

Glide Escapes Epidemic Of Upsets; Oakland Shocks Elkton In 46-44 Tilt

Glide's 50-45 triumph over third-place Yoncalla and three upset results in the opening round of second half play of the Douglas B League Tuesday night gave the Wildcats a sturdy two-game margin over the field.

Unexpected wins by Oakland, Days Creek and Camas Valley produced more upsets in one round last night than had occurred in over two years of play in the circuit.

Oakland pulled the major shocker by handing Elkton its second loss in league play by 46-44 on the losers' floor.

Oakland's win coupled with Days Creek's 49-44 surprise of Riddle tied the Irish and Oakland back in a fourth-place tie.

In a somewhat smaller reversal, Camas Valley moved into a sixth-place tie by beating Canyonville 62-50 in double overtime.

Upset No. 1
Oakland put a serious crimp in Elkton's plans for repeating its Douglas B League hoop title by spilling the Elks 46-44 on the Elkton floor.

In pulling the season's biggest surprise, Oakland had to stave off a last ditch rally by the Elks after manufacturing small quarter leads.

Both teams scored equally from the field, but Oakland hit on 8-18 free throw tries to Elkton's 6-20 in what proved to be the difference in the final score.

After a lead changing first period which ended with Oakland in front 10-9, Elkton pulled away to a 19-13 second period lead.

At this point, Oakland came back to take its 23-21 halftime margin.

Jackie Snyder, with an evening's output of 27 points, proceeded to ruin the Elks in the second half.

He scored eight points in the third period which ended 35-29 for Oakland and 10 more in the final chapter.

In the final minute of play, Elkton went in front 44-43 on Jack Whitfield's field goal. But Snyder's fielder and Carl Rice's free throw clinched the game for Oakland.

Two sudden death overtime free-throws by Camas Valley's Byron Baker gave the home club a 62-60 verdict over Canyonville Tuesday night in a game that was even closer than the final score.

Each team dropped in 23 field goals and the two free throws ultimately proved to be the difference both on and off the scoreboard. Each team was called for 21 fouls.

Canyonville led 13-8 after one period, Camas Valley was in front 29-27 at halftime and Canyonville led 41-39 after three quarters.

Through regulation play which ended 56-56, the Tigers appeared to have the jump on the Hornets, but Camas struggled back throughout to stay in contention.

It was the tigers, however, who were forced to come from behind both at game's end and after the first overtime period to tie the tugs up.

Bulldogs Shake Loose In Final Quarter To Win
Douglas held Sutherlin's high-scoring forwards Ron Rix and Carl Bay in tow for better than half the ball game, but Bay shook loose for six points in the third period and Hix contributed a 16-point fourth quarter to lead the Bulldogs to a 49-39 decision.

Both teams found trouble shooting in the early stages of the game. Sutherlin was also plagued by a tough Douglas man-to-man defense that found guard Billy Knuzik housing six scorers for three quarters of the game. Bay was kept in check by center Brent Strickland and tallied but two field goals in the entire first half.

The home team could not take advantage of Sutherlin's scoring lapses, however, and trailed by small margins most of the way. Sutherlin led 12-7 at one quarter and 19-14 at halftime.

In the third period, Sutherlin took a greater share of rebounds and with Bay's three-goal spurt moved ahead 33-24.

Douglas struggled back and at one point late in the fourth chapter trailed only 35-32. But with two minutes to go, Hix, who made Sutherlin's entire final period output on six field goals and four free throws, turned the tide.
