49'er Duo Leads West To Victory

A passing combination of quarterback Y. A. Tittle and end Billy Wilson, both of the San Francisco Forty-niners, the West rolled to a 26-19 triumph over the East in the fifth annual pro-bowl game Sunday at Los Angeles.

The winners were forced to rally from behind after trailing both early and late in the game. The East took a 13-3 first period lead and maintained the margin at half-time by a count of 19-9.

In the third period the West scored seven points and then added another 10 in the final chapter to win. Wilson was unanimously voted the game's outstanding player among the National Football League performers after gaining 157 yards on 11 completions.

Southern Oregon and Oregon Tech will meet at Ashland Monday night to open this week's Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball action.

Defending champion Eastern Oregon, which was surprised by an 87-78 loss to Oregon Tech Friday night, snapped back Saturday to defeat OTI, 104-71. Oregon College, after five straight losses, upset Portland State 69-66 in Saturday's other conference game.

All five EOCE starters neared or topped the 20 point mark in Saturday's game at Klamath Falls. Ken Westenskov was high for the winners with 28 points. Dennis Eckert led Oregon Tech with 15.

Portland States Jack Viskov and OCE's Ron Jones tied for scoring honors with 24 points each in the game at Monmouth.

Bing Crosby Open Snared By Cary Middlecoff's 209

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP)—The wandering golfers abandoned the picturesque Monterey peninsula country Monday, some pleased, many disappointed and doubtless the happiest of all was Cary Middlecoff.

The 34-year-old 1949 National Open champion captured the big share of the \$15,000 purse offered by singer Bing Crosby for his 14th annual pro-amateur golfing clambake.

The race for the \$2,500 prize offered the low scoring professionals wasn't even close when the payoff came in the wind swept late afternoon Sunday.

It was Middlecoff by four large strokes—a one-under par 71 for his final thrust, and a 209 for a 54-hole total fashioned from a pair of 69's in the first two rounds.

The nearest to the one-time dentist of Memphis, now from Klamath Lake, N. Y., was another ex-United States Open titleholder, Julius Boros, with 70-71-72—213—and a comparative newcomer, Paul McGuire of Wichita, Kan., with 68-75-70—213—and \$1,250 to each.

Middlecoff set forth over Pebble Beach's mushy 6,701 yards, par 36-38—72 course—later to dry out a bit from the previous day's rain—with a bare one stroke lead over the field.

Capable Stan Leonard of Canada, San Francisco's Bob Rosburg and long hitting Mike Souhak of Durham, N. C., were the nearest rivals at this point. And just a step or so back were Gene Littler, Boros, Doug Ford and other good players.

Roseburg wrestlers returned from Eugene Saturday afternoon after suffering their second consecutive team loss in as many days.

For Roseburg the only team points came on a frosh forfeiture in the 123-pound class to Gil Harvey.

SEATTLE (AP)—Some day you, too, may walk through your back yard, trip over a rock and discover it's pure, pure diamond. Bob Quinn did.

The basketball coach of Eastern Oregon College — that's Bob Quinn — is a rich and happy man who often shudders to think how close he came to overlooking his diamond. And that's Ted Schade-witz, who has made Quinn rich in basketball success and happy in same.

Bob is a charter member of the EOC faculty. He was there when it opened as Eastern Oregon Normal back in 1929. That makes — let's see — more than 20 years he'd been kicking over rocks in search of a diamond, and then it was a fellow instructor who pointed out the sparkle.

One day a physical education teacher hailed Bob and suggested he take a look at a boy who seemed to have an unusual ability to put the ball through the basket. Bob got Ted out for the team and EOC has been the scourge of the Oregon small colleges ever since.

Schade-witz ranked fifth in the Northwest in scoring last year, leading his team to a league championship. This season he's up with the leaders again and caught the public fancy when he scored 51 points one night against Whitman to tie the region's single game record held by Seattle U's fabulous Johnny O'Brien.

Ted was no John-Come-Suddenly. He had played high school basketball in Oregon, then in a California junior college. He enrolled for a time at Eastern Washington College, intending to try for the team, but quit school and returned home. A friend who was headed for EOC talked Ted into going along.

He neglected to tell Mr. Q. he was available, which left Bob Quinn open for the greatest thrill that can come to a coach — discovering a diamond.
