Meetings of the club are held on first and third Fridays of the month at the Armory. Visitors are welcome.

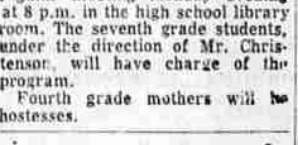
GLIDE PTA WILL MEET FOR REGULAR MEETING
