S. Korea Accuses North Of Building 40 New Air Bases
SEOUL — South Korea has accused the Communists of building more than 40 air bases and bringing in 110,000 new troops and 200 Russian-built tanks in violation of the armistice.
The charges were made by Gen. Lee Hyung Keun, chairman of the ROK joint chiefs of Staff, in a new year article published in the Korean Republic, English language newspaper.
Adm. Arthur Radford, chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, inspected the Korean front lines briefly Monday before leaving for Japan for further conferences on his tour of the Orient.
He told newsmen here Sunday atomic weapons would be used "if necessary" to repel any new aggression in Korea.
Gen. Lee charged in his article: "The enemy that is reeling at the time of the armistice has now regained its strength and is now able to launch another aggressive action."
He said that in addition to new troops and tanks, the Reds are filling their new air bases with more than 500 aircraft, about half jet fighters and half jet bombers.

Power Co. Says Public Group's Effort Is Sham
WASHINGTON — Idaho Power Co. has labeled a "sham and frivolous" a move by public power groups to dismiss its applications for power dams in the Hells Canyon area.
The company replied a motion filed with the Federal Power Commission by the National Hells Canyon Assn., which is opposing the firm's applications to build three dams in the Snake River between Idaho and Oregon, where a federal dam has been proposed.
The association asked the commission to reject the applications on grounds that recommendations of both the company and the agency's legal department "abandoned and departed from" original plans for the three dams.
Idaho Power said the motion was a mere repetition of motions previously made and denied during a year-long hearing on the applications.
The association, Idaho Power said, "again seeks to confuse the issue."
Referring to the association's complaint that revisions of some original plans are proposed by the company and commission lawyers, Idaho Power said "all of the matters referred to... are properly within the commission's regulatory and licensing jurisdiction and discretion... and are matters to be decided by the commission."
The commission is expected to rule on the association's motion soon, possibly Wednesday.

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PORT SAID — A long line of ships moved through the Suez Canal Tuesday after workmen cleared away the wreckage of a ship-bridge collision that blocked the strategic waterway four days.
A thick fog which Monday night halted resumption of navigation lifted early Tuesday morning, and 69 ships backed up here sailed southward through the canal. The ships included liners, freighters and tankers.
Another 34 ships waited to move northward from the Bitter Lakes, above the canal's southern entrance.
The canal was blocked last Friday when the Greek-owned tanker World Peace smashed into an arm of a swing bridge carrying a railroad across the waterway 50 miles south of Port Said. Workmen succeeded in cutting away the tanker from the bridge wreckage Monday and the vessel moved on.
