Feed Store Loses Ruling On Discharged Employees

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A recommendation that the Monroe (Ore.) Feed Store be directed to rehire two employees and stop trying to discourage union membership has been submitted by a National Labor Relations Board trial examiner.

William E. Spencer, the examiner, said evidence showed that the company fired Frank and Don Harrington, brothers, last March because of union activities with the AFL Grain Millers locals.

He recommended that the brothers be re-employed and compensated for any wages they may have lost.

Election Or Appointment To Jobs Oregon Issue

In our complicated civilization even elective officers are not truly known by the people but are often elected because they talk louder, and more often than their opponents.

The move to take the Motor Vehicle Department away from the secretary of state's office and make it an independent department, with a head appointed by the governor, is another trend toward coordinating the executive office with its functioning agencies.

There has long been a move in the nation to make judgeships less dependent on political campaigns and billboards and more closely tied into the record and ability of the jurist involved.

On the other hand, there is a bill in to make the Public Utilities Commissioner an elective office and not subject to appointment, and today a bill was dropped in to make the clerk of the Supreme Court elective.

If we trust our governor, we can surely trust him to make sensible appointments — or at least so say all of us who happen to approve of the present governor. Perhaps we might feel differently if the "man of our choice" weren't in the driver's seat.
