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GROUND OBSERVER CORPS PRESENTS PROGRAM FOR WOMAN'S CLUB

A large group of members and guests attended the Roseburg Woman's Club meeting Tuesday, to hear a presentation of the work and needs of the local Ground Observer Corps. Mrs. E. L. Teater, supervisor of the G.O.C. in Roseburg, introduced Arthur McGuire, county coordinator, who in turn presented the speakers.

Mrs. Arthur Selby gave a lively account of her recent trip to Los Angeles, Calif., with her husband. The two served as representatives of G.O.C. work in the Western Defense Area. She told of radio and television appearances, and of press interviews arranged for them, to stimulate understanding of and interest in G.O.C. work. Mr. Selby also discussed their trip and G.O.C. activity. Mr. and Mrs. Selby's present record of 13,791 hours service attests to their vital interest in the G.O.C.

Lt. Berry and Sgt. Jensen then presented a film showing the activity of the Air Force in China in the Second World War, where observation posts manned by Chinese gave valuable assistance to the Flying Tigers. The film gave a vivid picture of the difficulties overcome by the services in transporting gas, oil, equipment and all other supplies over the tremendous labor of building advance posts in Eastern China, where all the work was done by hand; of the Japanese drive which later made necessary the destruction of those posts, and of the bitter fighting and sudden death common to fliers in the area, were a sharp reminder of the value of preparedness such as the G.O.C. offers. Lt. Berry's comments preceding the film's presentation, and McGuire's timely remarks at its conclusion brought home the need of more workers in the Ground Observer Corps.

A number of G.O.C. workers attended the meeting and were presented to the group. At the conclusion, Mrs. Teater presented Mrs. Frank Ashley, W.C. representative for the G.O.C., with the wings emblematic of her service in the corps.
