Pounding out four first round pins and two others in second and third rounds, Roseburg High School wrestlers repeated an earlier team win over Sutherlin Wednesday night, taking the Bulldogs to camp 4-10 before a sizable crowd in Roseburg's old gym.

Sutherlin gained some measure of revenge by winning junior varsity matches by a final 21-8 team score.

Roseburg picked up additional points in its second start of the season by way of three decisions and a Sutherlin forfeit in the 156-pound class.

Sutherlin's sensational freshman Jerry Perez opened scheduled action by flattening Roseburg's Dick Stallings in a 25-pound match for a second straight outing. After

that, however, Roseburg dominated the meet.

Another win added.

The losers added their only other win on another first round pin by 125-pound Larry Boes over Dale Pippin in 1:42.

Roseburg's Don Rone made a second round pin at 104 pounds and Gil Harvey made a third round pin at 121 pounds before four Roseburg first-round pins followed.

Bob Moore, Vern Foree, Larry Jacobs and Jack Landers were all first-round winners with Landers 55 second win over Jim Goodson in the heavyweight division the fastest time.

Winners by decision were 113-pound John Dunnihoo, 139-pound Jim Hicks and 165-pound Mel Thomas for Roseburg.

Denver Coach Eyed By OSC

NEW YORK (AP) — Oregon State College representatives scheduled a conference Thursday with Bob Blackman, University of Denver football coach, as they continued their search for a successor to resigned LaVerne (Kip) Taylor.

Blackman, here for the American Football Coaches' Assn. convention, said Wednesday he has had "informal talks" about the OSC vacancy.

Blackman, who coached Denver to the Skyline Conference championship this season, refused to discuss a report he is being considered as a possible successor to Hampton Pool as head coach of the professional Los Angeles Rams and also to fill a coaching vacancy at Dartmouth.

In addition to Blackman, Tommy Prothro, UCLA backfield coach, Skip Stahley of Idaho, and Wes Fry, California assistant, have been rumored as possibilities for the head coaching job at Oregon State.

Beaver Teams Average 6-6 Up

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — When they talk about Oregon State's "all" basketball, Beavers they mean 6-foot-6 inches and up.

That's the average height of the shortest of two squads Coach Slats Gill can send into Northern Division play this season.

With 5-8 Rob Robins at guard the team averages 6-6, but when 6-4 Bob Allard replaces Robins the average moves up to 6-8.

Wade (Swede) Halbrook, who became scholastically eligible for conference competition only this week, and sophomore Phil Shadoin provide most of the height. Halbrook "towers" three inches over 7-foot Shadoin.

Other starters are Tony Vlastela and Jay Dean, both 6-5.

With Halbrook, who led the Coast Conference in scoring last season, off the squad because of poor grades, the Beavers won 4 and lost 6 in pre-conference competition. Halbrook made up his school work this week, however, and became eligible to play.

Oregon State plays its first conference games this weekend, as hosts to Washington State. Halbrook is not expected to start but may see some action.

Waterfowl Talk Stated For Junior High School

Our international wildlife, the waterfowl, will be the topic for discussion by Milt Guyman, education agent for the Oregon Game Commission, to be presented at central Junior High School on Jan. 14.

Cartoon-like charts will illustrate the 20-minute waterfowl management talk by Guyman to be followed by the sound, color film "Behind the Flyways." This 27-minute movie shows the many cooperative waterfowl management activities being carried on by federal and state agencies, with help from private organizations and sportsmen. Oregon's part in the nationwide program to provide feeding and resting grounds for waterfowl, to study waterfowl migrations, and to acquire lands for public shooting grounds should be of interest to every young citizen.

This is the fourth in a series of wildlife management programs presented to junior high students by Game Commission personnel.

Briton Offers Rocky London Title Defense

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano was offered \$300,000 and four round trips Thursday to defend his title in London in late April or early May against England's Don Cockell.

The offer was made to Al Weil, Marciano's manager, by Jack Solomons, British boxing promoter, currently in Johannesburg.

Cockell is the British and European heavyweight champion. In his last four fights against Americans, Cockell beat Harry Matthews of Seattle three times and Roland LaStarza of New York once.

A Canadian-born Japanese apprentice jockey will ride this winter at Hialeah. His name is Iromi (Spud) Uyeyama. In Japanese his name means "top of the mountain."

AP Sports Writer Taken By Fatal Heart Attack

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Russ Newland, 54, Associated Press sports writer who had made the West Coast his beat for 20 years died early Thursday of a heart attack.

