

Shaw Heads Bonus Pick List

 NEW YORK (AP) — Two of the likeliest quarterbacks of the 1954 college season — George Shaw of Oregon and Ralph Guglielmi of Notre Dame — may ply their trade within 35 miles of each other next fall and make contenders of two of the weaker sisters in the National Football League.
 Shaw, a 185-pound throwing whiz who led the nation's major colleges in total offense, was the surprise bonus pick of the Baltimore Colts in yesterday's prolonged professional draft, enabling the Washington Redskins gleefully to pluck the All America Guglielmi.
 Wilbur Ewbank, the Baltimore coach, explained his choice of Shaw, a third-string All America, over the highly touted engineer of Notre Dame's fighting Irish.
The Best
 "We think Shaw is the best quarterback in the country, barring none," he said. "We know he is a great passer — he proved it with a losing team. We weren't too sure about the passing of Guglielmi because Notre Dame isn't essentially a passing team."
 The Colts in their first regular pick seized Alan (The Horse) Ameche, stampeding All America fullback from Wisconsin, giving them a potent one-two punch on the ground and in the air.
 Seers of the professional circuit immediately labeled Baltimore a team to be contended with in 1955. The Colts were next to last in the Western Division last fall with a 3-9 record.
 "The draft tightened the league considerably in my opinion," said Commissioner Bert Bell. "Baltimore and Washington particularly strengthened themselves."
 Both Baltimore and Washington expect their top draft choices to be available.
 Ameche said, despite attractive Canadian offers, he preferred to play in the United States and would be willing to talk money with Baltimore officials.
 Shaw, a bright baseball prospect, said he would make no decision until the end of the college baseball season but intimated he was interested in professional football — if the offer is right.
Not Concerned
 Colt officials were not concerned about losing Shaw to the demand although there were reports that three major league clubs were in-

terested in the West Coast athlete and one even had offered a \$40,000 bonus.
 "We checked every club in the majors before choosing Shaw," Ewbank said. "We found all of them felt that Shaw (an infielder/outsider) might not be too good a hitting prospect because of his football shoulders."
 "Furthermore, the present baseball bonus rule will discourage most of them."

Marquette's Streak Boosted To 14 Wins

 Even Marquette Coach Jack Nagle must be surprised over the Hilltoppers' basketball success this season after their mediocre showing a year ago.
 Marquette, the nation's 11th-ranking team, has put together a 14-game winning streak — longest in collegiate circles this season — after an opening loss to Michigan State.
 The Hilltoppers extended their skein with a 73-70 victory over Loyola of the South last night. The streak will be on the line when the teams meet again in New Orleans tonight.
 Nagle took over the helm at Marquette last season and his team won 11 and lost 15. Although Marquette had 10 lettermen returning for the 1954-55 campaign, Nagle never figured that his club would improve as much as it has.
 Last night the Hilltoppers were hard-pressed to repel Loyola. Marquette piled up a 36-22 halftime club.
 Rube Schultz led the Marquette attack with 25 points.
 Action again was tight last night with most of the major teams still idle due to midyear examinations.
 Denver broke an 11-game Skyline Conference losing streak by upsetting defending champion Colorado A&M 73-69. Denver led at halftime 35-32 and never was headed.

 The veteran Cripple was so persistent in his demands that he have a chance at the winner of the Gomez-LaChapelle engagement that he refused to leave the ring until Armory police were forced to remove him so the main event could go on.
 Gomez defeated LaChapelle last week and is out to settle the score with Wallick, who lost a referee's decision to LaChapelle two weeks ago. But Gomez wants to leave no stones unturned in his quest to meeting world's champion Frank Stojack in a match here in the near future.
 He is currently the number one contender in these parts after his most recent triumph and is convinced that he can handle the strong Wallick.
 Wallick, the rugged ring master, will be trying to put Gomez away, of course, with his deadly pile-driver, such as he used to wreck George Strickland last week. Matchmaker Elton Owen announced that another referee would handle Saturday night's main event because he felt that he could not be as impartial as he would like to be where Wallick is involved.

The big, mean Curtis lived up to advance notices last week when he dumped Jim LaRock with a full nelson.
