

Roseburg DAR Reviews Philanthropic Work

The Umpqua Chapter of DAR met at the home of Mrs. Victor Micelli at 600 East Washington Street for a buffet luncheon Saturday, with Mrs. C. D. Albright and Mrs. W. Hughes assisting. Mrs. Micelli's home was attractively decorated with Jasmine, which gave a note of spring.

Mrs. Cecilia Day, secretary, read the minutes of the preceding meeting which were approved. Mrs. Banning, chairman of national defense committee urged members to help on the ground observer corps if they possibly could. Mrs. Albright reported that the contributions and gifts for both the Navajo and Celio Indians at Christmas time had been a success, and that another box would be sent to each group sometime this spring. She stated that \$219.75 had been contributed to Chemawa from all the state chapters, and that a radio and magazines were purchased for the school. Also each child at Chemawa had received either new or good used clothing. Approximately sixty-five dollars were spent for gifts and staple groceries for the Celio Indians which are located on the Columbia river near The Dalles. Clothing and many fur pieces were also distributed to this group. Mrs. Al-

bright also asked all members to read the article "The Indians are Going to Town," which is published in the January issue of The Readers Digest.

Mrs. Lester Nielson, regent of Umpqua Chapter, gave a report on the recent meeting of the State Board of Management of DAR, which was held at the Aero Club in Portland. She reported on the Indian welfare work which was completed for Christmas, for the Chemawa School and the Celio Indians, and the Americanization work accomplished for the new citizens. The research was finished on the Robert Newell home, at Chamawee Village, which the State DAR expect to restore for a historic shrine. Plans were made for the coming state conference, to be held in Portland, Feb. 27 to March 1, at which time the President General, Miss Gertrude Carroway of South Carolina, of the National Society will be the honored guest.

Mrs. Nielson reported that Feb. 19 Umpqua Chapter will have its annual Colonial Silver Tea which will be open to the public. The interesting feature of this tea will be the unusual display of colonial articles and items pertaining to historical interest which will be furnished by the members. The members will wear colonial costumes.

Mrs. Nielson, regent, with Mrs. Cecilia Day, delegate and Mrs. C. D. Albright, alternate, plan to attend the State Conference in Portland. Mrs. Nielson and Mrs. Earl Wiley, vice regent, also plan to attend the National Continental Conference which will be held in Washington, D. C. April 19.

Dr. James Millar was to be the guest speaker for the afternoon, but due to illness he was unable to attend. He will speak on "Patriotism in the Home" at a later date.

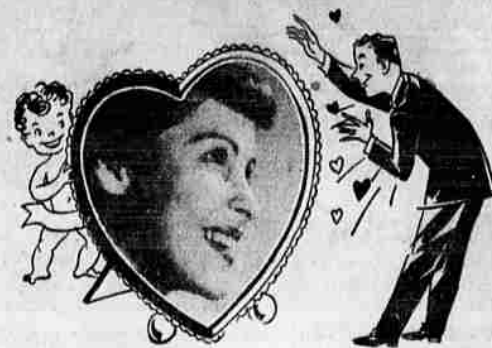
