

Yugoslav Press Claims Criminal Charges Distorted

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — Communist Yugoslavia's press Wednesday kept up its charges that Western newspapers had magnified and distorted the pending criminal prosecution of former Vice President Milovan Djilas and Vladimir Dedijer.

Both Borba and Politika, the country's two largest newspapers, denounced as an "invention" an Associated Press dispatch from Calcutta Monday in which Yugoslav Foreign Secretary Koca Popovic was quoted as telling a news conference the action against Dedijer was undertaken without consulting President Marshal Tito.

Tito and Popovic now are en route to Burma after a state visit to India. The government last week brought formal charges against Djilas and Dedijer, the latter Tito's biographer, claiming they had attempted to undermine the state by propaganda.

Luciano To Open Haberdashery

NAPLES, Italy — Hard-boiled Charles (Lucky) Luciano, deported New York king of vice, is about to enter a new business—haberdashery.

Even Luciano thinks that's funny. "Just picture me selling neckties," he chuckled over his meatballs and tomato sauce at a restaurant which cooks early for him so he can obey police orders and get off the streets by nightfall.

"I bet I'll pick up a lot of money," he nodded confidently. "Yep—a lot of honest dollars."

"That's what they wanted, wasn't it?" he demanded grimly.

Luciano's decision was more or less forced on him. Police ruled he'd have to start showing some "legitimate" means of income for the lavish life he leads here in "exile" from the American land he adopted by immigration and which later kicked him out.

Besides ordering Lucky to go to work, a Naples police admonition board ruled a month ago he must stay off the streets from dusk to dawn, stay within 12 miles of Naples.

\$65,000 General Damages Demanded In Court Suit

A suit for \$55,000 general and \$1,124.47 special damages for injuries received in a traffic accident Nov. 9, 1954, has been filed in circuit court by Evelyn Bachor against David Porter Trenholm.

The plaintiff alleges she received permanent injuries when the defendant's truck rammed her car at Days Creek, and that Trenholm was negligent.

The complaint states the plaintiff was 54 years old at the time of the mishap, that she has a life expectancy of 18.48 years, that her earning capacity of \$200 per month was ended by the accident.

Professor Would Change Name To Washingtonia

SEATTLE — How about a change of the state's name to Washingtonia?

Dr. Bror L. Grondal of the University of Washington Forestry Department is proposing it so the state can quit "living anonymously in the shadow of Washington, D.C."

"Names like California and Oregon are familiar in parts of the world where the state of Washington literally is unknown," he says.

"Make it Washingtonia. After all, we're known as Washingtonians, not Washingtons."

He cites these advantages: it would end the misdelivery of state residents' mail to Washington, D.C.; it wouldn't be too complicated a step; the University of Washington wouldn't be confused with the Washington University of St. Louis.

On his trips outside the state the professor addresses homeward-bound mail to Seattle, Washingtonia.

After publication of the professor's suggestion, the Seattle Times made a quick man-in-the-street survey and found quite a few who agreed with the idea and about an equal number who didn't.

Sen. Hatfield Proposes 10 College Scholarships

PORTLAND — State Sen. elect Mark Hatfield, reporting concern because a number of top high school students are unable to go to college, said Tuesday he plans to sponsor a bill to provide \$200 college scholarships to 10 students a year.

The Salem legislator told the Portland Junior Chamber of Commerce that students would qualify for the proposed scholarships by taking competitive examinations. Two would come from each congressional district and two from the state at large, he said.
