

Rep. Teague To Introduce Bills Easing Vets' Claims

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Teague (D-Tex.) said he will introduce Wednesday legislation aimed at meeting some complaints about President Eisenhower's order to cut off wartime veterans' benefits.

Teague, who will head the House Veterans Affairs Committee, said he will put in the House's opening day hopper a measure to allow GI's to continue to accrue free education benefits, provided the men were in the service by the end of this month.

The possibility of losing thousands of dollars in veterans benefits already has spurred young men around the country to get in uniform before a Jan. 31 deadline cuts off their eligibility.

Many recruiting offices around the country reported a boom in business almost immediately after the deadline was announced Saturday.

Getting into the service now will mean little as to eligibility for GI bill education—unless a proposal such as Teague's is enacted. But it will make the men eligible for such benefits as GI loan guarantees, unemployment compensation, mustering-out pay, free hospitalization and other benefits. These benefits will not go to men who go in after Jan. 31.

These same benefits have been available to almost all veterans with separations under other than dishonorable conditions since the start of the Korean War—July 27, 1950. The end to eligibility rights on Jan. 31 will have no effect on benefits already earned, except that the announcement also set certain distant deadlines for veterans to make use of the benefits or lose them.

Under Teague's bill, for which cost estimates were not available, a serviceman could continue to accrue education benefits if in service by the end of this month until he reached the VA maximum or until his first discharge. Because of a retroactive provision the

State Tax Structure To Be Given New Study
