Oregon's Income Tax Collections Over \$53 Million

SALEM (U) — Oregon's state income tax collections in 1934 totaled \$53,797,533, a decrease of 11.1 per cent from 1933, the State Tax Commission announced Wednesday.

Collections in 1933 were \$60,529,637, while the all-time record was \$67,777,753 in 1932.

During the past year, corporation excise tax receipts dropped 18.2 per cent, while personal income tax collections were down 8.4 per cent.

The commission said that 1933 collections will be better than originally expected.

"The pickup in many sectors, which started last summer, has continued into 1935 and shows every sign of lasting at least through the first half of the new year."

"Locally, the most encouraging sign has been the improvement in lumber prices and the good pace set nationally by the construction industry," the commission said.

The commission, however, said it won't revise its estimated revenues for the next biennium unless the faster economic pace continues into the spring.

If the commission does raise its estimates, the \$83,000,000 estimated budget deficit for the next biennium would be whittled down a little.

SALEM (U) — The House passed and sent to the Senate Wednesday bills to standardize issuance of auto licenses and to repeal a little-used law requiring a special certificate to ship motor vehicles by water.

The licensing measure would assure a full year's use of plates. In many instances, issuance dates had limited their use to only 11½ months.

The House also approved a measure to let anybody start actions to have children declared delinquent or dependent. Now, such actions can be brought only by residents of the county in which the children live.

SALEM (U) — A bill calling for compulsory inspection of motor vehicles probably will be introduced in the Legislature, William J. Masters, attorney for the Oregon Automobile Dealers Assn., said this week.

Masters said that Oregon's automobile dealers are interested in periodic inspections as a means of reducing auto accidents caused by mechanical defects.



TAKES OVER — Robert F. Kennedy, 39, is the new chief counsel of the Senate investigating committee. Railways Head Uges Against Increase In Pay

CHICAGO (U) — A spokesman for Western railroads has urged a presidential emergency board not to recommend higher pay scales for conductors.

Such increases would be "preferential and discriminatory," said Daniel P. Loomis, Chicago, chairman of the Assn. of Western Railwaymen.

The Order of Railway Conductors has threatened to strike for upward pay revisions scaled to the weights of locomotives pulling the trains on which they work. The current rate averages about \$600 a month per conductor.

Loomis said the conductors received "the same wage increase and extended vacations agreed to by all other operating employees during the past year," and added:

"Labor disputes cannot be disposed of on a lasting and effective basis unless uniform and non-discriminatory treatment is accorded to all crafts and classes of railroad employees involved."

Hearing the dispute before making recommendations to President Eisenhower are Edward M. Sharpe, chief justice of the Supreme Court of Michigan; John T. Dunlop, professor of economics at Harvard University; and Charles A. Sprague, publisher of the Salem, Ore., Statesman.

\$98,665 Damages Given Plaintiff For False Arrest

SALEM (U) — A man arrested and held without charge won a damage award of \$98,665.75 from a circuit court jury here this week.

The winner was Cecil A. McNeff of Portland. The loser was Otto W. Heider Sr. of Sheridan, Ore., attorney and lender of money on mortgages.

McNeff said Heider caused him to be falsely arrested at Goldendale, Wash., April 2, 1932. He said this exposed him to public ridicule and damaged him to the extent of \$805,611. The jury, deliberating six hours, cut this damage figure down but still it was believed the biggest ever given here.

The arrest, said McNeff, was by a sheriff's deputy based on a telegram sent by Heider saying that McNeff was driving a stolen truck, was a "bad egg" who was wanted in California, too, and a warrant would be along. The warrant never came and McNeff, after being held a day and a half without charge, was released.

He sued two weeks later and the case got here on a change of venue from Yamhill County, Heider's home.

In testimony, Heider said he held a mortgage on McNeff's truck and payments were overdue.

Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg of Klamath Falls presided.

Bond Issue For State Institutions Backed

SALEM (U) — Gov. Paul Patterson's plan for a bond issue to build state institution buildings won the support Wednesday of Democratic Rep. Walter J. Pearson, Portland, former state treasurer.

Pearson said the plan is the only method of accomplishing a long-range building program.

He made his statement at a meeting of the House Taxation Subcommittee which is studying a resolution to issue almost \$20,000,000 in bonds.

The resolution would be referred to the people.
