Skinner Injured Fatally While Fighting Blaze

SAN PEDRO, Calif. (AP) — Capt. Hans Birkland, 57, Seattle, Skipper of the Navy auxiliary tanker Saugatuck, was fatally injured Tuesday while directing the fighting of a small fire aboard ship.

Police reported that the Saugatuck, loaded with aviation gasoline for Guam, was about to clear the breakwater in Los Angeles harbor for the open sea when fire broke out in a bridge lighting circuit.

Capt. Birkland ordered his ship stopped and the anchor dropped.

He was directing a fire fighting crew when, crossing from the chart room to a forward deck, he slipped and fell down a ladder,

Myrtle Creek 4-H Members Select New Club Project

The 24 members of the Myrtle Creek Tree Toppers are starting a club project new to Douglas County.

Members spent a day in the wooded areas near Myrtle Creek recently to determine what would be the project for their 4-H forestry club.

With county agent Ed Gilden and 4-H agent Frank von Borstel, the boys visited each member's home and inspected the farm woodlands. After the tour they decided to carry a forest management project.

According to Golden this means the members will actually complete a phase of forest management on their woodlands or on an adjoining neighbor's land.

During their day-long tour, the boys made a reproduction survey of logged off land that had regrown to Madrona. Gilden said they actually determined which areas should be replanted, and which would be restocked by nature.

The club is led by two Myrtle Creek teachers, John Haakason and Merle Barkhurst.

New Postmaster At Winchester To Be Appointed

Applications are now open for postmaster of the Winchester Post Office. They will be received until Feb. 8, according to the U.S. Civil Service Commission.

The new postmaster will replace Mrs. Monroe Nance, who has retired from the job. Acting postmaster now is Katherine Weckerle.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of the test and their experience, ability and character. A one-year residence requirement is demanded. Applicants must be at least 21 years old and less than 63. The wage is \$3,400.

Complete information about the examination and applications may be obtained at the post office there.

Whipped evaporated milk makes a delicious topping for desserts. Here's the easy recipe for Whipped Milk Topping.

1/2 cup evaporated milk, chilled
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 cup sifted confectioners sugar or granulated sugar

Whip chilled milk until it is stiff and will hold a peak. Add lemon juice and whip just to blend thoroughly. Fold in sugar. If not used immediately, chill topping until ready to serve. When kept chilled, topping will hold up well from 45 minutes to an hour.

VANILLA OR ALMOND: If desired, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract or 1/4 teaspoon almond extract may be added to Whipped Milk Topping.

Bottom of Pan: Pit prunes and cut into quarters. Rinse and drain raisins. Combine pineapple juice, brown sugar and butter in bottom of 10-inch iron skillet and rices and walnuts, and sprinkle Arrange prune quarters and pine-

apple, pieces in bottom of pan; combine raisins, quartered cherries and walnuts; and sprinkle over prunes and pineapple.

Batter: Cream shortening and sugar together; add lightly beaten eggs and beat well. Sift together flour, salt, baking powder and spices. Add to creamed mixture alternately with milk. Pour batter over fruit in skillet. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) about 1 hour and 5 minutes. Remove from oven and let stand 5 minutes. Loosen sides with spatula or knife and invert over large plate. Serve warm. Top with whipped cream if desired.

Barbecued Pork On Buns

1 cup diced leftover pork

1/2 cup catsup
2 tablespoons brown sugar
2 tablespoons vinegar
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Heat ingredients together in a sauce pan and serve between split toasted buns. Serve with carrot curls, celery sticks and ripe olives. Serves 3.
