OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Johnny Johnson of Coos Bay Ore., was picked as auxiliary back on the second team and Luther Carr of Tacoma's Lincoln High School as halfback on the fourth team of the prep school All American football squad announced Friday by the Wigwam Wisemen of America.

Other varsity wins were posted by Vern Forre in the 147-pound class by a 4-2 decision, Mel Thomason in the 167-pound class by 7-1 decision and Larry Jacobs in the 177-pound class by 6-2 decision.

Jayvee wins were made in the 175-pound class by two Roseburg matmen, Lawson King scored a pin in the second round and Charles Palmer won by 7-5 decision.

A boulder in the side of a steep embankment above the North Umpqua River Friday morning proved the salvation of a Roseburg man who rode a heavy piece of road machinery 75 feet down the bank.

Lou Franco stepped unharmed from his electric-powered "journal-rocker" at about 11 a.m. after the machine banged into the boulder. Shaken up, he went home to catch his breath, according to Mrs. Arthur Selby, News - Review correspondent.

Witnesses said the switch on the machine failed, cutting off the brakes. The rig went out of control over the side of the North Umpqua Road, where Franco is working on road construction for Funderburk Construction Co. The machine, damaged, was retrieved by cats.

Reedsport Housing Units Sold To Real Estate Man

A 35-unit housing project in Reedsport, formerly owned by E. K. Wood, Lumber Co., has been purchased by the John C. Diehl Real estate Agency of Reedsport.

News of the sale was made public in a Reedsport City Council meeting when the new owners requested the city to make a survey preliminary to new platting of the tract on which the houses are located.

The housing was begun by the mill when it was established in Reedsport in 1918 under the ownership of R. J. Hubbard. The real estate agency said it is selling the homes with no down payment, but with improvement reserves.

Improvements will include street paving, sidewalks, installation of sewer lines where needed and replacement of some water lines.

Dairymen Oppose New State Milk Marketing Law

BEND (AP) — The Oregon Dairymen's Assn. voted 19-15 Friday against a proposal to ask the Legislature for a new state milk control law.

Many delegates already had left for home when the proposal came before the association's annual two-day convention here.

Opponents of the proposal contended that a federal milk marketing order would aid the industry more than a return to a milk control program. Voters repealed the old milk control law in last November's general election.

Edgar Grimes of Harrisburg, speaking against the proposal, said it was a plot of "politicians and special interest groups."

Paul Reeder of Hillsboro said he believed that a federal order and a milk control law both were necessary to protect the dairyman.

Supporters of the proposal said they intended to have a milk control bill introduced at the Legislature despite the association's action.

Another matter which stimulated considerable debate was whether the Legislature should be asked to make grade A the only legal grade of fluid milk in the state.

Neal Miller of Woodburn and Rex Ross of Mt. Angel opposed the plan on the ground that it would handicap the small producer. Delegates, however, approved the proposal.

It calls for repeal of grade B and C milk provisions and is aimed at eliminating "gallon jug" dairies which sell milk directly to the consumer. Most of the "gallon jug" dairies operate with grade B licenses.

Ben Buzzard was named executor of the estate, which is in excess of \$30,000.

The estate of Loma A. Henning was also admitted to probate Friday, and Robert E. Elliott was named executor. She died in Roseburg Dec. 16, 1954, at the age of 76.

county, are planned for the second (top) floor court clerks and attorneys will be on the second floor, too.

District and county courts will have offices in the east wing, and the county extension offices will be moved from the Federal Building to the east wing. District court and the extension service will be located on the top floor, with the county court, road department and an extension of the county clerk's office occupying the first floor.

On the ground floor, room is planned for the county surveyor and county planning commission. County court members said the courthouse annex, completed three or four years ago, will probably be occupied by the welfare commission, which now is located in an office building on North Main Street. First, the State Welfare Dept. must approve a transfer.

The district attorney, now located in the annex, will have new offices in the present building, as will the county land department. The county parks department soon will have offices in its own building.

Offices now located in the present building and not being moved will be enlarged, the county court said.

The present building also is due for some refurbishment, with part of the building to be decorated and new lighting installed. Corridors between the old building and the new wings will lead through the present county court and assessor's offices.

The wings are to be fireproof, with frames of structural steel, Glenn said. Exterior walls will be of concrete up to the first floor, and of concrete blocks atop that. The building will be stuccoed on the exterior.

Floors and roofs will be concrete slabs. The wings are designed for further expansion to the north and south, and the east wing, will be built in such a way that an additional floor may be built if needed.

Ellsworth Urges Continued Air Service To Alaska

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore) told the Civil Aeronautics Board Saturday that with a reduction in alternate means of transportation between the Pacific Northwest and Alaska, "it would be far more reasonable to consider the expansion of service from Portland and Seattle to Alaska than to curtail it."

In a letter to Harnar D. Denny, acting CAB chairman, Ellsworth cited recent elimination of passenger steamship service to the territory and the reduced number of non-scheduled air carriers.

"Next summer, due to the rapid expansion of tourist trade generally, Alaska should be able to look forward to a rich tourist business but the thousands of people who formerly traveled to Alaska by water must now go by air," Ellsworth wrote.

"If the scheduled air service is reduced the territory of Alaska will be in a sad state indeed so far as transportation is concerned."

Ellsworth's letter resulted from reports the board is ready to recommend elimination of Pacific Northern and Alaska Airlines from States-Alaska service, leaving the field to Northwest Airlines and Pan-American World Airways. It followed shortly a similar letter from the entire Washington-Alaska congressional delegation to President Eisenhower and the board, urging retention of all four carriers and present route structures.
