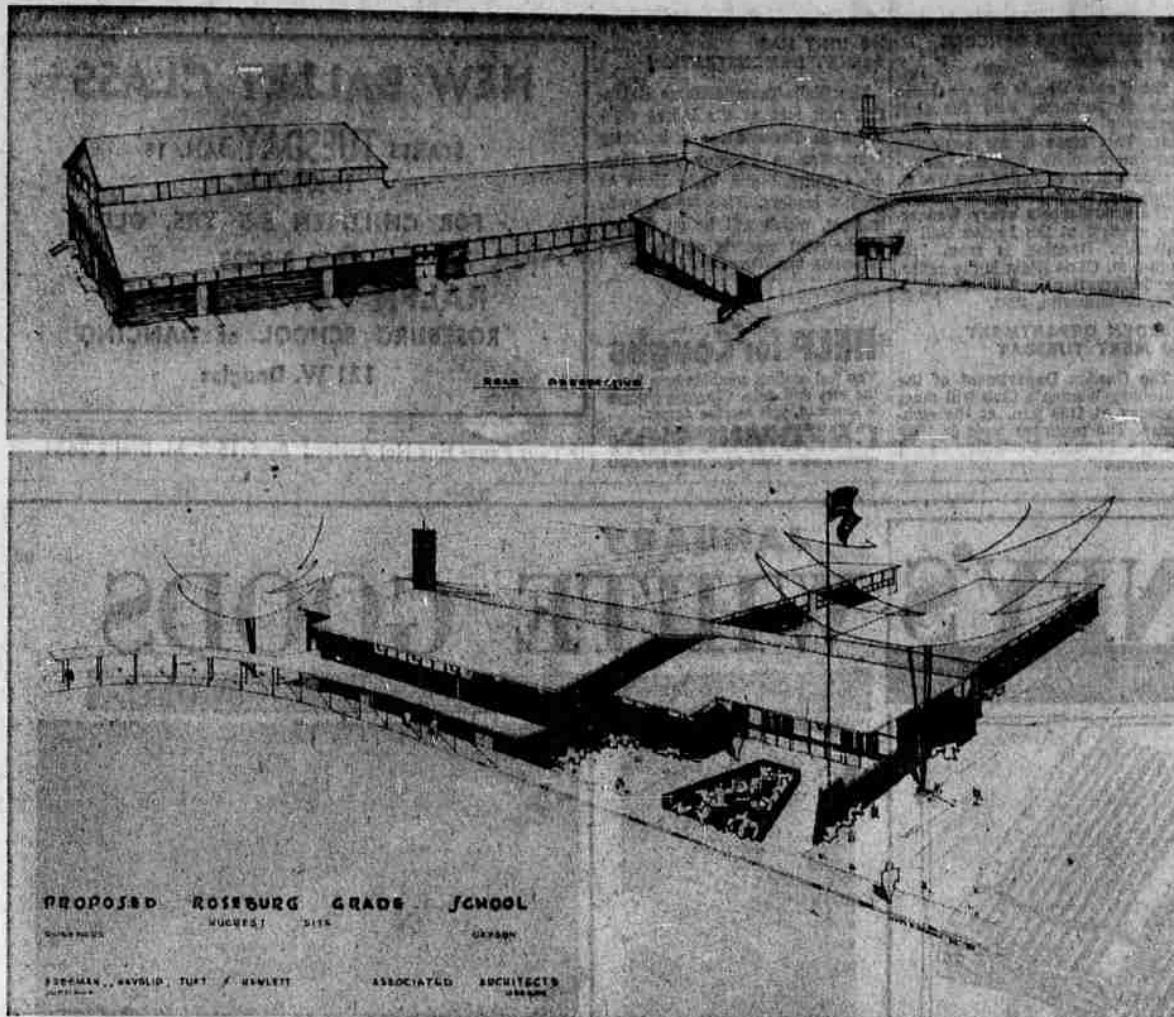

Writer Deplores Annual Turnabout Of Hoop Rulings

SEATTLE (AP) — One of these evenings—almost any year now—your favorite basketball team will trot out on the floor wearing football headgear, shoulder pads and fierce scowls.

Each team will have its attending physician and an ambulance will be waiting at the door.

Think not? Haven't you noticed that basketball is getting rougher and rougher? The MORBID—Manufacturers of Rules of Basketball, Inc.—has been turning out its product on an assembly line basis ever since Doc Naismith introduced the peach basket to the world of sport.

And every year it retools, apparently trying to perfect a model nobody will buy. It eliminated the center jump, put in the center line, adopted and abandoned three-and-two-minute rules, not to mention a pile of ceteras.

For the past few seasons MORBID has been trying to streamline the personal foul out of the game. It was decided there was too doggone much fouling and that was doggone well right.

So the two-shot foul rule was adopted to make the penalty more severe. And to help cut down on fouls the referees were urged to overlook the offenses that had no bearing on the game. Inadvertent collisions—they may really be advertent as all get out, but who's to prove it?—seldom draw fouls at the time they draw blood.

And how about those rebounds? The modern way to take a ball off the backboard is with elbows swinging and feet flailing. The requirements for a good board man are courage, height, determination and a paid-up accident policy.

That's the situation in a nutshell.