He had been seriously ill since early December following hospitalization for a heart ailment. Several blood transfusions improved his condition, but he suffered a relapse and with a second attack—died at 4 a.m.

At his bedside were his wife, Helen, their son, Grant, and daughter, Mrs. David Oille, all of San Francisco, and a brother, Ray Newland, Tacoma, Wash. In addition, he is survived by a granddaughter, Kristine Oille.

Born July 13, 1900 in Tacoma, Newland was educated in Washington schools and joined the Associated Press in 1923 in Spokane. He came to San Francisco in 1924 and had been writing sports here and along the West Coast since that time.

Sacramento To Settle Debts Owed President

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Sacramento Solon directors Wednesday night made an undisclosed offer to settle up debts owed to Pres. Eddie Mulligan of the Pacific Coast League baseball club. 85-Foot Goal Thought Record

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP) — George Linn's field goal of nearly 85 feet Tuesday night against North Carolina will go down among basketball's greatest thrills.

Officials at the University of Alabama Wednesday took a recap of the event, and brought Linn back to the Alabama fieldhouse to show them exactly where he was standing. They measured the distance and said it was 84 feet, 11 inches. And now they're trying to determine if it is a record.

Tide Coach Johnny Dee said the basketball which Linn hurled is being sent to the Basketball Hall of Fame, now being established by the National Assn. of Basketball Coaches at Springfield, Mass.

A bronze plaque will be inserted into the Alabama field house floor, marking the spot from where Linn launched his long shot.

"How could there possibly ever be a longer shot?" Dee exclaimed. "I've seen them made from beyond the midcourt line, but never anything like that."

The long field goal came in the final seconds of the first half Tuesday night, with the Tide leading North Carolina 29-28.

Linn took a rebound off the Tarheel backboard. Looking at the clock, he leaned backward. The ball almost touched the floor.

The fieldhouse was almost jammed to its capacity of 4,000. They shouted "shoot-shoot-shoot" forward and throw the ball with an easy overhead motion. It struck the Alabama backboard just above the rim, and ricocheted through the hoop as the buzzer ended the half.

There was a deathly silence in the fieldhouse. And then pandemonium.

Alabama went on to defeat the Tarheels 77-55.

Sugar Ray KO's Opponent In 6th

DETROIT (AP) — For 10 exciting seconds, it was the Sugar Ray Robinson of old—swift, sharp and deadly.

In that brief burst, the 34-year-old former middleweight champion swarmed over Joe Rindone, of Boston, and scored a knockout at 1:37 of the sixth round last night to successfully start his comeback.

As a howling crowd of 11,973 urged him on, Robinson floored the inept, confused Rindone with a flashing series of lefts and rights.

"I was satisfied with my showing," he said in his dressing room. "Even though my combinations weren't working, I at least had an opportunity to try them."

"I can't honestly say it was one of my better fights. 'It'll take time to regain the touch.'"

Robinson was stung into action when Rindone, who did little more than huff and puff through the first five rounds, landed a solid left and right to the head. It was his first serious gesture of the nontelevised fight.

Robinson tore after his backpedaling, 28-year-old opponent, clubbing him with six, seven, eight blows to the head and body. A roundhouse right sent Rindone crashing to the canvas.

The crowd, largest in Olympia Stadium since June 1952, went wild.

Robinson's two managers said they had made no definite plans for the future.

Robinson weighed 159 to Rindone's 163 1/3.

Spring Drills Get Favor Of Coaches

NEW YORK (AP) — For the first time, the American Football Coaches Assn. has put itself on record on the subject of spring training. And naturally the coaches are for it in a big way—about 499 to 1.

They made their feelings known Wednesday in approving a resolution asking the NCAA to consider increasing the spring training sessions from the present 20 to 30 days.

The coaches, however, acted too late to get it on the agenda of the current NCAA convention. It turned out after a committee had forwarded the resolution to the NCAA that it is necessary to notify the NCAA secretary 30 days in advance and that the secretary then must mail a copy of a proposed amendment to all members of the association not later than three weeks before the convention. The coaches will work faster next year.

The resolution proposed that out of season football practice should be limited to five days a week during a period of six calendar weeks, exclusive of vacation periods at which time no practice sessions shall be held.

Daily practice sessions must not exceed two hours duration thus making a total of not more than 60 hours of out of season practice. No games between schools or off campus scrimmages shall be permitted.
