FULLERTON PTA HAS INTERESTING DEMONSTRATIONS MONDAY

Special guests at the Fullerton School PTA meeting Monday were two members of the special education department of School District No. 4. Demonstrations and an interesting and informative discussion were given by Jack Lucas, head of the department, and Richard Gates, a member of the special education department staff. Interest was centered on a display of equipment and teaching devices used by this department.

One of the important parts of the special education program is the child guidance clinic as discussed by Mr. Gates. This clinic assists children who need psychiatric help. At the present time, in addition to the fine members of the department, there are two psychiatric social workers and two clinical psychologists, who are volunteer assistants from the Veterans Administration Hospital.

Emphasized by Mr. Lucas was the importance of the home instruction program which is carried on by two certified part-time teachers. These teachers visit the students who are unable to attend school, due to non-contagious illnesses or serious disease, such as polio, and teach them the academic studies. In this way, when the child returns to school he is usually able to return to his own class and age group rather than be set back due to his absence.

Remedial reading problems and teaching aids were discussed by Mr. Gates, who demonstrated the uses made of cards, illustrating sight words, word games, workbooks and readers. Of particular aid in the reading assistance programs is the tachistoscope, which flashes words or groups of words upon the screen. The student thereby learns to instantly recognize words and sentences.

Test aids used in the special education department were also shown including the audiometer, which tests hearing and determines the degree of deficiency; and the telebinocular for eye examinations. Also discussed were block and written tests for the varying age levels. The use of the tape recorder in assisting those with speech impediments was demonstrated. Mr. Lucas pointed out that stuttering is one of the major speech problems and that the stuttermust recognize his problem and accept it just as a person accepts the fact that he must wear glasses or a hearing aid.

It was emphasized that the services of this department were offered as part of the general school program. Financing of this program is supported jointly by this school district and the handicapped children's fund administered by the state department of education.

The business meeting was conducted by Mrs. Arthur Lamka, president. An announcement was made regarding the discussion group which will meet Jan. 24 at 7:30 p.m. The subject will be "Rheumatic Fever—Its Cause and Prevention." At that time a local doctor will be present to talk about rheumatic fever, and a film will be shown. All interested people are invited to attend.

Arthur Lamka, a member of the school board, gave a report on the bond issue to be voted upon by the people in this school district.

It was announced that the second grade potluck will be held Jan. 20 and all second grade parents are urged to attend.

Following the program, refreshments were served by the fourth grade mothers.

Following the business meeting a delightful talk entitled "I Hate Foreigners!" was given by Mrs. Harold Monaghan, a native of Australia. A former resident of Roseburg, she has returned this month with her husband and family to again make her home here. She stressed the fact that there are people all over the globe who consider us foreigners, the same as we consider them foreigners, but that tolerance and understanding of all other peoples will do much to make our world a better place in which to live.

Mrs. Monaghan came to the United States for the first time in 1916. Her home was in Queensland, and she described that section of Australia as a very thickly populated coastal area while the center of Australia is practically a desert. In comparing Australia and the United States in size, she stated that Australia is as big in square miles as the United States—three million square miles.

She told of the early settlement of the country, described its animals, climate and customs, and touched upon the differences in education and standards of living between her country and ours. The popular mode of transportation for young people is motorcycles. There are few cars, because they are imported and expensive. She added that trains, buses and street cars are so plentiful, however, that cars are more or less a luxury.

In conclusion she pointed out that although the standard of living is not as high as it is here, those people who do live in that country are perfectly happy, and they resent foreigners pointing out the defects of their country.

Refreshments were served by the hostess during a question-and-answer period following the instructive and humorous talk.

LARGE GROUND HEADS MONDAY BOOK REVIEW BY DR. JAMES MILLAR

The ancient Egyptians ate flamingo tongues; the men used razors; the women wielded the cosmetic paint brush and used lipstick; taxis had meters. Milk control was in force, and egg prices were fixed. Dr. James Millar presented these facts gleaned from translations of Egyptian hieroglyphics when he reviewed the book, "Seventy Years in Archaeology" by Sir Flinders Petrie for a large audience at the First Presbyterian Church Monday morning.

Dr. Millar pointed out that a high civilization is no guarantee of the perpetuity of a civilization and that the findings of archaeologists attest to this. He stressed that archaeology is a growing field all over the world.

Character and security go together; and character is the only basis for the security of a nation. Dr. Millar noted. He emphasized adding that people of this country should be more and more concerned with the leaders they select and should choose men of integrity and ability in order to insure security and prosperity.

Dr. Millar quoted Flinders Petrie's belief that children are interested observers of their surroundings much earlier than people think. He showed how a friend in the navy, an archaeologist, a mother who collected minerals and a father, who was a surveyor, all influenced the life and career of the young Flinders Petrie. He gave examples to show that as a rule the greatest men are those who know more than their own field. Dr. Millar advised that no matter what field a young person is interested in, he should get a broad education; for he believes that narrow specialization is a mistake.

The ability to observe he declared to be the difference between a great and a mediocre person. He cited Flinders Petrie as a man who had the powers of observation who gave attention to minute details to such an extent that he was able to weave history from scattered evidence gleaned from collecting specimens, surveying areas and weighing objects. Dr. Millar stated that Flinders Petrie was the greatest Egyptologist of his time although he had little regular education and had to cope with chronic asthma. As a child he gathered specimens and visited museums whenever possible, always with a growing interest.

Dr. Millar would encourage children to keep a file of clippings from the daily papers telling of current discoveries of archaeologists in Egypt; for he believes that country is of great importance today. He stressed the relationship of the Arabs and the Jews and indicated that Egypt is sympathetic to the Arabs, making a situation that would be serious if the Arabs became Communists.

When he was in Egypt in 1937 Dr. Millar found that 90 per cent of the people were illiterate and that many were living in terrible poverty. A twenty year program has since been inaugurated to combat illiteracy.

Dr. Millar put emphasis upon his conviction that the object of mass education should be to interest more people in education and culture, to create in them a desire to know more of great literature. To illustrate he gave an example of what the thirst for knowledge did for Flinders Petrie. The first employer whom Sir Flinders approached for a job refused to hire him because he did not have a degree. The next meeting of the two was years later at Cambridge when honorary degrees were to be given to both of them.

Dr. Millar revealed that his own desire to know more about archaeology was whetted with his acquisition of a new encyclopedia in 1916. This led eventually to his stopping over in London, on his way to Cambridge in 1932, to study at London University under Flinders Petrie, whom he termed a kindly, elderly man. During that summer he attended classes in the morning and lectures at the British Museum in the afternoon. Then in 1937, Dr. Millar on his way to Oxford, went down into the Mediterranean countries including Egypt where he was able to fulfill his dream of seeing the archaeological treasures in the Museum in Cairo.

The Women's Society of the First Presbyterian Church has been very gratified at the response of the community to the 1954-55 series of book reviews in which it is presenting Dr. James Millar, reviewing books whose authors he has met. The third of the series will be announced in the near future.
