Brilliant Indian Play Fails, 57-55

Nine Roseburg Indians played the game of their nine high school lives Saturday night, and though losing to North Bend, 57-55, they played more basketball in four quarters than any Roseburg team has locally in two years.

In what must certainly rank as the best game played in the new Roseburg gym since its dedication 14 months ago, the Indians gave the highly-ranked visitors care after care and the 1,500 fans on hand thrilled after thrill before falling in the games closing seconds.

A mid-floor desperation heave with two seconds to go by the Indians' Nub Beamer banked off the backboard and barely missed dropping through for the game's tying markers. Five seconds before, Beamer had brought the Indians within striking distance with a short two-pointer to make it 57-55.

In the 11th minute, two minutes and 35 seconds, the local led fought from behind a 56-51 deficit. Reserve Jerry Droscher, in the ball game for the first time, took a layup after taking Dennis Brundage's pass under the hoop.

Hereupon, North Bend manufactured a ball control stall which lasted a full minute and 20 seconds. With 45 seconds remaining, center Puk Biddington (high point man with 22 markers) tied up the Bulldogs' guard Bert Why.

Roseburg moved downcourt after taking the tipoff but Bill Oerding's miss again set the stage for a jump ball between Why and Beamer. North Bend regained possession and Indian guard Freddy Hargis drew a foul. Jack Shanley held out one throw with 25 seconds to go to make it 57-53.

Beamer then accounted for Roseburg's final field goal, and when the Indians regained possession on a North Bend traveling call, the stage was set for the final Beamer attempt that just missed.

Pair Score
As far as Roseburg scoring was concerned, it was a case of Biddington in the first half and Oerding in the final two periods. Biddington, checking ferociously and rebounding ravenously, registered 16 markers in the first two periods while Oerding, entering the game in the second period, tallied all 15 of his points in the second half.

Of Biddington's total, 10 points came on 10 straight free throws without a miss. His field goal effort included a couple of tips, a couple of hooks and two short jump shots.

Of Coos Bay were co-champions in last fall's class 1-A football playoffs, playing to a 13-13 tie.

The Metropolitan team will be made up of players from Portland, as well as such outlying schools as Rainier, Estacada and St. Helens.

Lee Gustafson of South Salem made the selections for the State team, aided by Dutch Kawasoe, Vale, and Fred Spiegelberg, Medford. Gustafson will be head coach, assisted by the other two.

Choosing the Metropolitan team were Tom Desjardis, Jefferson of Portland, head coach, assisted by Andy Knudsen, St. Helens, and Bob Signer, Lincoln of Portland.

Possibly the week's most important test is the one pitting Roseburg and Myrtle Creek against each other at Roseburg Friday night. The two hooked up in a 48-47 thriller won by the Vikes, at Myrtle Creek two weeks ago.

Umpqua Valley League games during the week find Sutherlin at Douglas and Glendale at Myrtle Creek on Tuesday night and Sutherlin at Glendale in a Friday night game.

Other Class A action during the week finds Waldport at Reedsport on Tuesday, Drain at St. Francis in Eugene on Friday, and Roseburg at Springfield and Powers at Glendale on Saturday night.

St. Francis is one of two teams to have beaten the Warriors this year. The Drain team is expected to be out for revenge in this one. Roseburg and Springfield collide for the first time this season, while Glendale is seeking its first win of the year after nine straight losses.

The Douglas B League begins its second half of play Tuesday night with league-leading Glide hosted by Yoncalla, Oakland at Elkton, Riddle at Days Creek and Canyonville at Camas Valley. Close games are in prospect all along the line.

Friday night's "sked" appears to give the edge to form with Camas Valley at Glide, Yoncalla at Canyonville, Days Creek at Oakland and Elkton at Riddle.

Wrestling action during the week sees two county major schools, Roseburg and Sutherlin, invade Grants Pass. The Bulldogs make the trek Wednesday night while Roseburg goes south Friday eve.

Monday evening, Sutherlin introduces Douglas to the sport at Sutherlin.

Undeafed Oregon State and Oregon, running one-two well out in front in the Northern Division Coast Conference basketball race, looked like the pick of the pack Monday after weekend triumphs.

Oregon, with a 5-1 won-lost record, entertains OSC (4-0) at Eugene Friday night and the teams reverse the night and the teams at Corvallis Saturday night.

Led by Tony Vlastelica, Aberdeen, Wash., boy who picked Corvallis for his college alma mater, the Beavers handily trounced Washington Saturday night, 70-63, on their home floor. At Moscow, Oregon pulled out a slow-motion 41-40 win over Idaho, staving off a final-second Idaho surge.

The losses were severe setbacks for the Huskies and Vandals, giving each a 1-3 won-lost record. Washington State has won one and lost five games.

It was the 33 points by Vlastelica, who always appears at his best against the Huskies, which was the margin of difference Saturday night. The Huskies made a game of it the first half and led at halftime, 33-32, compared with

their 68-33 rout by OSC the night before.

At one point, Washington pulled into a 25-15 lead. But Vlastelica teamed up with 7-foot-3 Swede Halbrook, each scoring 16 points for their team's entire output the first half, to keep OSC in the game.

The Beavers caught fire mid-way. Washington's Dean Parsons way in the second period and pulled away. Washington's Dean Parsons had 20 points for second high point man, followed by Halbrook with 19.

In a ball control game at half-time, the Vandals led at halftime 19-15. After tying it up at 15-15 Idaho held the ball seven minutes motionless or sat on the floor.

The game speeded up near the end and Oregon led 41-35 with just over a minute to play. Idaho surged to a single point before the gun.

Idaho's Jay Buhler led the scorers with 16 points, followed by Oregon's Jim Loscutt with 15.

Idaho meets WSC at Pullman Tuesday night. Washington goes there Friday night and Saturday night clashes with the Cougars.

UCLA and Stanford emerged atop the Southern Division by sweeping two-game series from Southern California and California, respectively. The Bruins beat Southern Cal 76-64 Saturday night in a game that saw two Bruins and one Trojan foul out.

Stanford handed California its second loss in two nights 76-67 although Cal center Bob McKeen's 23 points set a new division scoring record. McKeen, in four years of varsity competition, has 628 points. The old mark of 612 was set by Stanford's Hank Luisetti in the 1930s.

San Francisco, fifth ranking team in the nation, did not play Saturday night and will be idle until Jan. 28 when it meets Stanford.
