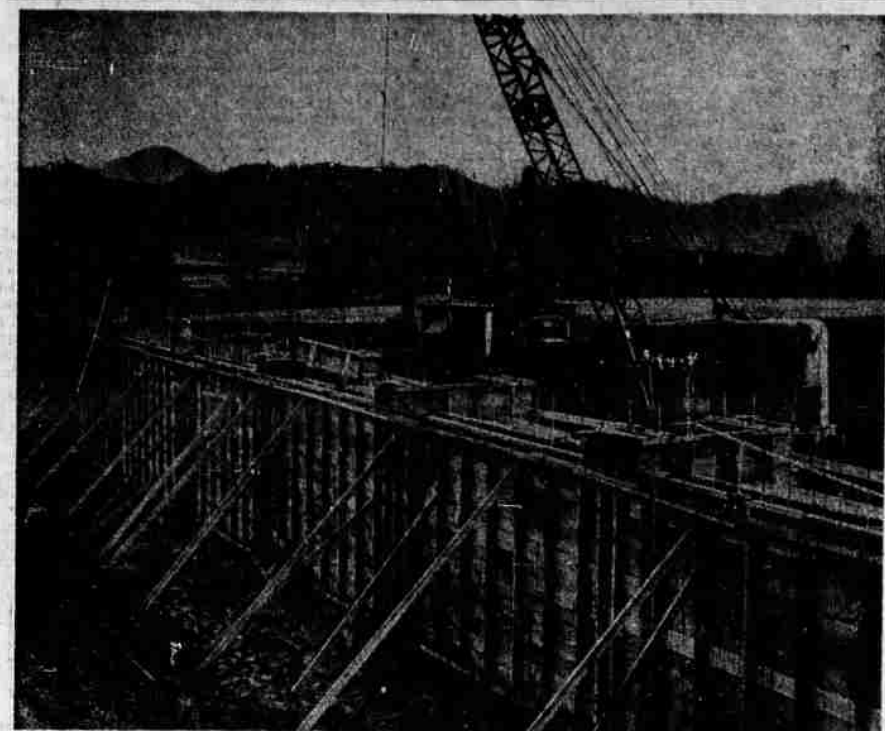
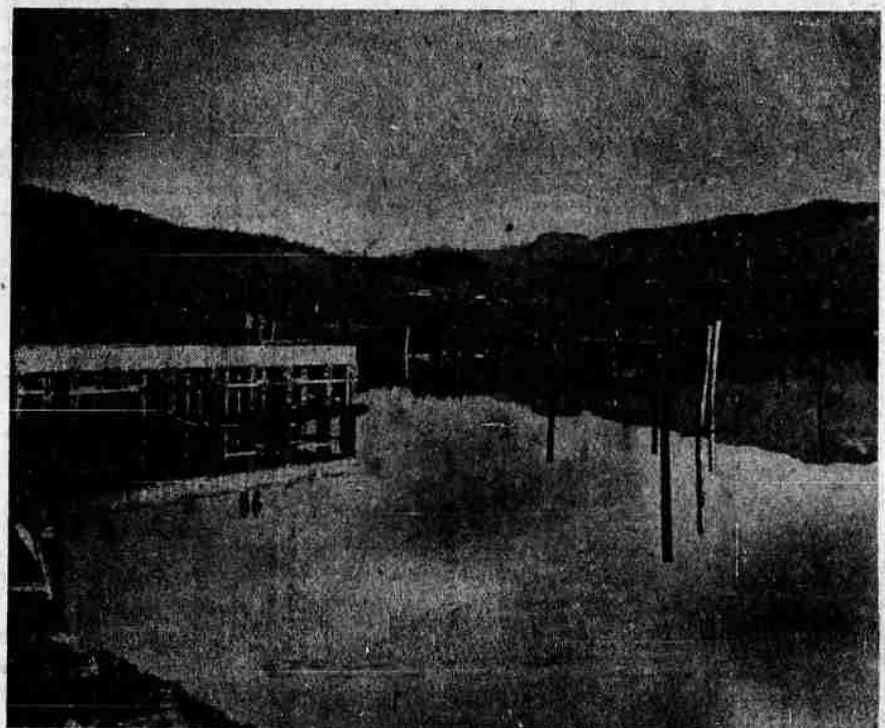

In Washington Monday, President Eisenhower sent to the congress an IMMENSELY IMPORTANT message. In it he —

1. Asks congress for authority to use the armed forces of the United States, if necessary, to assure the security of Formosa and the Pescadores islands (consult your map) AGAINST COMMUNIST ATTACK.
2. Says redeployment of the Chinese forces among the islands surrounding Formosa is essential to the security of the United States and that this redeployment (because of the air situation) would be impractical without the assistance of the armed forces of the United States.
3. Asserts that IN THE INTEREST OF PEACE, THE UNITED STATES MUST REMOVE ANY DOUBT REGARDING OUR READINESS TO FIGHT IF NECESSARY, TO PRESERVE THE VITAL STAKE OF THE FREE WORLD IN A FREE FORMOSA.

