Water Problem Aired At Meeting In Myrtle Creek

An area adjoining Myrtle Creek to the south appeared closer to a decision on annexation to the city today.

Only three members of the 10-man Myrtle Creek Planning Commission turned up at a meeting this week, but eight of the nine members of a committee for water to a new area were on hand.

The major question at the meeting was whether it would be necessary or not for the area (Herman's addition and its environs) to come into the city to get water. The popular answer, according to correspondent Ruth M. Evans, was that it probably would be necessary. The possibility of buying water in bulk drew little support.

The City Planning Commission members suggested that this area draw up boundaries and determine how many homes are in the area and how many would hook up to a water system. They then suggested the information be taken to the county court with a petition for annexation.

The decision on this suggestion is expected to be determined at a meeting of property owners of the area who want water. The meeting is scheduled Tuesday, Jan. 25, at 7 p.m. in the Super V Market.

According to the city engineer, the approximate cost of laying mains in the area would be \$35,000. He said it would probably take about 13,900 feet of pipe. Mrs. Evans said about 150 homes would hook to the system.

Two members of the Tri-City area were also on hand for the meeting. One, Clark Stokes, said the area is in the process of forming a water district. It will buy water in bulk from Myrtle Creek if plans are completed. He said the district would have an assessed valuation of about \$600,000.
