Democrats' Attitude On Dam Memorial Surprising In Lack Of Opposition Shown

SALEM, Ore. — The Legislature's dispute over the Eisenhower administration's plan to develop power in partnership with local agencies might not be so violent as first believed.

A split among the Democrats in the House on the first test vote Tuesday indicates there may not be any strong opposition to it.

The test was on a memorial to Congress asking for construction of Green Peter and Cougar dams in the Willamette Basin under the partnership plan.

The Democrats divided, 14 against it and 11 for it. It was a surprise, because it was thought at least 20 Democrats would oppose it.

The Republicans supported the memorial 33 to 2.

A memorial really isn't very important, but they often cause the longest debates. They do provide a good test of sentiment.

The next test will be on the memorial asking the government to build John Day Dam, either itself or by partnership. Some Democrats oppose this because they want the government to finance all of the cost of John Day.

But it probably will be passed by about the same margin as the Green Peter-Cougar memorial.

The biggest power battle will be over ratification of the Columbia River Compact. Some Democrats say it will give Oregon the

short end as far as getting power and water are concerned.

The Republicans who wrote this compact claim it will guarantee Oregon more power and water than it would get without having the compact.

Another surprise was the announcement by Sens. Harry Bolvin, Klamath Falls Democrat, and Pat Loneragan, Portland Republican, that they will ask the Senate to create an Un-American Activities Committee.

Judging from performances at past sessions, it doesn't look as though such a committee will be formed.

Bolvin and Loneragan want a

committee to investigate subversives and also alleged subversive matter in school textbooks.

The Legislature has considered this several times in the past, but neither house has ever voted for the idea. It has the support of some patriotic organizations.

Gov. Paul Patterson had some good words to say for the lobbyists who gave a dinner for the Legislature Tuesday night.

He told the lobbyists how they had bought him many dinners while he was in the Senate, but added that no lobbyist ever had used a free meal to influence Patterson's vote.

The governor urged the legis-

lators to get all the free meals they could get from the lobbyists, and he added that the lobbyists give the Legislature lots of help.

The dinner was given by the Oregon Assn. of Trade Executives.

Legislators are worried because the bills are so slow in being introduced. We figure that only about 20 per cent of the bills have been submitted.

Many bills, drafted by the legislative counsel, are being carried around in members' pockets. Some members like to wait until the flood of new bills starts, so that committees won't be able to look at these members' bills too closely.

The delay makes it look as

though the session will last a long time. It probably will close up some time in May.

Umpqua Forest Yield Third High In Timber Cut

The Umpqua National Forest yielded the third highest volume of timber cut among national forests in the Pacific Northwest in 1954. It ranked third among 18 forests, according to Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone.

The Umpqua's all-time record of 43,535,000 board feet cut, followed the Willamette National Forest (402,847,000) in Oregon and Olympic National Forest (345,598,000) in Washington.

The Umpqua also ranked third in value of timber cut. The total value of \$2,897,329 was lower than: Willamette (\$5,606,787) and Olympic (\$3,982,870).

Volume of timber cut during 1954 in all 18 national forests of the Pacific Northwest was also pegged at an all-time high. Year-end figures showed that a total 2 billion 585 million board feet were cut and removed, producing an income of nearly \$35 million from these Oregon and Washington forests. This was an increase cut of 130 million board feet over 1953.

Stone said that, significantly, the largest cut occurred during the last three months of the year when logs were most needed. Forest Service records show the cut for the last quarter was over one billion board feet, an unprecedented record for any single quarter-year.

The meeting will be an all-day affair. Time and place will be announced later.

Meanwhile, the cancer-fighting activity was gaining momentum in the county. Mrs. Wimberly announced that educational material, consisting of films with projector and speakers would be supplied to any organization on request.

With a successful January out of the way, Chief Lang happily announced that applications are now being received for February enlistments.

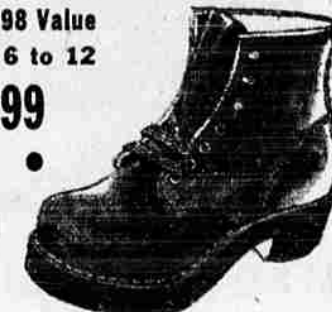