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Red China Reiterates 'Get Out'

7th Fleet Ready For Evacuation Of Nationals

TOKYO (AP) — Red China Wednesday again boasted of the "imminent" will of the 600 million Chinese people to liberate Taiwan (Formosa) and told the United States to get out of Formosa and the Formosa Strait.

Peiping radio continued its series of blistering broadcasts, echoing Premier Chou En-Lai's declaration Monday that Formosa must be "liberated," the U.S. 7th Fleet must quit Formosan waters, and a ceasefire is unacceptable.

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — Although Nationalist Chinese officials won't say so, there is no question but that Chiang Kai-shek's forces will abandon the Tachen Islands.

Reliable sources said today the many problems involved have been worked out at conferences between Nationalist and American officers. Formal announcement appears to await only congressional approval of President Eisenhower's recommendations.

The sources said the evacuation would be a joint operation, under the over-all command of Vice Adm. Alfred M. Pride, commander of the U.S. 7th Fleet. His flagship, the cruiser Helena, is now at the north Formosa port of Keelung.

The English-language China News reported that some 300 planes of the 7th Fleet conducted maneuvers north of Formosa yesterday.

The newspaper, quoting what it called reliable sources, said the air show was considered here to be a "show of strength to tell off the Reds."

Woman Injured In 2-Automobile Collision Here

A two-car collision on Highway 99 Tuesday night, north of Roseburg, bruised one woman and sent her to the hospital and caused one driver to be cited for operating in the left lane of traffic.

State police said the accident occurred at 9 p.m. on the curve near the Nebo Trailer Court.

Police said Earl Major Carl, 70, 845 Mill St., Roseburg, was driving south. As he came around the curve, he ran head-on into a car driven by Henry Chr. Hooker Road, Roseburg. According to officers, Carl apparently became confused as he rounded the corner. Carl was cited by state police.

Carl's wife, Mrs. Mabel Carl, 67, was taken to Community Hospital by P & B Ambulance. Mrs. Carl received bruises on both of her knees, superficial personnel said. She was reported in good condition but "uncomfortable."

Neither Carl nor Chr were injured, police said.

The grills of both cars and the left front fenders of both were damaged by the collision, police said.

Glide Logger Injured In Woods Accident

George Pedersen, 39, Idlewild Park, was reported in "as good condition as could be expected" Wednesday following a logging accident earlier in the day.

Pedersen apparently received two broken legs according to Community Hospital personnel. He is an employee of the Douglas County Lumber Co. According to the News-Review Correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby, he was working on a woods crew above Rock Creek at the time of the accident.

Jim Haun New Police Chief At Myrtle Creek

Sgt. Jim Haun of the Myrtle Creek city police was hired for the position of chief of police at a special meeting of the Myrtle Creek City Council Tuesday night. Haun has been acting chief since the resignation of Harry Clemmons in December.

Mrs. Shirley Hogg, acting secretary, announced the council's decision in accepting the application of Haun over eight others. Recorder Jerry Mylenbeck was absent from the meeting.

Rebels Interned In Nicaragua; Conflict At End

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — President Anastasio Somoza said Wednesday he feels the revolution in neighboring Costa Rica "is over."

Three top leaders of the rebellion marched into Nicaragua Tuesday with about 240 of their soldiers. The three—Capt. Teodoro Picado Jr., son of exiled ex-President Picado of Costa Rica, and the Calderon Guardia brothers—are now in confinement in Managua. Their troops are still in the frontier town of Quetzaltenango.

Somoza said the rebels felt it was "useless to continue fighting against such odds." But he understands two patrols of rebels did not come to Nicaragua.

The president said those who crossed into Nicaragua were politically interned and would remain so for some time, but he hoped Costa Rican President Jose Figueres would allow the exiles to return to Costa Rica.

The younger Picado's wife, the former Susan Moir of Glendale, Calif., was happy to hear the news her husband was safe in Managua. A former West Point cadet, he had been field commander of the insurgent forces and was reported by the Costa Rican government last week to have been killed.

