Dulles, Hammarskjold Talk; US To Abstain From Any Action During Negotiating

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Dulles told United Nations Secretary Dag Hammarskjold Wednesday that for the time being the United States will abstain from any "direct action" which might hinder U.N. efforts to obtain the release of American airmen imprisoned in Red China.

In a lengthy conference at the State Department, Hammarskjold told Dulles he hopes it will be possible, with "restraint on all sides," to effect the release of the men.

He said he had obtained assurances from China's Communist rulers "regarding the well-being" of the prisoners. The State Department said his assurances will be transmitted to the families of the men through the Defense Department.

Dulles and several aides met with Hammarskjold for about 90 minutes. The State Department then made a statement on the conference.

Hammarskjold himself, upon emerging from the conference, only said tersely, "I have nothing to say."

He told newsmen he planned to leave for New York at once.

The U.N. official was invited to Washington by Dulles for a face-to-face report on his efforts on a trip to Peking to obtain freedom for the men this country says were convicted on trumped-up spy charges.

The State Department release disclosed that Dulles thanked Hammarskjold, on behalf of President Eisenhower and himself, for his "painstaking efforts," and expressed the hope that they will prove successful.

While Hammarskjold and an aide were closeted with the secretary of state, Eisenhower at a news conference said the U.N. secretary general should have a full chance to do everything he can toward getting the Americans out.

So long as negotiations are going on, the President said at his news conference, he does not consider them a failure. He thus sided with Secretary of State Dulles in rejecting the contention of Senate Republican Leader Knowland of California that Hammarskjold's recent mission to Peking had failed.

The President's meeting with newsmen came only a few hours after a White House breakfast conference with the Senate Republican leader.

Knowland, said he and Eisenhower exchanged views on "various problems" both foreign and domestic, but he would not say whether efforts to obtain the release of the American airmen came up.

The senator has been demanding that no major concessions for the Red Chinese be permitted in connection with the case of the men imprisoned as spies. The breakfast visit offered him an opportunity to try to gain support from the President if he chose to take it.

Eisenhower said that of course the negotiations cannot be termed successful until the Americans are safely returned to their homes, but they are certainly not a failure.

He said that he never believes in calling a battle a failure so long as there is one man on the firing line.

The President said that as long as the character of Hammarskjold is making progress then he should be given time in work on the problem. He added the Hammarskjold ought to have a full chance to do what he can.

Nixon Returns To Gas Pump To Kickoff Drive

WASHINGTON — Vice President Nixon Wednesday returned to his first job, a filling station attendant, to help kick off the March of Dimes campaign to fight polio.

While he was in high school, and in the summers during his first years in college, Nixon helped in his father's store and filling station. He proved he hadn't lost his touch.

The big government-owned, chauffeur-driven Cadillac pulled into the driveway. Nixon got out, shed his topcoat and suit coat, put on a filling station attendant's mackinaw, and announced that as soon as he understood these new-fangled gas pumps, he was ready for business.

"Our pumps were different," he said. "They were tall, with the gas up at the top. You'd watch the gas, and cut it off when it had reached the right number of gallons. There was no automatic computing machine then either. You had to be able to add and subtract."

Just in case anyone remained skeptical, Nixon added: "I've changed a few tires, too, but I'm not going to do that today."

Well, an attendant explained what gadgets to punch, and three girls in a convertible, who had been waiting around for that purpose, pulled up for service.

Well, in spite of the fact it was cold and windy in Washington, Nixon spent almost 30 minutes at his job. During the time, he posed with a couple of polio victims, Carol Vitiello, age 5, and Alice Diggs, 3.

Finally Nixon said, "I gotta meet some people," shook hands all around, climbed into his Cadillac and left.
