#### Three Children Perish In Reservation Blaze

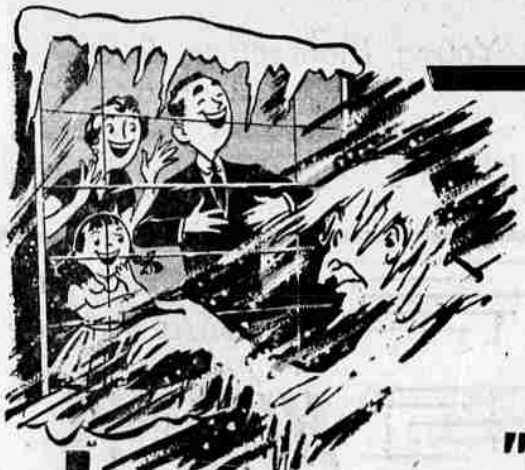

Mr. and Mrs. Hall and four other children were away when the fire broke out.



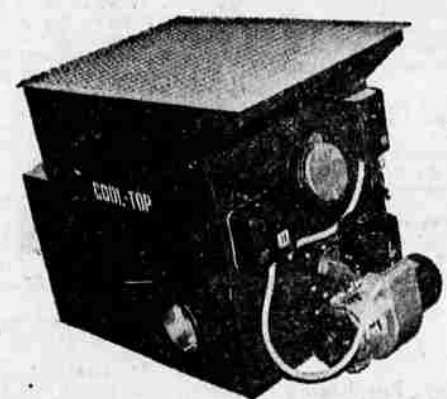
