DR. BABBIT SPEAKS ON RHEUMATIC FEVER TO FULLERTON PTA

"Rheumatic Fever—its Cause, its Care and its Prevention" was the topic of Dr. C. H. Babbit, local physician, who addressed parents and teachers of Fullerton School Monday evening at a special discussion group meeting, one of several sponsored by Fullerton PTA this year. More than 50 parents attended the meeting, and all agreed, after the discussion, that they knew and understood a great deal more about rheumatic fever, which has been labeled "childhood's greatest enemy."

During his talk, Dr. Babbit pointed out that rheumatic fever is mostly a childhood disease striking children between the ages of 5 and 15, and more especially between the ages of 6 and 10. Rheumatic fever is a disease that may affect any part of the body, particularly the heart, joints, blood vessels, skin or brain. Damage to the heart may be severe, even fatal. However, two out of three rheumatic fever patients get well completely or have so little heart damage they can work or play like anyone else. Better methods of care bring new hope for young hearts today, according to Dr. Babbit.

The immediate cause of rheumatic fever is still unknown. However when it strikes, it usually follows nose and throat infections that are caused by a germ of the streptococcus family. Dr. Babbit pointed out that not all streptococcal infections are followed by rheumatic fever. Rheumatic fever itself is not catching, but the "strep" infection that comes before it is catching. Rheumatic fever cannot be inherited, but it has a tendency to pick on members of the same family. For this reason, it is important to have brothers and sisters of a rheumatic fever patient examined.

Although no specific cure exists for rheumatic fever, doctors agree that it can be prevented and parents who know the facts about this crippling disease are better prepared to keep their children free of it. Home conditions play an important part in prevention of the disease. Dr. Babbit stated. Parents were advised to keep a child dressed warmly during the winter months and to see that he changed wet clothing promptly. By means of proper diet, exercise and rest a child should be kept in good general health. House temperature, also, should be kept from extreme changes and the house should be properly ventilated.

Dr. Babbit proved himself an interesting and well-informed speaker and quickly won the undivided attention of his audience. Arrangements for the meeting were taken care of by Mrs. Clifford Baxter, discussion group chairman of Fullerton PTA, working in conjunction with the Oregon Heart Association. Other groups interested in presenting a similar program should contact Mrs. E. E. Lindell, representative for the Oregon Heart Association in Roseburg.

The regular meeting of Fullerton PTA will be Feb. 7 at 7:30 in the school. Theme for the evening will be "Let's Honor Our Teachers." All interested persons are invited to attend.

No Provisions To Aid Schools Seen In Budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Clements (D-Ky.) said Thursday he doubts that the Eisenhower administration will do anything effective to meet the nation's school room shortage until late this year or perhaps next year.

President Eisenhower has scheduled a special message to Congress Feb. 15 proposing a program of federal school construction aid.

Clements said in testimony prepared for the Senate Labor Committee he foresees no immediate, effective help to result "in view of the fact that there was no provision for schools in the President's budget and that the White House conference (on educational needs) is not scheduled until fall."

He referred also to "past opposition by the present secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare," Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby.

The President in his State of the Union message spoke of a critical shortage of classrooms and promised "an affirmative program" to meet it. Some sources say this will center on federal guarantee of state school bonds.

The White House conference to which Clements referred is to be held Nov. 30. To be preceded by meetings in each state, it is intended to produce a comprehensive report on the nation's school needs.

Mrs. Hobby has urged that no large scale federal school building aid be undertaken until the conference has reported.

Fleet Operating Under Complete News Blackout

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP) — American correspondents with the U.S. 7th Fleet off Formosa are subject to an almost complete news blackout under Navy censorship.

The Navy's restrictions forbid any news story touching on the following five subjects:

1. Fleet movements.
2. Fleet size.
3. Fleet disposition.
4. Intentions.
5. Possible damage.

These restrictions have been applied so broadly and severely as to withhold anything but a trickle of minor feature stories. The Navy insists the restrictions are not censorship. However, the restrictions are actually a censorship much, much lighter than any formal censorship applied by the U.N. Command in the Korean War.

All correspondents with the fleet have been required to sign fresh agreements to submit their stories to the ship captain or higher commander for clearance. Even if the stories pass the captain, they must be sent to the commander of the Pacific Fleet in Pearl Harbor, then to the Navy chief of information in Washington for ultimate release.

As a result, almost no news of the fleet has been cleared for publication.

The fleet commander, Vice Adm. Alfred M. Pride, has refused repeated requests, some made face-to-face, to allow newsmen to work aboard the flagship.

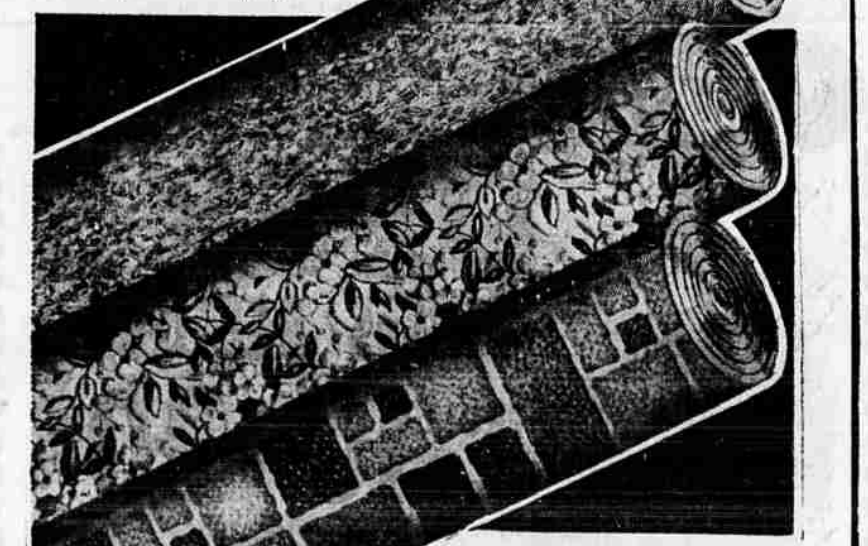
