

OTTAWA (AP)—The federal government here has proposed to tighten its grip on the use of water in international rivers and to loosen its control over the export of gas and oil.

Two measures introduced in the commons by Trade Minister Howe—the first government bills of the session—would:

1. Require anyone—including a provincial government—to get a federal license for any works affecting the flow on the Canadian side of a river running into the United States.
2. Remove the federal government's power to impose export duties on gas, oil and other fluids, while retaining this authority for

3. Cut down the government's unrestricted authority to cancel licenses for these exports.
 4. Make a federal license necessary for the import of gas.
- The water measure originated in part from a disagreement between the federal and British Columbia governments over the use of Columbia River water for electricity, and its passage would assure the central government of the whip hand in that dispute.

It would enable the cabinet here to block a pending arrangement between B.C. and the Kaiser Aluminum interests of the U.S. for the use of Columbia River water to generate power for Kaiser. Federal authorities consider the deal would not give B.C. sufficient returns and would not conform to long-range planning for Columbia development.

The relaxation of gas-oil export provisions, federal authorities

said, should have a favorable effect on U.S. Federal Power Commission treatment of two applications involving huge Canadian natural gas pipeline projects.

These are the 300 million dollar Trans-Canada Pipe Lines, Ltd., proposal to bring gas east from Alberta and Westcoast Transmission Co.'s 100 million dollar project to carry Peace River gas through British Columbia and into the United States. Both involve heavy sales in the U.S. market.

FACES MANSLAUGHTER

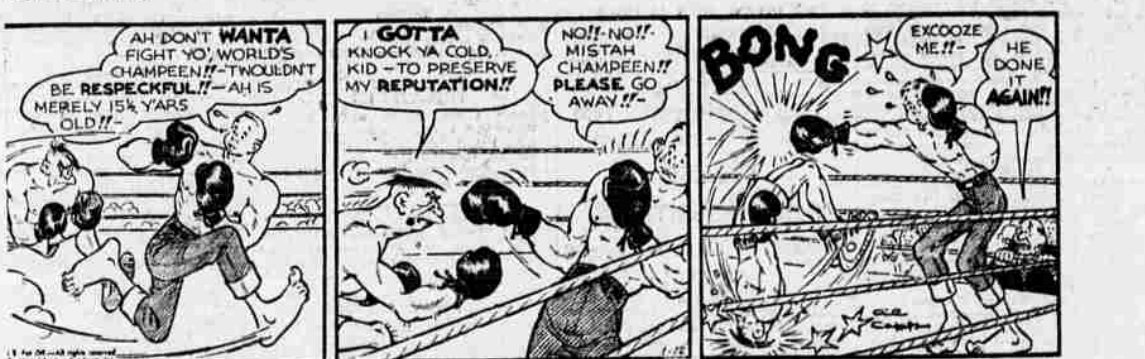
