Game Commission wants to open other high level lakes when it considers that ice angling would be beneficial.

The Senate group also will introduce a bill to amend carp sealing regulations to permit netting or trapping of other types of non-game or non-food fish. Seining of carp by permit is generally confined to sloughs, reservoirs and backwaters, mostly in Eastern Oregon.

The Game Commission said it wanted a bill to ban the carrying of loaded guns in cars and trucks, a proposal that was defeated in the last Legislature. The committee said it wants more information before it decides whether to sponsor such legislation.

Principal legislation to be introduced by the House committee would abolish all big game refuges in the state. The committee was told that refugees were opened and closed by the state when considered necessary anyway, and that the commission wants to continue a policy of closing areas when necessary to protect certain types of big game.

Also to be introduced as committee bills is legislation repealing a state law forbidding use of boats in the taking of waterfowl because it duplicates a federal law; banning fishing at the base of dams having fishways; and requiring permits for importation of fish used solely for planting in private ponds.

The House group said it would give more study to proposals to boost from 50 cents to \$1 hunting and fishing licenses for disabled war veterans, and requiring state welfare agencies to certify indigent applicants for wood and stream licenses.

Crosby Golfing Show Started

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP)—The Monterey Peninsula's spectacular golf courses reveled in almost perfect weather today as pro and amateur contestants started shooting for fun and cash in the 14th playing of Bing Crosby's famed charity show.

A lot of the players took advantage of the fine weather to turn up in final practice rounds yesterday while followers of the \$15,000 event speculated on this year's likely favorite. The name of Gene Littler, 24-year-old Palm Springs, Calif., star who took the big Los Angeles Open only last week, was prominent. But nobody was overlooking the possibility that E. J. (Dutch) Harrison, Arkansas veteran who walked off with first place money last year, might repeat.

They are only two in a field of pros which includes all but a very few of the leading money winners. Jimmy Demaret, second last year and winner the year before; Jack Burke Jr.; Ed Furgol, National Open champion and the winner here in 1947; Ted Kroll, generally right up with the leaders; Peter Thomson, the British Open champion from Australia; and Lloyd Mangrum were among the name stars frequently mentioned.

With the fine pro field was a coterie of famed names from the scene and sports world plus other notables including retired Gen. Omar Bradley and Edgar Eisenhower, Tacoma attorney and brother of another well-known golfer, Hoagy Carmichael, Phil Harris, Frankie Albert, Red Sanders and Peter DePaola were among the prominent amateurs.

Crosby's golf shows, attracting fans by the thousands, already have netted more than \$200,000 for boys' clubs, old folks' homes, hospitals and the like. Bing picks up all the expense bills, leaving the admission fee take largely intact for the charity fund.

Texas Tech Mentor Vetoes Arkansas Bid
FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. (AP)—Texas Tech football Coach Dewitt Weaver has closed the door on an offer from the University of Arkansas, and the Razorbacks find themselves with the same problem Dowden Wyatt gave them Saturday when he resigned.

John Barnhill, Arkansas athletic director, said Thursday night "We have no definite prospects in mind now," when he learned Weaver had decided not to break his five-year contract with the Border Conference team.

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Oregon, OSC In Vital Tilts

Beavers Favored To Retain Lead

Oregon State and Washington, the teams they figure to finish one-two in the Northern Division, Pacific Coast Conference basketball scramble, will be out to knock each other off this weekend. The odds favor Oregon State.

Coach Stata Gill's tall Beavers, defending Northern champion and current league pace-setter, will be host to Tippy Dye's Huskies at Corvallis Friday and Saturday nights.

Oregon, the runnerup, and dark horse Idaho also will be in action, meeting at Moscow the same nights.

Washington State is idle until Tuesday.

Besides the advantage of a home court, the Beavers will count heavily on 7-foot-3-inch Wade Halbrook in their bid for a sweep at Corvallis. Grades kept Halbrook, the PCC's leading scorer last year, out of OSC's pre-season games—including an overtime loss to Washington—but he returned to the lineup with the start of the conference schedule. He made his first appearance last weekend as the Beavers coasted to a double win over Washington State.

Washington takes a 1-1 record to Corvallis but that single loss was to Idaho and a stunner to the Huskies' hopes. Washington toyed with the Vandals in their first game at Seattle last week but the five Idaho "iron men" won the second contest with ball control tactics that left the Huskies virtually helpless.

Oregon has a 3-1 conference record. Washington State, 1-5, was the victim.

In the Southern Division, the Big Two—UCLA 1-1 and Southern Cal 2-0—meet on the Uclans' home court. UCLA is a slight favorite.

Stanford 1-1 goes into its pair with California 0-2 a slight favorite. Cal has lost sophomore Larry Friend with an ankle injury and big center Bob McKeen is still hobbling a little for the same reason.

Both Bears and Indians are short on bench strength. Friday night's match is at Berkeley and Saturday's at Palo Alto.

The Bears took a two-game beating from USC last weekend in Los Angeles and are dragging the Southern Division standings.

UCLA split with Stanford at Palo Alto in their season openers.

MARSHFIELD'S football coach and athletic director, Pete Susick, was named "Citizen of the Year" by the Coos Bay civic groups last week. He is in his ninth year at Marshfield.

The strong Springfield wrestling team which Roseburg faces this evening fell before defending state champion Klamath Falls 25-16 last week.

The Tankersley wrestling for Sutherland against Roseburg's Jim Schaeffer here last week was Larry and not district football tackle Gene as reported in Saturday's results. Another correction: Bob Thomas lost his match when leading 11-0 when he was overcame by a harmless dizzy spell which often afflicts him while competing.
