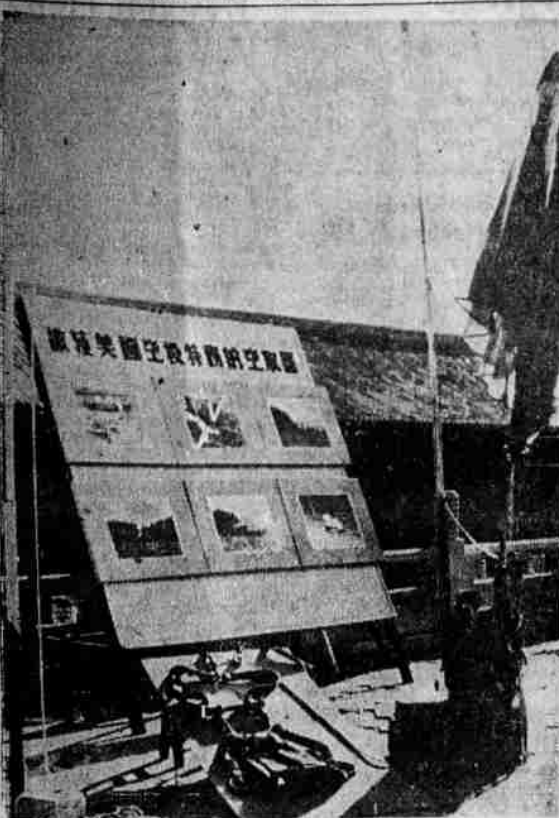

Security System Rapped By Ex-Solon In Ladejinsky Case

SPOKANE (AP) — Former U. S. Sen. Harry P. Cain listed the Ladejinsky case Saturday night as a "conspicuous and inexcusable example in which the nation's security system has failed to work well and fairly."

Cain, now a member of the national Subversive Activities Control Board, returned to the Northwest to address a Fifth Congressional Republican District meeting here.

"You will hear more about Wolf Ladejinsky," he said. "Your political opponents will demand, with justification, that a full explanation of the circumstances and details be spread on the public record."

"This was our (Republican) job to undertake. We were the ones who blundered. It was for us to explain the manner in which the injustice occurred."

"In my view, our security system has worked well and fairly on the average, but conspicuous and inexcusable examples to the contrary have occurred much too often."

Changes Proposed

The Russian-born Ladejinsky, former Soviet Army employee, was discharged from the Department of Agriculture as a security risk last year and was later hired by the Foreign Operations Administration.

Cain listed proposals which he said should make the security set-up work more effectively.

"The inclusion of a higher authority when important or irreconcilable differences develop between department heads in matters of loyalty or internal security; greater care in picking security officers; and use of professional hearing examiners to 'keep the balance we seek between security and justice.'"

Brownell Asks Stiffer Penalties For Traitors

WASHINGTON (AP) — Atty. Gen. Brownell Monday asked Congress to provide much stiffer penalties for advocating violent overthrow of the government and seditious conspiracy.

Under his proposal these and related offenses could be punished by maximum fines of \$50,000 or 20 years imprisonment, or both. He said present penalties for such conspiracy are "entirely inadequate."

The present maximum for conspiracy to seditious—inciting discontent against the government—is \$5,000, six years or both.

The Smith Act, which prohibits teaching or advocating violent overthrow of the government, now provides a fine of \$10,000 or 10 years or both for actual advocacy. It also carries a peak \$10,000 fine, five years or both under the conspiracy section.

Brownell noted in identical letters to Vice President Nixon and House Speaker Rayburn (D-Texas) that the law also makes it mandatory to release prisoners after serving about two-thirds of their sentence if time is allowed for good behavior.

U.N. Sea Hinted Reds' Price To Free 11 Yanks

TOKYO (AP) — Peiping Radio Tuesday intimated that the release of 11 U. S. airmen jailed as spies was tied closely to the question of admitting Red China to the United Nations.

Peiping did not say so directly, but it broadened at some length comments in Indian newspapers on the recent talks between Premier Chou En-Lai and Dag Hammarskjöld, U. N. secretary general, in the Red capital.

The broadcast quoted from the Assam Tribune and said:

"It points out that the convicted Americans are serving out sentences in China, having been judicially convicted of espionage."

"As such, the Chinese Premier was right in holding that the United Nations could have no jurisdiction in this case, especially as, despite its legitimate claims, the Chinese People's Republic has been shut out from the United Nations through the obduracy of the United States of America."

Lewis-Clark Festival Clatsop County's Plan

ASTORIA (AP) — A Committee of civic leaders is making plans for Clatsop County's observance of the 15th anniversary of the Lewis and Clark Expedition.

The exploration party, headed by Meriwether Lewis and William Clark, established a winter camp near here Dec. 7, 1905. Clark described the site in his journal as "in a thick growth of pine on a rise about 30 feet higher than the high tide level" on a creek which here names the Netul. The stream now is called the Lewis and Clark River. It is about seven miles south of what now is Astoria.

Dr. Jorma Leissner of Astoria, chairman of the county committee, said the date of the celebration has not been set. There has been discussion, however, of holding the observance in the late summer, at the same time as the annual Astoria Columbia River Regatta is held.

Don Baxter Given Post In Coast Operators

Don Baxter, former manager of the E. K. Wood Lumber Co. operations near Roseburg, has been elected new vice president of the Oregon Coast Operators.

The group is composed of about 20 lumber and allied companies in southwestern Oregon.

Baxter is currently manager of the E. K. Wood operation in Reedsport.



Mill, Timber Near Roseburg Included In Plywood Deal

NEW YORK (AP) — United States Plywood Corp. Monday formally acquired title to all assets and business of Associated Plywood Mills, Inc., of Oregon, S. W. Antioch, president of U. S. Plywood, and Leonard Nyström, president of Associated, announced here.

For the assets of Associated Plywood, U. S. Plywood paid 276,000 shares of its common stock and 62,804 shares of newly authorized 4 1/2 per cent voting second preferred stock with a par value of \$100 a share.

The assets acquired included two Associated Plywood mills located at Willamina and Eugene, Ore., with a combined productive capacity of 13 million square feet per month; a sawmill near Roseburg, Ore., with a productive capacity of 120,000 square feet per day; and ownership of contractual rights to about 1,100,000,000 feet of timber.

Associated is the original co-operative in the plywood industry on the West Coast. Its sales have been running between 15 and 18 million dollars a year.

Stockholders of Associated Plywood approved the sale last fall, but seven minority stockholders filed suit in federal court in Portland last week, asking an injunction against the sale. They protested Associated Plywood was being sold for about half its value.

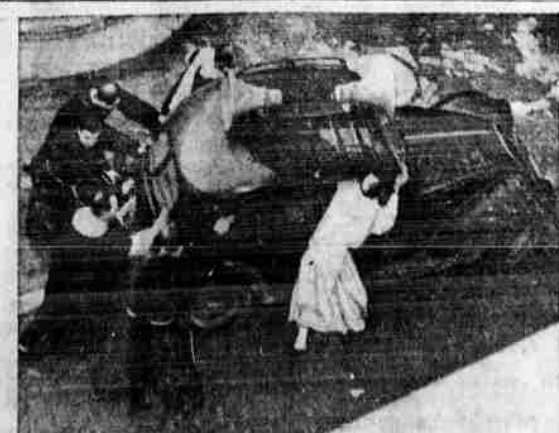
