

Two Democrats From Oregon Take Office Oath

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Oregon Democrats—something rare in that state's representation in Congress—take seats in the House and Senate Wednesday.

Swearing-in ceremonies were scheduled for Richard L. Neuberger in the Senate and Edith Green in the House as the 84th Congress convened. Both come from Portland.

Neuberger, a former state legislator and Northwest writer, unseated veteran Sen. Guy Cordon,

Hoover Suggests Traffic Offenders Make Resolution

WASHINGTON (AP) — FBI director J. Edgar Hoover suggested Wednesday that chronic traffic violators make a New Year resolution to help curb the continuing increase in serious crime by not monopolizing so much police time.

Hoover advanced his proposal in a signed editorial in the January issue of the bureau's "Law Enforcement Bulletin," distributed to law officers throughout the nation.

It followed release of a year-end report to Atty. Gen. Brownell in which the FBI chief said serious crimes climbed 5 per cent to a new record high in 1952. He said this occurred in the face of increased police efficiency.

The FBI report said that although homicides and auto thefts declined in 1952, "the past year will record a new high for the past 10 years in crimes of robbery, aggravated assault, rape, burglary and larceny," along with sharp increases in the looting of banks by raid or embezzlement, frauds against the government, and theft of government property.

But, the report asserted: "The nation can take pride in the progress being made in protecting civil rights. For the third successive year, there was an absence of lynching throughout the United States."

Hoover reported that internal security problems had increased with mounting underground activities by the Communist Party.

Program To Determine Standout Young Farmer

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — A new program to determine the nation's outstanding young farmers of 1953 will be initiated by U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce chapters and the American Petroleum Institute Committee on Agriculture, it was announced Wednesday.

The Jaycees said the country-wide search will be for farm operators between the ages of 21-35 who "have distinguished themselves through outstanding farming methods and contributions in the betterment of their communities."

National winners are scheduled to be named June 2-3.

Demo Senators Urge Building Hells Canyon Dam

WASHINGTON (AP) — Six Pacific Northwest senators Tuesday urged President Eisenhower to "recommend early authorization of the high federal Hells Canyon Dam" on the Snake River in his State of the Union message Thursday.

Sens. Murray (D-Mont), Morse (Ind-Ore), Magnuson (D-Wash), Jackson (D-Wash), Mansfield (D-Mont) and Sen-elect Neuberger (D-Ore) signed the letter sent to the White House.

In it, they asserted the "best interests of defense preparations and stimulation of the domestic economy would be served by prompt authorization and early start of the construction by the federal government of a high multipurpose dam at Hells Canyon. In terms of cheap electric power alone this project is the most urgently needed in the Columbia River Basin."

The Hells Canyon site has been the center of a long-standing dispute between public and private power groups. The privately owned Idaho Power Co. has applied to the Federal Power Commission for a permit to build three low level dams near the site.

Neuberger, slated to take office Wednesday, recently announced he and Morse would sponsor a bill to authorize the federal government to build a high dam there. Similar bills introduced in the last two sessions of Congress died in committee.

French Premier Sails For Home

NEW YORK (AP) — Henri Bonnet, after a decade as French ambassador to the United States, sailed for home Wednesday with a final word of "Bon am!" between the two nations.

The retiring ambassador said that the "great number of good friends" he and his wife had made here were "symbolic of the relations between France and the United States."

As the couple boarded the French liner Ile de France, a big delegation of about 100 persons, including city officials and others, showed up to wish them a fond farewell.

Bonnet says he hopes to keep working for closer French-American unity, and that he wants Americans to have confidence in France as a "full-fledged" ally with the will and ability to stand against Soviet expansion.
