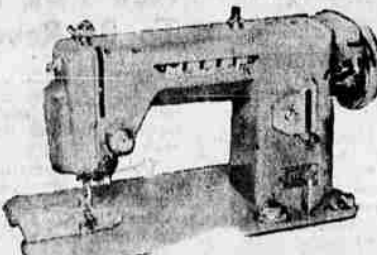

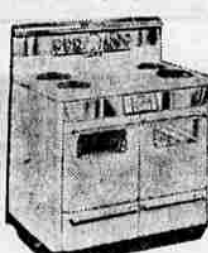

3. From the four contestants up selected as most resembling Miss Sunbeam, a territorial winner and three runners-up will be selected by popular vote. Only official ballots obtained at your Sunbeam grocery will be valid.
4. The winner of each territorial contest shall be eligible to compete with the winners of all other territorial contests in the judging for the Grand Prize Award. The territorial winner and the three runners-up from each Sunbeam territory shall receive prizes as described here.

8. The parents of each territorial winner will be required to fill out, sign and have notarized an official application blank that contestant is eligible according to contest rules, and that they will take the prize-winning trip on or before May 15, 1955, if it is won.
