

Roseburg To Rely On Height In Set Against Pelicans

To counter an expected Klamath Falls height advantage, Coach Bill Harper of Roseburg may start the tallest team available to him for Friday night's first game of a two-game series on the Roseburg floor.

An ankle injury which may keep starting guard Bill Oerding out of the series may have helped to prompt the move to Saturday night.

A sprained ankle has kept Oerding under wraps all week although he has managed a few light workouts. His present status is "doubtful." The Roseburg sophomore, second Indian scorer with 137 points, turned his foot in the Springfield game last Saturday night after stepping on another's foot.

Expected to take over the starting guard slots are Nub Beamer, 5-10 senior, and Ron Sanders, 6-1 junior. Senior Punk Biddington, currently averaging 12.8 points per contest, will add his 6-1 frame at center while regular Howard Back-

en, 6-0, and newcomer Jerry Droscher, 6-1 junior, will be pitted at forward.

Pels Have 6-6 Mark

Klamath Falls, coached by Don Peterson, formerly of the University of Oregon, brings a traditionally strong team from the Southern Oregon Conference, currently sporting an all-season 6-6 record.

Last season, in the first two games of the home-and-home series, the Pelicans rolled to 51-48 and 49-38 wins on their home floor.

Roseburg's recent progress in the win-loss column was stopped abruptly last Saturday night when Springfield jarred the locals 76-48 up north. The setback gives the Indians a 5-9 season's mark.

Center Stretches 6-4

Leading scorer in most of Klamath's encounters has been 6-4 center Dave D'Olivio, who is currently sporting an 18.1 per game average after tallying 218 counters in 12 tilts.

Other probable starters in the Klamath alignment, which includes about 10 regular players, are 6-2 Guy Munsell and 6-3 Martin Causey, forwards, and 6-2 Larry Yarnell and 5-6 Jack Sunitsch, guards.

Other regulars are 5-8 Dave People, 6-3 Denny Todd, 5-10 Danny Lowe, 6-1 Orin Perkins and 5-10 Jerry Barker.

The teams meet both Friday and Saturday nights in Roseburg beginning at 8. A junior high game precedes the Friday contest and a Roseburg-Frosch-B squad mix starts off Saturday night proceedings.

Roberts Best Score

Guard Dick Roberts took over the scoring lead for the Indians for the first time this season after tallying eight and 13 points in contests against Myrtle Creek and Springfield.

Roberts now has 108 points, one better than running mate Oerding, who has been the season-long leader.

Individual averages generally reflect the season's pace after a low-scoring 31-26 win over Myrtle Creek and Saturday's defeat at Springfield.

Beavers Dominate ND Basketball Figures

Statistical reasons why Oregon State holds a firm grasp on first place in the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division basketball race are really quite simple.

The conference statistician reported Thursday the Beavers lead in team shooting by scoring on 41.5 per cent of their field goal attempts while their defense had limited opponents to 33 points per game and a 31.9 percentage on shots from the floor.

In scoring average Oregon State is just a shade behind Oregon, 62.3 to 62.4 but the Beavers hold decisions over the Webfoots and a 6-0 division standing. Oregon is

second with 5.3. Conference games were played in the North last weekend and are scheduled this week but no games counting in the loop standings were on the docket in the Southern Division.

Oregon's Jim Loscutt continued to dominate the Northern Division individual statistics. He is the leading scorer with a game average of 18.8 and the No. 1 rebounder. Ron Bennink of Washington State has averaged 16.9 followed by Dean Parsons, Washington, 16; Tony Vlastakis, Oregon State, 15.7; and Jay Buhler, Idaho, 13.6.

This weekend Oregon State is at Washington while Washington State and Idaho play Friday at Moscow, Idaho, and Saturday at Pullman.

PCC Posts Hoop Schedule For Loop Without Divisions

MOSCOW, Idaho — Stanford will be at Washington and Idaho at UCLA to inaugurate the 1955 Pacific Coast Conference basketball season, the first in which the league will operate as a single unit without Northern and Southern Divisions.

The 72-game schedule, released here Wednesday, will open Jan. 6-7 and continue until the regional NCAA playoffs March 16-17.

Besides the Stanford-Washington and Idaho-UCLA games, Oregon State will play Washington State and USC California on the opening dates, while Oregon will be idle.

Other games on the schedule: Jan. 13-14 — California at Oregon, Oregon State at USC; Idaho at Stanford; UCLA at Washington State; Washington open.

Jan. 20-21 — Washington State at Washington; Oregon at Idaho; Stanford at Oregon State; UCLA, USC and California open.

Jan. 27-28 — Washington at Oregon State; Oregon at Stanford; UCLA at USC; Idaho at Washington.

March 16-17 — Regional NCAA playoffs.

DiMag Among Four Voted To Fame Hall

NEW YORK — Joe DiMaggio, one of the Yankees' all-time greats, reached baseball's Hall of Fame today just three years after his retirement and was joined by Dazzy Vance, Ted Lyons and Gabby Hartnett as the latest diamond heroes enshrined at Cooperstown, N.Y.

The four were elected yesterday by 231 ten-year members of the Baseball Writers Assn. Their election increased the Hall of Fame membership to 77. They will be formally inducted at the Cooperstown museum July 25.

Under the rules a man must be mentioned on three fourths (189) of the ballots for election. Sixty-five former players received one or more votes.

DiMaggio, who just missed last year when the late Rabbit Maranville, Bill Dickey and Bill Terry

was selected, led the ticket. He drew 223 votes as the writers recalled his lifetime batting average of .325, his brilliant playing in 51 World Series games in 10 seasons with the Yankees and his major league record of hitting in 56 successive games.

"It's great to be on the same team with all those old timers,"

Lyons, who compiled a 260-230 record with the Chicago White Sox before he finally left in 1948 after managing the Sox for three years, received 217 votes. Lyons was a coach with the Brooklyn Dodgers last year.

Vance, famous as Brooklyn's fireball pitcher, was named on 205 ballots. The Dazzler, who now spends most of the time these days hunting and fishing at his home in Florida, didn't arrive in the majors until late in life but he compiled a 197-140 record with his best performances of 25-6 coming in 1924.

Although Dazzy acquired greatest fame as a member of the Dodgers he never reached the World Series until he was traded to the St. Louis Cardinals in 1934. He appeared in one game.

Hartnett, who recalls his dramatic home run in the gloaming which won the 1938 National League pennant for the Cubs as one of his career highlights, received 195 votes. Gabby, now 54, caught for the Cubs from 1922 through 1940, managing them the last three years. He bowed out of baseball as manager of Buffalo in the International League in 1946 and now runs a bowling alley in Chicago. He had a lifetime batting average of .297, hit 236 homers, played in four World Series and five All-Star Games.

Led by Bill Jones with 388, the four-man team scored 1535 hits. Other team members were Paul Robinson 384; Dean Paulson 383; Roy Hill 382.

Firing against the Medford No. 1 team in the early weeks of the season, the club was informed that they had placed second in the result. Medford, last year's runner-up in the league, outscored the locals 1532-1512.

Other high scorers in Wednesday's night's games were led by Don Krogel 378; Sid Comfort 374; Bob Purkhiser 370; Pete Serafin 367; Louis McAllister 354; Stan Cornutt 352.

Lyons and Vance, who reached the heights as right-handed pitchers before DiMaggio joined the Yankees, were next in line.