Gen. MacArthur Prepared To Get New Accolades

LOS ANGELES (AP) — General of the Army Douglas MacArthur prepared to receive new accolades today, his 75th birthday.

Not even the season's heaviest fog could dim the enthusiasm of the welcome for the hero of the Pacific last night. A crowd of 1,500 waited two hours for his delayed arrival at Los Angeles International Airport. Many more cheering thousands lined the route to his hotel.

Today the general speaks at the unveiling of a bronze statue of himself in the first public showing of the monument in MacArthur Park.

At a luncheon given by the Episcopal diocese of Los Angeles, he will receive an award of extraordinary merit from the Rt. Rev. Francis E. Bloy, bishop of the diocese. He is expected to make a short, informal address to 1,100 persons in Biltmore Bowl.

His major address was scheduled for tonight at an American Legion dinner before more than 1,000 in the Ambassador Hotel's Embassy Room. Here, he will receive a four-foot birthday cake decorated with 75 red, white and blue candles and topped with five gold stars—and perhaps a surprise or two.

DRIVER FINED

A 17-year-old Winston youth was fined \$25 in district court Tuesday after pleading guilty to a charge of failing to leave information at the scene of an accident.

Judge Warren A. Woodruff also suspended the young man's driver's license for 30 days. The youth was arrested by Roseburg police upon a complaint filed Jan. 11 by Paul Casey.

New Telephone Numbering System For 3 Areas Begins Operation Feb. 5, At 11 P.M.

Letters explaining change of the Pacific Telephone Co. numbering plan on Feb. 5 have been sent to all listed subscribers, according to J. S. McGuire, district manager here.

McGuire said the new seven-digit numbering system will go into effect at exactly 11 p.m. Feb. 5. The change will be made without interruption of telephone service.

The change has been brought about in anticipation of customer toll dialing. Prefixes have been added to numbers in Roseburg, Glide and Winston-Dillard.

In Roseburg, the new telephone numbers will have an ORchard 2 (OR2) or ORchard 3 (OR3) prefix followed by the last four of the present telephone numbers.

In Winston-Dillard, the new prefix will be Osborne 9 (OS 9) preceding the last four numerals of the present numbers.

In Glide, the new prefix will be Gypsy 6 (GY 6), and in many cases the old numbers will be changed.

Adhesive-backed new number cards for telephones will be mailed to subscribers starting next Monday. McGuire said instructions will be included to show telephone users how to place the cards over present telephone numbers.

The new numbers are to be listed in the new Roseburg-and-vicinity directory to be delivered by mail next week.

McGuire cautioned against using the new numbers before the time the cutover is made. It just won't work before then, he said.

Reminders And Advice

McGuire listed several reminders and suggestions:

1. When dialing ORchard or Osborne, dial the letter "O" (the same as "6") rather than the figure "0" (zero).
2. Numbers following any prefix may be dialed without dialing the letters. But McGuire asked that people use the letters here for a few weeks, too, so they can get them in mind.
3. Be sure to notify out-of-town friends of the new prefix, for long-distance calls into Roseburg must include the letters.
4. Be sure to change numbers of stationery, advertising, etc.

It will be possible to phone between Roseburg and Winston-Dillard without using the prefixes, McGuire said. The prefixes differ because company officials felt it possible that someday the smaller communities may have an exchange of their own.

Referring to the new directory, McGuire said it will have larger page sizes, and a map of the city will be included.

Ira B. Riddle, Native Resident, Dies At Age 83

The first white child born in the Cow Creek Valley, Ira B. (Bob) Riddle, 83, died this morning at a Roseburg hospital.

Riddle, who resided at 1321 Madison Ave., Roseburg, was the son of John B. and Mary F. (Catching) Riddle, early pioneers who crossed the plains about 1850. He was born at Riddle on Dec. 18, 1871.

Riddle, who spent most of his life in public service, attended schools at Riddle and studied law in the office of Milton W. Smith, Portland. He was admitted to the bar in 1893. He was Roseburg's oldest practicing attorney at the time of his death.

He served in the state legislature in 1903. His latest public office, that of Roseburg municipal judge (1946-53), culminated a long list of services: He was circuit court reporter, deputy district attorney, county clerk for eight years, justice of the peace for six years, city attorney, and a long-time member of the Roseburg City Council.

He was a charter member of Roseburg Elks Lodge 326, serving as secretary and exalted ruler; member of the state and local bar associations, and was a past president of the Douglas County Chapter of the Oregon Republican Club.

