Sons Of Artists Vanish In Quest Of Adventure

HAVERFORD, Pa. (AP)—The sons of commercial artists Norman Rockwell and Courtland Hoppin have disappeared from their Haverford College dormitories but Rockwell says he has no fears for their well-being.

The boys, Peter Rockwell, of Stockbridge, Mass., and Nicholas Hoppin, of New York City, both 18-year-old freshmen, left nine days ago without notifying or getting permission of college officials, Dean William Cadbury said Sunday.

Rockwell, contacted at his home, said that his son had telephoned him Saturday and that he was "all right." Rockwell did not say where the boys were.

Classmates said the two planned to go to Mexico "in search of adventure." Rockwell said that his son told him that Hoppin and he planned "to make their own way." Said the elder Rockwell: "He'll be all right wherever he is. I have a hunch he'll return to school next fall, however."

Appeals Court Upholds TV Channel 12 Award

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Communications Commission's award of television channel 12 at Portland to Oregon Television Inc., was upheld by the U. S. Court of Appeals here this week, despite a pending appeal from the award.

Columbia Empire Telecasters, one of three unsuccessful applicants for the channel, is appealing the commission's decision and last week asked the court to stay the award until the appeal is decided. It was this request which the court rejected.

Jack Blume, Columbia Empire attorney, said he will continue to fight the award and estimated it will be two months before the case comes up for oral arguments. Meantime in Portland, Oregon Television said it hopes to begin broadcasts from the station, KLOD-TV, early this spring.
