

'Cats Fail In Upset-Studded 'B' School Basketball Round

Elkton's 50-45 reversal of Glide and Camas Valley's late-season resurgence 47-43 win over Riddle topped Tuesday night's tenth round of play in the Douglas B. League.

The Elks went to Glide to turn the tables on the Wildcats and by doing so prevented a virtual Glide title-claim and kept themselves as the only other contenders in the regular season race.

Camas Valley gave an omen of things to come after beating one of the southern division's highly-rated clubs, while Oakland was also inscribing some handwriting on the wall with its 42-36 clubbing of Yoncalla to take over third place.

Canyonville overcame Days Creek 58-53 in the day's fourth result to tie Riddle in fifth place.

Elkton 40, Glide 35

Glide led only twice in the ball game over a smart-moving and good-shooting Elkton ball club. The Wildcats lost 40-35 Tuesday at Glide.

The league-leaders were well-defended by a tight Elkton team that allowed minimum Wildcat shooting room. High-scoring Dick Smith still managed to bag 12 in leading the Wildcats but was one behind Dean Gill's 13 for the Elks.

Elkton kept in front by one to three points most of the way in posting quarter leads of 8-5, 17-15 and 28-25. The score was tied four times in the game, and each team pulled ahead twice following ties.

It was 2-2 and 4-4 in the first period as Gene Polley tallied all of Glide's five first quarter points. The Wildcats tied it again 19-19 and 24-24 and following each of those deadlocks they managed one-point leads, their only advantages in the game.

Elkton was able to command through the major part of the struggle, however, behind the play-making of Gill and the slight backboard control provided by center Jack Whitfield.

In the final period of play, Glide moved to within one point of tying on a couple of occasions but three key long baskets by guard Larry Bishop and another fielder by sub Dick Johnson kept the Wildcats away.

Glide won the jayvee game 25-24 as Ronnie Dell scored 12. Beal scored eight for Elkton.

After a disastrous early-season start, Camas Valley established itself as one of the southern division's most promising ball clubs Tuesday by beating Riddle 47-43 on the losers' floor.

The Hornets won their third

league game of the year in convincing style, overcoming an early 7-0 Riddle lead and then staying in front the rest of the way.

Clever Bobby McClellan and slickie Gary Spencer moved the Elks into a 9-7 advantage and into an 18-11 quarter lead. Camas then built up the game's biggest lead at 22-11 before Riddle narrowed it down to 22-21.

The game continued at this kind of pace throughout with Camas pulling away and Riddle each time whittling away but never catching up.

At halftime the Hornets forged ahead 28-21 and were even farther ahead in the third chapter before Irish sub Buster Bennett poked in three goals to narrow it to 38-33 at quarter's end.

Early game Oakland leads ruined Yoncalla as the home team Oakers' bounded to a 42-36 decision that decided third place in the B. League, at least temporarily.

An effective Oakland zone defense bottled up the Eagle fast break so completely in the early stages that the Oakers were in front 8-4 after one period and 22-9 at halftime.

While Yoncalla was able to manufacture five second-period points, Oakland's Jackie Snyder, high point man with 18, tossed in eight markers to lead the winners.

Phil Blomquist's performance in the second half saved the eagles from total disaster as he was able to shake loose for seven points in each of the final two periods.

In the fourth period, Yoncalla began full court pressing successfully to outscore the winners 18-10 and equal their game's output up to that point. They trailed 32-18 at the end of the third period.

Shaw Snares Warner Cup

PALO ALTO, Calif. (P)—Oregon's star quarterback George Shaw Tuesday night became the first non-Californian to win the Pop Warner Memorial Award as the "most valuable senior college football player on the Pacific Coast."

Shaw, the nation's offensive leader in 1954, received the

award from former Stanford All-American Ernie Nevers at the ninth annual Palo Alto banquet.

"I knew Pop would have been pleased with your selection," said Nevers.

Glenn S. (Pop) Warner, who presented the award in former years, died in 1954.

Shaw was selected by vote of 350 sports writers, broadcasters and coaches—and present to honor him and to hear talks by top sports figures were some 500 fans.

Shaw, in accepting the award, said the playing of his teammates made it possible for him to win. Len Casanova, Oregon football coach, was present. Among those taking part in the evening's program were Ty Cobb, Buck Shaw, Eddie Joost, Frankie Albert, Hugh McElhenry, Leo Harris, Claire Goodwin, Chuck Taylor and Pappy Waldorf.

The Warner award has been won previously by Eddie LeBaron, College of the Pacific, 1949; Russ Pomeroy, Stanford, 1950; Ollie Matson, University of San Francisco, 1951; Jim Sears, USC, 1952, and Bobby Garrett, Stanford, 1953.

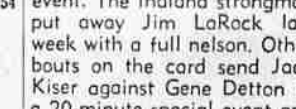

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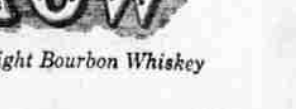
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
