

Chairman Wants Clear No Formosa Appeasement
WASHINGTON (AP) — Chairman Richards (D-SC) of the House Foreign Affairs Committee Saturday urged the administration to make it clear that there is no "appeasement, fear or weakness" in its Formosa policy.
Instead, he said, any shift of Chinese Nationalist defensive forces from the Tachens or other islands in the Formosa area should be coupled with a warning that "if new lines are established as

the best military perimeter for the defense of Formosa, we will defend it, by arms if necessary, and retreat no farther."
Richards added in an interview he believed President Eisenhower now has sufficient authority, as commander in chief of the armed forces, to use American air and sea forces in covering a shift of Nationalist defense forces if that becomes necessary.

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Prisoner's Wife Can't Afford Trip

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — "I would like to go but I can't afford it," the wife of an American airman imprisoned as a spy by the Chinese Communist said.

That was the reaction of Mrs. Tina Schmidt, 20, when advised that Premier Chou En-Lai had announced that relatives of 17 Americans could visit them in Chinese jails.

Her husband, Cpl. Daniel Schmidt, formerly of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, and Portland, Ore., is one of 13 American airmen held by the Chinese.

Mrs. Schmidt, who clerks at a Boise store, said she thought the government should help those not financially able to make the trip "because it was this government they were fighting for."

Mrs. Schmidt said she had not heard from her husband since last November, and had received no further word from the State Department since she was notified officially of his imprisonment.

Israeli Bargain Hunters Looking Over Equipment

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP) — Two bargain hunters from the Israeli government are here to look over 24 million dollars worth of construction equipment declared surplus by the Aluminum Co. of Canada.

The equipment was used in Alcan's three-year project building a smelter-powerhouse development at Kitimat and Kemano, B. C., 400 miles north of here.

Chanan Yavor, delegate of the ministry of agriculture and Major Aron Leshem of the public works department, flew north to Kitimat Friday.

They said their country needs everything they've seen of the equipment so far, and would like to buy it all "if the price is right."
"If it's suitable," Major Leshem said, "we might take most of it. Major item of course is the condition and the price."

The machinery is needed in Israel's expansion projects, a program that has entailed expenditure of 350 million dollars in the last five years.

They are bargaining with S & S Machinery Co., New York firm commissioned by Alcan to dispose of the equipment.

Mother Sees Little Hope Of Seeing Prisoner Son

PORTLAND (AP) — The mother of an American airman imprisoned by Red China "would like to see my boy" but entertains no thought that she will be able to visit him.
She is Mrs. Nellie V. Peters, mother of Airman 2-c Daniel C. Schmidt. She said here in commenting on announcement that the Chinese were willing to let relatives visit 17 jailed Americans, the cost would rule it out. That same reason was given by Schmidt's wife in Boise.

Latest word from Schmidt was a letter to his sister here, Mrs. Donald V. Dehle, received last week. In it he said his bed was made up of one-inch boards nailed together to make a cot 6 feet long and 30 inches wide. He asked about current boxing champions, of plans he had in mind for a house someday but "mostly he talked about how he would like to get home to his wife," Mrs. Dehle said.
