High Schools Get Stimulant In MOD Push

A possibility, no doubt very slight, exists that the winner in the current polio drive competition between Roseburg and Douglas high schools may result in the appearance of part of a prominent Hollywood family in Roseburg.

Del McKay, KRXL man who is sponsoring a cup to be presented to the winning school, told student bodies this week that Bing Crosby's boy, Gary, would be asked here to visit the winning school. Gary is national teenage chairman for the March of Dimes. In the event that Gary makes the trip, it's possible that Der Bingle will tag along.

But it's still only a slight possibility. A better chance will be that of obtaining a letter of congratulations from Gary, according to McKay.

Anyhow, the plan was studied in national headquarters, where no definite commitment has been made by Bing or his 17-year-old son.

However, the respective student bodies are hopped up over the prospect and are re-doubling efforts to bring record MOD collections this year. Last year, Roseburg students collected nearly 74 per capita in turning over \$4,715 to the March of Dimes, Douglas High was right behind. Though a smaller school, the students still brought in \$867.

Each school is a beehive of activity this week as students dream up new ways of raking in cash. The Roseburg kids came up with a few that were impossibilities. Item: They obtained an old car from somewhere and sought to run a raffle on it. But that's against the law, ruled school attorneys. But they're still coming up with other gimmicks — the sophomores held a fashion show Tuesday night; the juniors are planning a breakfast Saturday morning in the First Methodist Church; other organizations are dipping into their treasuries; many are putting the bite on the old man.

None are allowed to solicit money away from home, but may sell their services for cash.

At Douglas, a group of enterprising teenagers came up with a deal with theater manager Paul Bender. They collected tickets Tuesday and Wednesday at Bender's show house in return for half the ticket receipts.

The basketball team has a game scheduled Friday night with the faculty, and ticket proceeds will go to the March of Dimes. A community dinner will precede the game.

Each of the schools is striking for a national per capita record in polio donations. Roseburg's tally last year held the national record, according to New York City Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Each of the two schools has a "color girl," both polio victims. Roseburg's student body dedicated their efforts to Judy Bellows, a polio victim who studies her lessons in bed.

The honor girl at Douglas is Donna Kay Potter, daughter of Principal David Potter. In fact, a theme has been adopted at the school: "Dimes for Donna."

The competition is strictly a one-week shot. The drive in the schools begins this Monday and will end next Monday at 4 p.m. Students are required to go to school in the meantime. No time off to go polio-driving, school officials have ruled.

Two Roseburg men will preside along with five other Oregon men at the annual mid-winter meeting of the Oregon Wildlife Federation at Corvallis Feb. 3-5.

The three-day meeting will open Thursday morning in Oregon State College's Memorial Union Building. Various reports, discussions and adoption of a new OWF constitution are on the agenda. A complete Oregon Game Commission report is scheduled Saturday.

Carter Plods To Win Over Woods In Spokane

SPOKANE (AP) — Lightweight champion Jimmy Carter, back in action for the first time in two months, said "It wasn't one of my better fights," but it was much too good for young Bobby Woods.

The 31-year-old champion took a unanimous 10-round decision from Woods in a non-title match here Wednesday night and looked fast and sharp against a back-peddling opponent. There were no knockdowns.

Carter weighed 137 1/2, Woods 136 1/2. It was a dull affair that brought boos at the end from the crowd of more than 6,000 which paid \$21,000 in hopes of seeing the local boy match his fine performance here six weeks ago against Sandy Saddler.

But Woods, 21, couldn't land with the counter punch as he had against the featherweight champion and retreated most of the night. Dave Gray, Willamette guard, led the way with 21 points. Dick Hoy and Tom Gooding had 18 each for the winners, as did Wayne Young for the losers.

Colts Get Shaw As Bonus Pick

NEW YORK (AP) — The Baltimore Colts chose a quarterback George Shaw of Oregon, the country's individual total offense leader in college football last fall, as their bonus pick Thursday in the National Football League draft. The Colts first had to beat the Pittsburgh Steelers, Chicago Cardinals and Green Bay Packers in a preliminary draw for the right to get the extra choice which led off the meeting.

Shaw, a slick quarterback, gained 1,536 yards in 10 games for the Pacific Coast Conference team, of which all but 178 yards came by passing. He accounted for 13 touchdowns, scored personally and by passing.

As a varsity freshman in 1951 in two platoon football Shaw set a national record that still stands by intercepting 13 passes.

His defensive ability was taken into consideration by the Colts in their selection.

Cow coach Weed Eubank of Baltimore said "we think he is the best quarterback available in the country. He also is an excellent defensive player."

EUGENE (AP) — George Shaw said Thursday he was pleased to be the bonus pick in the National Football League draft, but he isn't ready yet to say whether he will play professional football.

If he does decide to, he will sign nothing until the college baseball season ends, he said.

Shaw said "I will be very happy with Baltimore if I decide to play pro football" and added he would be glad to talk with Baltimore officials with the understanding he would not sign while the baseball season is still before him.

Shaw is a highly regarded baseball outfielder but has not gained the prominence in that sport as in football although it is his favorite.
