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Oregon Senators Criticize Ike's Partnership Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oregon Sens. Morse and Neuberger roundly criticized President Eisenhower's budget recommendations for "partnership" construction of Pacific Northwest dams.

Morse, the Senate's lone independent, said the President's budget message was "woefully inadequate to the urgent needs of the Pacific Northwest," for one reason, because he "failed to recommend a multipurpose dam start in the Columbia River Basin."

"In the election this fall," Morse said, "the people of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest voted for new starts and public comprehensive resource development. Obviously the administration is ignoring their expressed will."

"I will work in harness with the Democrats from my region and those who regret that the bipartisan partnership which characterized public power development until recently has been abandoned by the present administration."

Neuberger, Oregon's new Democratic senator, said the proposed budget would hurt the economy of the region.

"The pledge of federal assistance for new hydroelectric development is tied specifically to the discredited partnership scheme, under which private power companies would monopolize the bulk of revenues at the dam...."

"This is a shogun promise, telling the people of the region they must accept partnership or recede themselves to virtually no new projects at all."

...the Bonneville Power Administration, which has been the life line of Northwest hydroelectric production, is to receive only 56 per cent of last year's budget.

"This symbolizes the gradual decline of Bonneville under the present administration, which hopes to see the great federal agency superseded by private power companies," Neuberger said.

Fallen Tree Disrupts Power Service, Halts Cars

A large tree fell across power lines on Cow Creek Road early this week temporarily disrupting service and holding up traffic, reports Glendale News-Review Correspondent Mrs. G. B. Fox.

Power from the California Oregon Power Co. line went out from Cow Creek Canyon and in as far as the station at the mouth of Windy Creek Road, Mrs. Fox said. Charles Riebling, Glendale Copco manager, learned of the accident at 2 a.m., according to the correspondent. He reportedly cleared out the tree by himself to let traffic get by and to stop the power failure. Service was out from 1 a.m. to 10:30 a.m.

By luck, the lines were not broken by the impact, Mrs. Fox said. The tree missed telephone lines by a scant six inches.

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Officers Arrest Otto Loel, 44, On Murder Count

SANFORD, Fla. (AP) — Otto Austin Loel, 44, a former police chief of Sandy, Ore., and one of the FBI's 10 "most wanted men" was arrested here this week.

"I'm glad its over," Loel said as police arrested him in a makeshift palmetto hut on the edge of a swamp where he had been hiding out.

He is accused of stabbing Mrs. Elizabeth Jeanne Henderson of Compton, Calif., in an Oklahoma City motel on Jan. 10, 1954.

Loel refused to discuss the case and U. S. Commissioner James S. Byrd of Orlando ordered him held on \$50,000 bond on a charge of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for murder.

Loel was chief of police at Sandy in 1948. He was the only applicant for the job and the only police record against him was a drunk driving conviction in the East.

When a new mayor took office eight months later Loel was fired. When Mrs. Henderson's body was found in the Oklahoma City motel, search soon started for Loel as the man who was driving to Ohio with her on a share-the-cost deal.

The search turned to Oregon when it was learned that Loel's estranged wife was living at Roseburg with her sister and brother-in-law. But when questioned there

by police, she said she had not seen her husband for some time and assumed he still was in California.

Planning John Day Dam One Of Three Requests

WASHINGTON (AP) — Army Engineers said Tuesday a half million dollars for planning John Day Dam on the Columbia River is one of three Washington State projects included in a lump sum planning request for the year beginning July 1.

The others are \$50,000 for the Shisholme Bay breakwater at Seattle and \$40,000 for flood control at Colfax, Wash.

The engineers also advised Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) the 63½ million dollars asked for construction at the Dalles Dam would permit "under a very tight schedule" completion of the closure dam there during the low water period in 1957 and bring in initial power generation.

An 11 million request for McNary Dam, the corps said, will permit installation of four more generators in the late summer of 1956 and 18 million dollars asked for Chief Joseph Dam will bring power from the first three generators this September.
