

Port Townsend May Be Site For Military Home

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash. (AP)—Word the Veterans Administration is considering establishing a national military home here Wednesday brightened hopes of an economic revival in this Olympic Peninsula community.

Port Townsend hit the nation's front pages a year ago when President Eisenhower, answering an appeal from Mrs. Carl Foster, sent the assistant director of Defense Mobilization for Manpower here to see what could be done to help the city, hard hit economically by the Army decision to close Ft. Worden and nearby Ft. Flager.

There were few lasting benefits, however, and Port Townsend officials said there was no sign of continued interest until the arrival here Tuesday of Marvin Chapman, director of homes for the Veterans Administration, and a delegation of VA officials.

After a survey of the town and Ft. Worden, Chapman said the group was studying the possibility of locating a military home here but refused comment "at all on what we have seen and learned."

T. Otis Black, area information chief for the VA, said Tuesday's survey included a study of the former military post, the town, housing, schools, hospitals and whatever else "would be required for a decent living in the event the VA establishes a facility here."

Black said the decision to send Port Townsend in its survey resulted from a request from Rep. Westland (R-Wash.).

Two-Price Plan For Wheat Parity Being Considered

WASHINGTON (AP)—A two-price support plan for wheat, designed to give growers full parity for wheat sold for food in this country, was proposed Wednesday by Rep. Hope (R-Kan.).

A similar plan was presented last year by Hope, then chairman of the House Agriculture Committee and now its senior GOP member. It was approved then by the House as part of the general farm bill, but failed to pass the Senate.

Hope's proposal, to be submitted to the House again this year, would provide wheat farmers with full parity on that portion of their crop sold for human consumption at home. The remainder would be sold in the world market at prevailing competitive prices without government support.

Parity is a figure said by law to give farmers a fair return in relation to their costs.

Under present law, wheat may be supported at from 82 1/2 per cent to 90 per cent of parity.

"There would be little or no cost to the government, Hope said in a statement.

There would be no loss in connection with the domestic food quota, and the availability of wheat at relatively low price for export purposes would render export subsidies unnecessary. It would permit the United States to sell wheat at the world market price without absorbing the loss of the difference between the domestic support price and the world price, which now amounts to about 65 cents a bushel.

He said his plan would stabilize income of American wheat producers while lessening restrictions on production, with no acreage controls imposed.

Hope's plan would be subject to a grower referendum.

Pentagon Submits Proposed Boosts For Military Pay

WASHINGTON (AP)—The most far-reaching revision of military pay schedules to be proposed in years was submitted to Congress this week by the Pentagon, which estimated it would cost nearly 730 million dollars in the next fiscal year.

The program spelled out details of President Eisenhower's recommendation to Congress last week that steps be taken to make career military service more attractive and to halt the loss of experienced officers and men.

The Pentagon says the program was designed specifically to encourage good men to stay in service at periods in their careers when they might be most tempted to shed their uniforms. Besides pay boosts of up to 25 per cent, it calls for extra bonuses for dangerous duty and additional allowances to members of the regular forces.

No increases would go to any enlisted man until he had served at least two years nor to any officer until after three years of service.

United Air Lines Opposes West Coast Application

WASHINGTON (AP)—United Air Lines has raised new objections to a West Coast Airlines' proposal to provide nonstop service between Spokane and the Pasco-Kennewick-Richland area of Washington State.

A brief filed this week with the Civil Aeronautics Board said West Coast provided only change of schedules in an amended application handed to the board.

United said West Coast would become more of a trunk line operation, not a local service, if it is permitted to overfly Walla Walla, Lewiston-Clarkston, Pullman-Moscow and Coeur d'Alene on the Spokane-Pasco route. This would be contrary to CAB policy, United said.

Idaho Lumber Workers Accept Wage Increase

LEWISTON, Idaho (AP)—Between 2,600 and 2,800 employees of Potlatch Forests Inc. will receive a 7 1/2-cent hourly wage increase under an agreement reached here Tuesday.

The agreement, to cover the firm's mills at Lewiston, Potlatch, Coeur d'Alene and Pierce and woods operations at Headquarters and Bovill, followed recommendations made by the governor's lumber panel. The contract will be closed to April 1, 1956 on all issues.

"We followed the pattern set in the industry," said George Beardmore, attorney for PFI.

Representatives of Idaho locals of the CIO Woodworkers union sat in on the negotiations along with district, regional and national officers.

A. F. Hartung, president of the union, announced from Portland that the Pack River Lumber Co. of Sandpoint, Idaho, has also agreed to the recommended wage hike, subject to approval of the local.

Fireman's 3 Children Suffocate In Blaze

SOUTH AMBOY, N. J. (AP)—Three young children of a fireman, including a pair of twins, suffocated early Wednesday in a blaze that swept their frame home here.

The victims were Geraldine and Jacqueline Deliman, both 4 and their 2-year-old brother, Raymond Jr.

Their father, Raymond, 38, suffered first and second degree burns as flames tore through the two-story dwelling.

