidential nominee, Rauh still persisted in his argument that Harriman should make the address.

Harriman's response was to shout, "Get out." Rauh left.

Robber Suspect Killed In New York Holdup

NEW YORK — A robber suspect was shot and killed in an apparent holdup attempt Tuesday in a branch of the New York Trust Co. in the heart of Manhattan's garment district. A bank guard was wounded.

The shooting attracted thousands of passersby to the bank, at 7th Ave. and 39th St.

The suspect, brought down by gunfire from a former city policeman, was tentatively identified by police as Ellison Gaylord Grey, 29, a Negro, of Kansas City.

Marine Corporal One Of Children Asked By Soviet

NEW YORK — A 20-year-old U.S. Marine corporal is one of the 11 "children" whose custody has been asked by the Soviet Union.

Russia pledged last Friday to free two Americans—William T. Marchuk of Breckenridge, Pa., and John H. Noble of Detroit—and at the same time asked custody of 11 "Soviet" children. Eight of those sought are now in West Germany, two are in the United States and one is in the Marine Corps, probably in Japan.

Higher Prices Quoted For Second Growth Fir

CORVALLIS — Log buyers are paying about \$5 more per thousand board feet for second-growth sawlogs than they were at this time last year. Oregon State College said Tuesday in its regular forestry report.

Little change was reported in the past year in the prices of peeler logs or old-growth sawlogs. No. 2 second-growth Douglas fir sawlogs were quoted at \$36 to \$45 a thousand at Willamette Valley mills, \$35 to \$45 in Douglas County and \$38 to \$38 at Coos Bay.
