Artistic Lighting Important In Decoration

American women spent \$13,061,000,000 furnishing their homes during 1953, according to the U. S. Department of Commerce.

A tremendous amount of time and energy, as well as money, goes into the planning and makeup of American interiors. Yet, one of the most important of the design elements — proper lighting — remains shamefully neglected. "Light," Emerson said, "is the first of painters." And it is lighting that can "make" or "break" interiors.

With today's scientific know-how, light can be applied with the artistry of a painter's brush. It can form the same interior into quite different effects and moods and can flatter or detract from the appearance of people.

According to modern research the lighting job of the person decorating the home is threefold: How much light should there be? What color should it be? Where should it come from?

Light must not be so bright that the harsh reality of paint and fabric and makeup is exposed. Low lighting, on the other hand, calls up a sense of luxury, comfort and "glamour."

General light — that is, all-over, even lighting from ceiling fixtures — should be kept subdued. Brighter specific lighting should be concentrated on table tops, desk tops and other reading areas, on key elements in the decoration and architecture.

The wise homeowner does not employ the same degree of lighting for every occasion, activity and mood. This static approach was more or less a necessity with the old "on-off" switch. But, catching on in homes throughout the country now, is the principle of variable lighting available in a device known to the building and design trades as dimmers. Dimmers are inexpensive and one of the most useful lighting controls ever developed.

One dimmer on the market handles any number of lamps and lighting fixtures up to a load of 300 watts, and is operated merely

by turning a dial. By turning this dial, which is affixed to a face plate similar to that of the ordinary "on-off" switch, any degree of lighting is obtained, from complete darkness to full brightness. One — or, better, two — dimmers in a room will create almost endless variety in lighting effects. They will provide dramatic movement in light, which is ordinarily static. For years dimmers have been indispensable in the theater, with "all the world a stage," it is strange that they have only recently been established in the home.

Fitting in perfectly with this new, controlled lighting concept is the old undeniable truth that there exists no more pleasant nor more flattering table and ceiling illumination than candle light. The hazard of fire often prohibits the use of candle light; but simulated candle light in electricity is quite as good and can best be attained by use of a Luxtrol dimmer, turned down low.

What color?

Warm light — pink, ivory, amber, dim plain "white" incandescent (which is really very pale yellow, and the closest to candle light there is) — makes skin glow. It softens harsh color. It is friendly and inviting. But it should be used in tints and not in strong hues. Deep ambers and reds are garish.

Cool light (except lavender) is unflattering not only because of what it does to color but because it is unnatural. We are used to warm light from the sun and from fire and incandescent lamps. Direct cool light, pale or deep in hue, should be avoided. Green and blue distort all red hues, turns lips and purple-black.

Where should the light come from? The light most complimentary to human faces is usually light — shaded light — which strikes the features from a source at eye level or slightly below. High angles and extremely low angles of lighting, unrelieved by any other sources, produce grotesque facial shadows.

Interior Dept. Says Juneau Not To Be Stripped

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Interior Department has assured the Juneau Chamber of Commerce that neither it nor the Eisenhower administration "has any intention to strip Juneau of its role as capital of the territory of Alaska through a piecemeal or wholesale transfer of federal agencies."

Undersecretary Clarence A. Davis, writing in the absence of Secretary McKay, made the statement in a letter to Franz D. Nagel, President of the Chamber of Commerce. The department made the letter public this week.

Nagel had written President Eisenhower, McKay and William G. Strand, director of the Office of Territories, protesting the planned shift of Alaskan headquarters of some federal agencies from Juneau to other communities.

Davis told Nagel the changes now under way affecting Juneau offices of two Interior Department bureaus were based on recommendations of survey teams and a full consideration of "all relevant information available."

"In the case of Juneau," Davis said, "changes materially affecting agency headquarters of two of our bureaus are being implemented. In each instance, we thoroughly reviewed the consequences of such actions upon the operations of the bureau concerned and its responsibilities in Alaska. In neither case is the Juneau office being completely closed."

Davis did not identify the two bureaus but a department spokesman said they were the Bureau of Mines and the Bureau of Land Management.

Committee May Keep Eye Upon Coffee Situation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Fulbright (D-Ark.) said Wednesday he would have no objection to continuing a special banking subcommittee to keep an eye on coffee prices if the full committee desires.

The Arkansas will be chairman of the banking group in the new Congress. Sen. Capehart (R-Ind.), the retiring chairman, set up a special subcommittee to look into soaring coffee prices last year following a damaging freeze in Brazil, the largest producing country.

This subcommittee Tuesday announced a decision not to recommend that trading in coffee futures be put under regulation of the Commodity Exchange Authority.

This decision was reached by a split vote. Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.) dissented vigorously and said he would re-introduce this year a bill to put coffee trading under federal regulation. The Senate has twice passed such a measure, but the House has balked.

Sen. Beall (R-Md.), the subcommittee chairman, said the Banking Committee "is determined to exercise vigilance to insure that the price of coffee to United States consumers be determined by the factors of supply and demand in a free economy." He added the committee "will continue to observe developments with respect to this problem."