His wife, who had been sleeping downstairs with a one-month-old daughter, fled to safety with the infant. They were unhurt.

Bill Proposes Bigger Take From Horse Races

SALEM (AP)—The state will get a bigger take of pari-mutuel betting at race meets, if a bill introduced in the House Tuesday is approved.

A proposal by Reps. Richard E. Groener, Milwaukie, and Robert T. Klemens, St. Helens, would increase the state's percentage of wagering. It would give the state and county fairs, as well as some special shows, more money.

The bill would start the graduated scale of the state's share of betting receipts at 5 per cent, with a top levy of 7 per cent. It now runs from 3 to 6 per cent.

Groener said the fees would be in line with those of Washington and California.

Holiday Apple Meringue Cake
1/2 pkc. white cake mix
2 eggs whites
1/2 cup sugar
Pinch of salt
1/4 tsp. cream of tartar
3 red apples
2 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup water

Follow directions given on white cake mix package for making one 8-inch layer cake. Spoon batter into greased pan. Beat egg whites until frothy. Sift sugar with salt and cream of tartar and gradually add to egg whites. Continue beating until mixture will stand in peaks. Swirl meringue over unbaked cake. Bake cake according to directions given on the package. While cake bakes, peel and core red apples, cut in eighths. Melt butter in heavy saucepan or frying pan and stir in sugar and water. Bring to a boil and drop in apples. Simmer gently, turning occasionally until barely tender. Allow to cool in sirup. Turn cake out of pan and cool on wire rack. Meringue side up. When cake is cool, arrange apple slices in even rows on meringue and pour sirup from cooking apples over.

Moravian Christmas Cookies
4 cups sifted flour
1 cup plus 2 tablespoons brown sugar, firmly packed
2 teaspoons cinnamon
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1 cup butter or margarine
1 cup molasses
1/2 teaspoon vinegar
Measure flour, sugar, cinnamon, salt and baking soda into sifter. Sift 3 times into medium-sized bowl. Cut in butter or margarine until mixture is the texture of

coarse corn meal. Add molasses and vinegar. Stir until thoroughly blended. Cover bowl. Chill dough until very firm. Roll chilled dough, a small amount at a time, to about 1/4-inch thickness on lightly floured board. Cut with floured reindeer and Santa Claus cookie cutters. Place on greased cookie sheet. Bake in moderate oven, 350 deg. F. 8 to 10 minutes, or until edges are slightly crisp. Run spatula under cookies to loosen. Remove to wire cake racks to cool. Trim. Yield: about 4 dozen.

Holiday Lime - Pineapple Molds (Serves 6)

1 cup sirup from canned pineapple
1/4 cup water
1 package lime-flavored gelatin
1/3 cup Sauterne or other white table wine
2 tablespoons fresh lime juice
1/4 cup sugar
Dash of salt
Green food coloring
1 cup diced canned pineapple (use pineapple tidbits or "dice" slices with scissors)
1 cup finely cut celery
1/2 cup finely chopped walnuts
Heat pineapple sirup and water to simmering; add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Remove from heat. Add wine, lime juice, sugar and salt; stir to dissolve sugar. Tint mixture a deep green with food coloring. Cool, then chill. When mixture begins to thicken, fold in pineapple, celery and nuts. Spoon into 6 individual molds or custard cups that have been rinsed with cold water. Chill until firm. Unmold on crisp salad greens and serve with mayonnaise or a fruit salad dressing.

County's 1954 Bond Sales Exceed Quota

Douglas County has passed its 1954 quota for sales of E and H Savings Bonds, it was announced today by County Chairman George Luoma in his annual report.

County sales for 1954 were \$861,539, or 101.3 per cent of quota. December sales were \$43,628.

Sales in the entire state during 1954 surpassed the previous year by 28 per cent, the highest annual sale since 1949. The national gain was 12 per cent, with sales totalling \$4,889,119,000. Total E and H redemptions in matured and unmatured bonds were \$4,444,467,000.

State Chairman Ted Gamble noted that "This steady trend toward individual savings is of vital importance to a stable economy in the state."

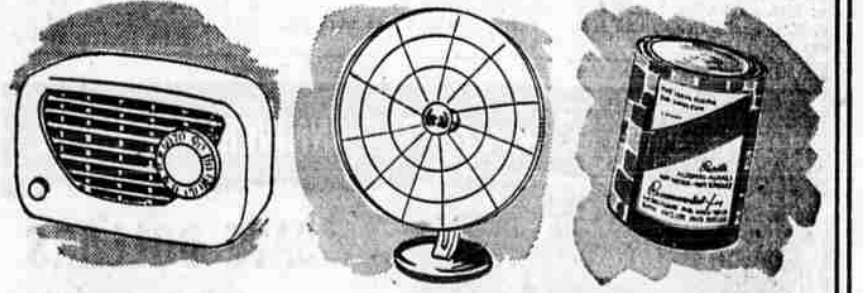
