Following a short business session, a panel discussion was held on the question of student guidance. Taking part in the discussion were: W. T. Johnson, moderator; Dr. James Millar, Virgil Vance, Paul Hult, Mrs. Don Lakey, Mrs. Margaret McCord and students, Dexter Sims and Roger Davidson.

Calling attention to the fact that the topic was not a new question, but one that has been uppermost in the minds of educators throughout the years, the moderator stated that the evening's discussion would approach it from a slightly different angle, that of "happier marriages" and more efficient workers.

Dr. Millar, as first speaker, emphasized the statement that guidance in marriage was of utmost importance. He enlarged upon the questions of "When are you going to marry?" and "How will you go about choosing a life partner?"

"Other questions closely related," said Dr. Millar, "are what are you going to do and what are you going to be with regard to character and skills."

Mrs. Lakey, as a homemaker, stressed the duty of the parents who are the first in the line of child guidance, and emphasized the importance of proper guidance and example in the home.

Mrs. McCord, representing the PTA, felt that the co-ordination of a good organization with the school and the home could be of great benefit to the youth in solving their problems. She called attention to the very worthwhile radio programs presented for assistance in school and home problems concerning youth.

Paul Hult, speaking from the viewpoint of a business man, said youngsters should be taught responsibility so they would know how to do an honest day's work. Education is important, as skilled labor is required in these days to handle

groups at one time. The boys also felt that the parents should take more interest in school activities. They would like to see a trend towards greater exchange of confidences between parents and youth.

In summing up the discussion, Dr. Millar asserted that he felt everyone should know how to work with his hands, in addition to acquiring the broadest education he could obtain and that each individual should strive to work at the things he felt happiest doing. Success does not necessarily mean having or making a lot of money. It is better to work in beginning years for someone who is interested in you as an individual than for someone who is interested only in your productive power. Regarding the topic of juvenile delinquency, Dr. Millar stated, "I never use the term, in my thinking there are only adult delinquents." Social responsibility, he continued, is of utmost importance, especially on the part of prominent citizens, who offer an example. To assume responsibility and to acquire ability to get along with people, he concluded, are very important.