He was married on Aug. 29, 1894, to Bessie E. Simmons of Portland. Two children, Raymond and Dorothy, preceded him in death. His wife and a son, Julius, survive.

The body has been removed to Roseburg Funeral Home. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Reconstruction On Tye Bridge Now Completed

Reconstruction work on the Tye Bridge west of Sutherlin has been completed and payment has been approved for the contractor, John G. Lundstrom of West Coast Steel Works, Portland.

A new 124-foot steel approach has been installed on the west end of the bridge and the deck has been replaced with a steel grid. County Commissioner Frank Ashley inspected the work Tuesday.

Earlier, a new approach was built for the east end of the bridge. Total works amount to \$131,500. The final phase of the work started Dec. 1.

Ashley pointed out that the bridge is vital to the harvest of timber in the area. He said 130-140 loads of logs cross the bridge daily during seven or eight months of the year. A special railing has been installed along one side of the bridge in case log loads should scrape the structure.

\$750 Damages Awarded For Truck-Team Collision

An Olalla man, Olen C. Davis, will receive \$750 for damages done to a team of Clydesdale horses hit by a logging truck four years ago.

A circuit court jury set that amount in a verdict returned Tuesday afternoon. The vote was 9 to 3 for the plaintiff after deliberation of about 25 minutes.

Davis sought \$1,100 damages from Harold Martin, doing business as Martin Logging Co., and truck driver Floyd E. Bluet, claiming the team value of the horses was destroyed after the accident in which one horse was killed. The other horse later was sold for \$150.

Davis claimed the truck driver was negligent in the accident on Olalla Road, that the truck horn scared the matched and trained team and caused the animals to jump in front of the truck.

Judge Carl E. Wimberly presided at the trial.

Police Investigating Apparent Hit And Run

Roseburg City Police Wednesday were investigating an "apparent hit and run case" involving two vehicles Tuesday evening. They were called to the scene following a citizen's complaint.

The complainant said he noticed occupants of a car parked in the middle of Pitzer Street apparently tampering with the parked vehicle. The persons drove off in their car "at high speed."

The complainant was unable to catch up with them. Police said the parked car had been damaged. It is registered to Charles Pressnell, police said.

Trawler Hits Mine

DIEPPE, France (AP) — The French trawler Abraham Duquesne hit a mine Tuesday in the English Channel, exploded and sank, the French News Agency reported. All 15 crew members were killed.

House-Passed Bill Unaltered In 26-2 Vote

Sens. Morse, Langer Opposed To Measure; Amendments Beaten

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Foreign Relations and Armed Services Committees Wednesday approved 26-2 a resolution giving President Eisenhower full war powers to defend Formosa and its outposts.

Sens. Langer (R-ND) and Morse (Ind-Ore) voted against the resolution which was recommended to the Senate in exactly the form it passed the House Tuesday by a 408-3 vote.

Sen. George (D-Ga.), who presided at the closed door meeting in the historic old Supreme Court chamber in the capitol, announced no effort would be made to call up the resolution for Senate action "before Thursday morning."

Unless there is unanimous consent for immediate consideration, any measure must under Senate rules "lay over" for one day after it is reported by a committee.

The Foreign Relations and Armed Services Committees rejected two proposed amendments before approving the resolution.

A 20-8 vote defeated a proposal by Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) to turn over protection of Formosa and the island areas to the United Nations.

A similar vote rejected a n amendment by Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) to limit the authority of the President to defend Formosa and the Pescadores islands.

Labor Legislation Gets Top Billing By Lawmakers

SALEM (AP) — Labor legislation took top billing in the Oregon Legislature Wednesday as House Democrats submitted their program for labor peace.

Other important measures affecting labor will get an airing at 7:30 p. m. Wednesday, when the Senate Labor and Industries Committee hears arguments about a program to revise unemployment compensation laws.

This program, prepared by the Governor's Advisory Committee, would boost maximum benefits from \$25 a week to \$35, increase employer payroll taxes, and extend coverage to employees of firms hiring fewer than four persons, of state and local governments, and of cooperatives.

The two bills introduced by the House Democrats would provide for a state labor conciliator, and repeal the 1953 anti-picketing law which forbids picketing unless the pickets are recognized bargaining agents.

The labor conciliator would be appointed by the governor after consultation with the labor commissioner. The conciliator would offer mediation services on request of either party to a labor dispute, or he could step in on his own initiative.

The governor still could use the
