Glendale Residents Ponder Possibility Of Rural Fire Unit

An investigating committee of rural residents met at the home of Henry LaPrath near Glendale Friday night to discuss the forming of a rural fire district. Gerald Fox was named temporary chairman and Whiting Martin temporary secretary until such a time as a formal organization is evolved.

Glendale Fire Chief Dick Hays, Mayor Bob Proffitt, and Bud Knowles, director of the quines Creek Forest Protective Assn. office, were present to give a brief presentation of some of the requirements of a rural fire district and the effect such an organization would have on fire insurance rates.

Among general facts brought out in discussion were: only a Class A district will satisfy the requirements of the county in such a way that a tax levy may be used to finance it.

A class A district has certain basic requirements. (1) A man or group of men must be employed by the district to be on 24 hour call to answer any fire occurring in the district. (2) Certain definite regulations are made as to capacity of pumper, amount of hose carried and other items relative to equipment.

Proffitt, read statistics as to amount of drop in insurance rates within a class A rural fire district, and Bud Knowles explained the method by which the county designates lands covered.

Setting up a rural fire district would require a special election, and the maximum tax levy if such a measure was passed, would be 5 mills. Such a levy would be very low property holder and would require a fairly large district to raise sufficient funds to support it.

Doug Dollar, Bud Knowles, and George Major were appointed as a committee to contact both fire marshals and county assessors. Another meeting will be called to examine such information as soon as it is available.

Others present at the meeting were J. B. Moore, Whiting Martin, Henry LaPrath and Walter Smith.

Oil Developers Get More Time

Members of the Douglas County Court Wednesday signed an order which defers until May 18 a payment on leases from Oil Developers, Inc.

Under an agreement of last May 18, the oil exploration company was to pay 10 cents per acre per year on 62,000 acres of land leased from the county, with payments due each six months.

Now, payment for the entire year will be due next May 18. The order points out that the company has expended large sums of money in development and that the county should allow more time for the company to pay rental.

Drilling of a test well (near Melrose) was of benefit to the county as a whole, the order states.

Oil Developers and Community Gas & Oil claim leases on about 130,000 acres all together, with part on private and federal land.

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
