San Francisco Quint Edges Into Second Place On Poll

Kentucky stayed well out in front in the weekly Associated Press basketball poll rankings today, but the other members of the top 10 underwent a thorough shuffling.

The Wildcats, rated the nation's No. 1 team for the sixth straight week, collected 1,037 points on the basis of 10 points for the first 9 for second, etc. Of the 114 sports writers and sportscasters participating in the poll, 67 selected Kentucky for first place. The Wildcats beat Tennessee and Louisiana State last week to make their record 11-1.

New Baseball Rules To Cut Down Freedom Of Pitchers

CHICAGO (AP) — The intentional pass may be boomerang with a hit or a balk this season under a new baseball rule whacking the catcher's box from 16 feet of roaming room to only 43 inches.

That change and a "stopwatch" mandate for a pitcher to deliver within 20 seconds when the sacks are empty are the foremost of some 49 revisions this year by baseball's official Playing Rules Committee.

The changes were disclosed today by Jim Gallagher, business manager of the Chicago Cubs, who serves as chairman of the nine-man committee.

The catcher's box will be reduced to a rectangular area, 43 inches wide directly behind home plate, which is 17 inches wide. The former triangular catcher's box flared back to a 16-foot width.

A wild pitcher might thereby toss one that a long-limbed hitter like Ted Williams could smash for a hit.

If the catcher gets outside his 43-inch box before the ball leaves the pitcher's hand, a balk will be called.

The rule prodding pitchers to hurl within 20 seconds with the bases unoccupied long has been the books, but now both the American and National Leagues are being asked to enforce it by use of a stopwatch by the third base umpire.

The penalty is calling of a "balk" by the umpire. The rule is directed against "senseless and unnecessary delays."

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Tired Willie Top 1954 Pro

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — After playing about 240 baseball games in the last 10 months, Willie Mays said today he is "tired of going to the ball park" and won't play winter ball next year.

The New York Giants' sensational center fielder, who received the \$10,000 Hickock belt last night

as "pro athlete" of 1954, doesn't think his strenuous action will hurt his play in 1955.

Back To P.R.

In fact, he plans to return to Puerto Rico where he has been playing with the pennant-winning Santurce team, to take part in the playoffs next week.

"I'm not physically tired," he said. "But I'd like to relax and forget all about baseball. I'm going back because the owner of the club (Santurce) has been so nice to me. Four or five more games won't hurt me but you can't keep this up every year."

Mays didn't want to discuss his reported fight with Giant teammate Ruben Gomez except to say "there was nothing to it. Gomez is like a brother to me, a buddy."

As for '55, Mays isn't making any predictions.

"I never figured to hit .345 last year and I don't figure to do it again," he said. "I just want to get off to a good start. Then you can pace yourself."

Had No Idea

"I never did have any ideas of beating Babe Ruth's home run record. I wasn't even thinking about it. The reason I stopped going for the home runs in August was I wasn't doing the club any good that way. He finished with 41 homers, 19 short of the record."

Mays modestly refused to accept Manager Leo Durocher's recent statements that Willie is a better player than Stan Musial and probably one of the all-time greats.

"Musial is a great player," said Mays. "He has been through what I've got to go through. I'm young, (23) in seven or eight years, if I'm around that long, then will be the time to compare me and Musial."

Mays received the award at the annual pep fund benefit dinner of the Rochester Press-Radio Club.

Medford Climbs Into First Spot On Hoop Ballot

Medford, after barely being nosed out last week, was not to be denied this week, and moved to the top of the Associated Press poll on Oregon high school basketball teams.

Medford wallowed Klamath Falls twice over the weekend to extend its record to 13-1. That brought the Southern Oregon team first-place votes from 10 of the 14 sports writers taking part in the poll.

Eugene upset last week, was upset by Albany, 52-38, and lost much support. Eugene picked up only one vote for first place and fell to the No. 4 position. Eugene's record now is 10-2.

Milwaukie, defending state champion, got three votes for stop spot and moved into the No. 2 position with 121 points in the voting to Medford's 134. Milwaukie was No. 3 last week.

North Bend, a team that has more wins than any other in the state, moved up from fourth to third place with 90 points. North Bend trounced Myrtle Point twice last week. North Bend has a 14-1 record.

Trailing North Bend in order were Eugene, Albany, St. Helens, Cleveland of Portland, Astoria and Pendleton. All these were in the top 10 last week.

Biggest Gain

Albany made the biggest gain after upsetting Eugene. Albany moved up from eighth to fifth place. The only undefeated team, St. Helens, held even, while Cleveland dropped from fifth to seventh after being downed by Franklin of Portland.

Astoria moved up a notch to No. 8, while South Salem dropped from No. 7 to No. 9 after being defeated by Milwaukie. Pendleton held even in 10th place.

Sideliner

At the risk of taking the stand of "preacher," we note the article entitled "That Man With the Whistle" which appears in the Northwest Rod Magazine section of last Sunday's Oregonian.

The story takes up the basketball ref's position as he is regarded by spectators at games. Its summary is that "most crowds boo" because: 1. They are seeing a play from a different view. (Line of vision is not the same from the bleachers or floor, long distance or closeup.) 2. Blind loyalty to the team that a fan does not want defeated or is not willing to see defeated.

A NOTEWORTHY closing surmises that "the official realizes that he's 50 per cent wrong on every call. If one-half the crowd agrees with him, the other half is ready to boo, and that's the way it goes."

The story's author advises that cheerleaders can do much to control a crowd that turns on lots of "reaser." When they take a stand, the effect is miraculous.

Then sagely adds: "Teen-agers are doing more to educate adults than adults are doing to educate teen-agers, especially in basketball." (Could be a teen-ager wrote this thing.)

An old understanding worth repeating: The ref is the final authority at a basketball game. His word goes over that of umpire, official scorer, yep, and even over that of coaches and fans.

A. ODEN HAVES, secretary-treasurer of OSAA, when here at a basketball clinic last November, pointed out that he thought the local officials association "was making good progress." As to the ever-present issue of foul-calling, he admonished that there is no change this year in the "flexibility" of foul-calling as established last season.

Last season, it was stressed to

officials, in the main, that foul-calling be limited when possible to that contact which actually affects the play and takes away an advantage from a player or team.

DRAIN FANS take heart!

St. Francis, the only team that has taken Drain twice this season after beating the Warriors 57-41 last Friday in Eugene, is regarded as one of the powers in division two of district six. Sutherland is the only other ball club holding victory over the Warriors.

Firmco fans, their ball club beaten for the first time in 12 games this season by Yellow Cab of Medford last week, take note: Four Yellow Cab regulars are excellent starters. They are led by Johnny Foster, Central Catholic A All-star. Others are Don Wendt and Don Harris, B All-stars from Jacksonville in 1948, and Max Hite, second team all-star with the Phoenix state B school title team of '51.

A PROPOSED B 11-man football league in Lane, Linn and Polk counties is being worked over by officials from Lowell, Philomath, Monroe, Mapleton and Harrisburg. Several individual obstacles stand in the way of a number of the above-named schools. One of the biggest obstacles faced by the whole works is finding a sixth school member.
