Secretary Wilson Would Increase Trade With Reds

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Wilson called Tuesday for increased free world trade with Communist countries in nonmilitary goods.

He told a congressional committee he would favor a controversial plan for selling surplus American butter to Russia, perhaps in exchange for strategic raw materials such as manganese.

Wilson said many other items could be traded with the Iron Curtain so as to "ultimately strengthen the free world—that should be the test."

He said America would benefit doubly, not only from the actual exchange of goods but also by helping "the people in those countries eliminate their fear and antagonism for our country—we've got to do that ultimately."

Wilson joined Commerce Secretary Weeks in testimony before the House Ways and Means Committee, backing President Eisenhower's program for expanded world trade.

The program would extend the reciprocal trade act for three more years, with power for the President to cut tariffs a total of 15 per cent.

Rep. Harrison (D-Va.) protested it would be "disastrous" if the United States ever became dependent on Communists for supplies such as manganese. Wilson said he would stockpile such items and not eliminate any American production.

Weeks told the committee that although as a manufacturer he believed some protective tariffs are indispensable, he fully supported the administration proposal because the requested reductions "could not work serious harm" on American industry.

The committee opened public hearings on the measure, which is expected to stir strong Republican opposition for the second time.

Cities Of Idaho Want Ceiling On Tax Levy Lifted

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's cities and villages want the ceiling lifted on the taxes they can levy and eventual freedom from rigid state controls.

The case for a proposed "home rule" constitutional amendment and other Idaho Municipal League proposals was supported by President Jason Smith, mayor of Caldwell, and Robertson Smith of Weiser, executive secretary, to the Senate Counties and Municipalities Committee Monday afternoon.

Already introduced in the House are league-sponsored bills to give the cities a larger share of the liquor and highway funds split by counties and cities.

Cities now are limited to a 20-mill general fund levy, and Jason Smith said "99-plus per cent" are levying it. A very few, he said, have revenue left over from the days when slot machines were legal.

He assured the senators that none of them would levy more than absolutely necessary if the law were amended to remove the limitation.

Chinatown's Celebration Geared To Atomic Age

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Chinatown's Lunar New Year celebration will be keyed to the atomic age.

Five thousand shares of uranium mining stock will be given as prizes at a Buddhist temple bazaar at the festivities which welcome the new year on the ancient 13-month Chinese calendar. The stock listed on the San Francisco Mining Exchange, is being offered by a uranium ore producing company. The celebration begins Friday.

Judge Dismisses Key Charges On Owen Lattimore

WASHINGTON (AP) — Judge Luther W. Youngdahl Tuesday threw out the government's new key charges in the Owen Lattimore perjury case.

Youngdahl ruled the accusation that the controversial Far Eastern affairs specialist swore falsely in denying he ever had been a follower of the Communist line or a promoter of Red interests was too vague to define an offense or outline a field for defense.

In different words Youngdahl attributed to the new charges the same fault he found in the government's first accusation that Lattimore perjured himself when he denied he had been a Communist sympathizer or a promoter of Red causes.

The original indictment, making the latter charge among others, was returned in December 1952 as an outgrowth of Lattimore's 12 stormy days as a witness before the Senate internal security subcommittee in its investigation of the Institute of Pacific Relations. Youngdahl dismissed the principal count and three others, and expressed doubt that what he left standing was material.

Measure Asks Convention For Rewriting Constitution

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Paul Patterson's plans to have a convention to write a new state Constitution were introduced Tuesday in the Oregon Senate.

At the same time, the Legislature found out it is going to have an other sales tax battle.

The constitutional convention would be held in July, 1955, and the people would vote in November, 1961, on whether to adopt the new charter document.

Carrying out the wishes of the majority of an interim committee which studied the problem the past 18 months, the bill will provide some hot arguments. The minority wants to change the Constitution by adopting amendments.

Gov. Patterson tried to get the 1953 Legislature to go for his idea, but its answer was to name the interim committee.

The new bill is sponsored by Sen. S. Eugene Allen, Portland. It would provide for 80 delegates to the convention. They would be elected at the 1958 elections.

The bill is similar to one previously introduced by Allen and Sen. Mark Hatfield, Salem, except that one would have 60 delegates, elected in the same manner as state representatives are chosen.

In the new bill, there would be one delegate for each 30,000 persons.
