

**Fight Scene Shifts To Dressing Rooms**

CLEVELAND (AP)—Rocky Castellani's unanimous decision over Holly Mims last night almost carried over into a dressing room rematch as the Mims entourage burst into the winner's quarters screaming various versions of "we was robbed."

Castellani had been lounging in his robe. His eyes widened in surprise, and then he lunged to his feet, fists clenched, and muttered in flat, cold tones:

"I'll show 'em who won it." Quick grabs by Castellani's trainers stopped what might very well have become a free-for-all, out of sight of the 5,348 fans in the arena and the television viewers who watched the 12-round middleweight bout.

Mims, along with his manager Nick Trottao and his trainers claimed that Castellani butted him in the clinches and rubbed him on the ropes.

Castellani's manager Al Nalman said later the ruckus "was only the result of the heat of battle, and disappointment."

**Low Point Allowance Steers Dons To Tourney**

While college basketball rambles along in what may be its most prolific scoring season—with 100-plus games totals popping up all over—the lads who bump into San Francisco are having a tough time getting 50 points. And that stingy treatment may lead the Dons into the NCAA title tournament as an at-large representative.

The Dons, ranked fifth in this week's Associated Press poll, shackled Santa Clara by a 54-44 count last night for their 11th victory in 12 games and their ninth straight. The lean Santa Clara point production chopped San Francisco's national leading team defense average to a scant 47.9 allowance a game.

San Francisco, which lost to UCLA 47-40 but reversed it with a 56-44 triumph, went into a seven minute stall against Santa Clara at the close of the California Basketball Assn. game. Kenny Sears—who has starred for Santa Clara in three NCAA playoffs—was high with 17 points.

**Giants Trade Punches, Make Up After Battle**

**San Juan, P.R. (AP)**—Usually affable Willie Mays and Ruben Gomez, key players in the New York Giants' drive to the world championship last fall, apparently were on good terms today after a fist fight.

The two players, members of the Santurce club of the Puerto Rican League, engaged in fist-cuffs during a practice session Tuesday. Mays knocked Gomez down before other players stopped the squabble.

But today both players refused to discuss the incident and teammates said they had shaken hands.

"There's nothing to it," said Gomez. "We both consider the case closed and are good friends."

Newspaper reports said Gomez attempted to intervene in a scrap between Mays and batting practice pitcher Milton Rialat. Mays mistook Gomez's intentions and threw a punch, knocking the Giants right-hander down.

**Coach Signs Contract**

**LOS ANGELES (AP)**—UCLA basketball Coach Johnny Wooden has signed a long term contract which becomes effective with the expiration of his current one this year.

Salary terms and length of the contract were not disclosed, but Wooden, a star at Purdue, is believed to have agreed to coach the Bruins for the next five years.

Since he came to UCLA in 1949, his teams have won 132 games and lost 54. He has won four Southern Division championships in the Pacific Coast Conference and two PCC titles.

Harry Elliot of San Diego led the Pacific Coast League in hitting (.350), hits (224), total bases (319) and doubles (42).

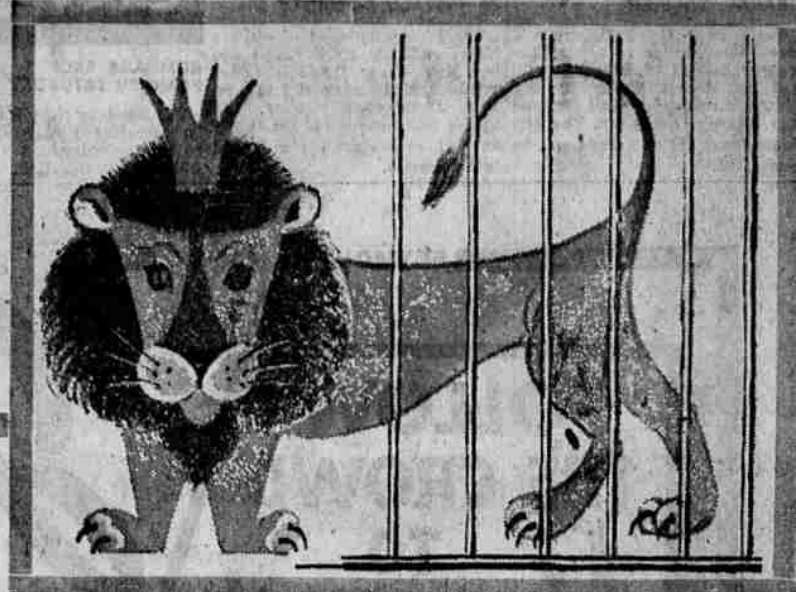
