Poor Grades Puts OSC Students On Probation

CORVALLIS — Twenty-four per cent of the students at Oregon State College dropped below a C average fall term and automatically went on probation, a report by the Academic Deficiency Committee shows.

The total is four per cent higher than a year ago with freshmen having the most trouble.

Fifty-two students were suspended as a result of extremely low grades and 104 were placed on the deferred suspension list.

The automatic probation listing for below C average was established five years ago when college officials felt the need for something stronger than the "warning" notice issued before that time.

One of the effects of probation is that the student is prohibited from holding class or school offices until the grades are brought back above the C—or 2 point level.

Motor Vehicles Show Registration Increase

Registered motor vehicles in Oregon topped three-fourths of a million last year, according to an estimate released by Secretary of State Newberry.

Total number of vehicles registered during the year was set tentatively at 774,801, up 1.6 per cent from the 1953 total.

Passenger car registrations totaled 681,741, a climb of 2.7 per cent over the preceding year. At the same time, 5,580 fewer trucks and 185 fewer buses had been registered throughout 1954.

The driver's license division reported 38,169 applicants were issued original Oregon operator's permits last year and 362,263 licenses were renewed.

Motor Vehicle Revenue Allotted To Counties

SALEM — Oregon counties were given \$2,615,762 Monday as their 19 per cent share of motor vehicle revenues during the last three months of 1954.

The total state collections included \$8,919,697 from gasoline taxes, \$2,909,629 from truck fees, \$1,819,186 from license plate fees, and \$118,656 from fines.

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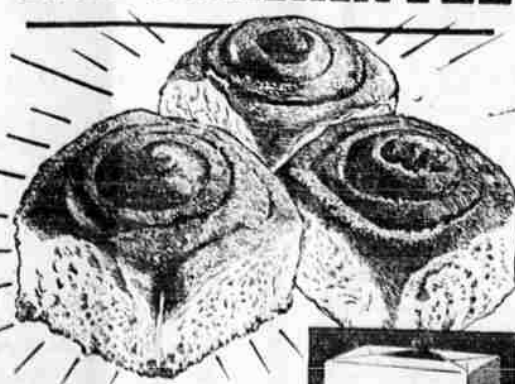
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