Seattle Light Heavy Title Fight Offered

SEATTLE (AP) — Light heavyweight champion Archie Moore may give Eddie Cotton a shot at the title in an indoor bout here next spring "if the price is right," Moore's manager has informed the Seattle Boxing Club.

Matchmaker Jack Hurley said Saturday that Charlie Johnson, Moore's pilot, told him in a telephone conversation "we are receptive to a bid to box Cotton... provided he continues undefeated and the price is right."

Johnson has agreed tentatively twice before to match the champion with the Seattle light heavy, but both times the bout fell through.

Cotton meets Frankie Daniels, Bakersfield, Calif., here Tuesday night in an 8-round main event. Daniels handed Cotton his only defeat last year.

Southern Seniors Thump North, 12-6

MOBILE, Ala. (AP) — Coach Paul Brown said the South team "did the things they could do best—and they kept doing them" in outscoring his Northerners 12-6 after three lean rebel years in the Senior bowl.

Brown, coach of the Cleveland Browns, told sports writers "We did as well as we could."

His backs, led by quarterback Dave Leggett of Ohio State, pierced the powerful South line for an 80-yard touchdown drive in the second quarter of Saturday's game, with Leggett scoring one foot out.

But the South, directed by longtime pro Coach Steve Owen, charged back after the intermission and scored on a drive that followed the second half kickoff. Frank Bidom of Southern Methodist got the tying score on a two-yard drive.

The other south touchdown came on a 10-yard power play by fullback Dick Bielski of Maryland in the fourth quarter. This followed a sustained drive of 63 yards.

Quarterback Bobby Freeman of Auburn, named outstanding player in the game, did a masterful job of directing the scoring drives and was leading total ground gainer.

Oregon's New Bighorn Residents Doing Well

Oregon's newest wildlife residents, the 20 bighorn sheep recently transplanted from British Columbia, are doing very well according to the latest report.

Bob Mace, chief big game biologist, and Norm Minnick, Game Commission agent at Hart Mountain, have been keeping close check on the animals, and apparently they are adapting themselves nicely to the new home. Because of the small size of the enclosure where they are now being held, they are being fed hay and sheep pellets to carry them through the winter.

Lorin Giese of the Game Commission engineering staff has prepared the plans and specifications for the larger fence that is to be built.

The new fence will be approximately four miles long and eight feet high. It will mainly consist of woven wire, but several strands of barbed wire will also be used. The fence will enclose over 500 acres on the west face of Hart Mountain. Contractors interested in working on the fence must have their bids in the game commission office in Portland before 10 a.m. on Jan. 27.

Displaying fine field generalship, Larson mixed his passes deftly with the sharp running of Colorado fullback Carroll Hardy for scores in every period, including two touchdowns in the second.

Larson connected with nine of 15 passes for 200 yards. Graham, who led the Cleveland Browns to the National Football League professional championship, hit 17 of 31 for 190 yards and two touchdowns.

Hardy cracked the line for 134 yards in 13 tries and punted four times for an average of 47 yards.

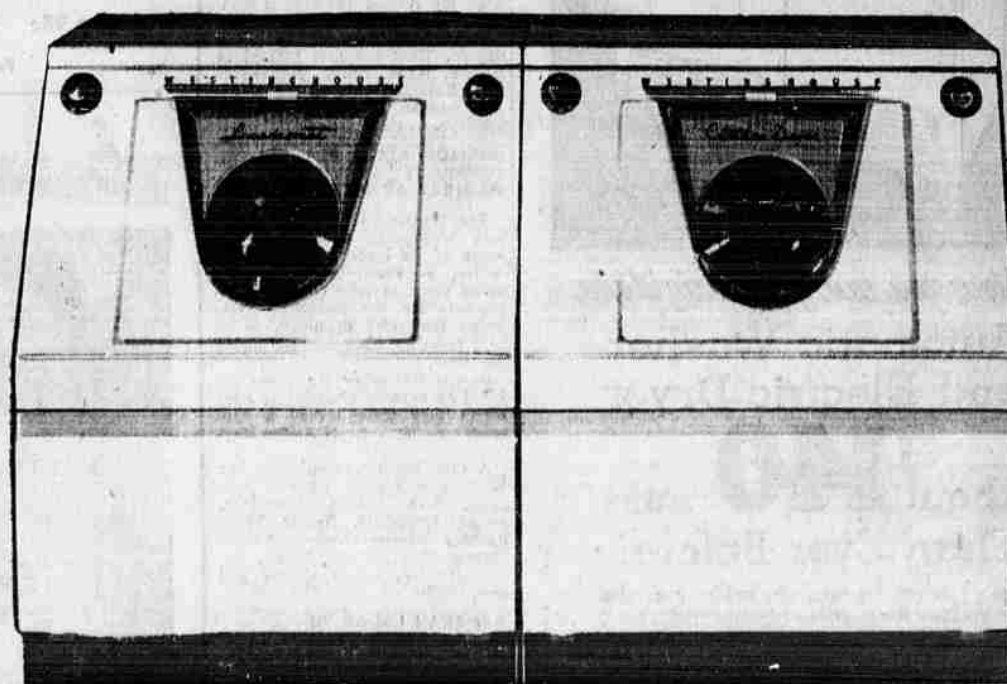
