

Legal, Social Restrictions Abet Sex Crimes

DUARTE, Calif. (AP) — Dr. Alfred Kinsey says that increasing legal and social restrictions against sex are "sources of many of our crime problems among teenagers."

The author of the much-discussed book on the sex behavior of the human male and female told newsmen at the City of Hope Medical Center recently that while "there are certain sex acts which society needs to protect itself against," sex restrictions "tend to increase sex problems."

The University of Indiana zoologist declared that restrictions have greatly increased in this country in the past 75 years. These include the raising of the level of consent among girls.

"In every state in the Union a boy can be jailed for petting," he said, adding that for the past six years he and his staff have been studying the legal and penal aspects of sex. The youngest sex offender he found in a penal institution was only 4 years old, he said.

"Sixty per cent of the persons in penal institutions are there for sex crimes," Dr. Kinsey declared.

McCarthy Gives Clark File On CIA Suspects

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) handed Gen. Mark W. Clark a file of "names and leads" to support his charges of "communism and corruption" in the supersecret Central Intelligence Agency.

Clark heads a six-man Hoover commission team assigned to study CIA and the rest of the government's intelligence operations. He visited McCarthy to pick up the data, then flew back to Charleston, S.C., where he heads The Citadel, a military college.

Western States GOP Invited To Portland

EUGENE (AP) — The Western States Republican Conference has been invited to Portland for its 1955 session. Ed G. Boehnke, Oregon state GOP chairman reports.

The conference, which usually attracts the top Republican workers of the 11 Western states and the two territories, is devoted to discussion of legislation affecting the West as well as party matters.

"As a scientist it is my job to record the facts," he replied.

Lyric Soprano Appears Tonight At Junior High

Dorothy Warenskjold, lyric soprano, making her third transcontinental concert tour in recitals, will appear tonight at 8:15 on the stage of the Junior High School auditorium. Her Roseburg visit is under sponsorship of the Community Concert Assn.

Since her debut as Nanetta in the opera "Falstaff" in San Francisco in 1948, and shortly after in "Carmen," Miss Warenskjold has been acclaimed by critics over the nation. She was signed for four concerts with the San Francisco Symphony for the 1948-49 season, a record unequalled by any other singer, then signed for five concerts the next season. She has also been in constant demand in New Orleans, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati and San Antonio and with the Northwest Grand Opera Assn.

In spite of her increasing opera and concert commitments, Miss Warenskjold has found time to keep up with a soaring career in radio and television. She was teamed with James Melton on "The Harvest of Stars" in 1949, then was selected to do seven successive programs of her own on the same program's summer series. She appears frequently on "The Voice of Firestone," "The Railroad Hour," and "The Standard Hour."

During the spring and early summer of 1954, she made her first visit to Europe. Representing the United States, she sang at the annual July 4 festival in Rebild, Denmark, under the patronage of the King and Queen of Denmark. Jack Crossan, Miss Warenskjold's accompanist, is also a native Californian. He received his training, both musical and academic, in Southern California and holds a Master of Music degree.
