Days Creek hung doggedly on to Glide's Wildcats throughout their struggle at Days Creek before the league leaders prevailed 58-33.

The Wolves never got within four points of Glide, but they made things uncomfortable in both the second and fourth periods.

The Oregon State Beavers, who have been coasting along unbeaten in their quest for a second straight Northern Division basketball title, had to resort to burglary Friday night to beat back the challenge of Washington.

With Bill Toole in the sticky-finger role, the Beavers squeezed by the Huskies, 55-51, for their seventh victory in as many Pacific Coast Conference starts.

Toole, with OSC down four points late in the game, pilfered the ball and promptly added two points to Oregon State's total. It was the capper to a night of thievery by Toole that kept the Huskies off balance.

In the night's other conference game, Idaho's Vandals capitalized on a bad pass to edge Washington State, 75-73, in overtime at Moscow.

Oregon stepped outside the conference to humble Brigham Young's outclassed Cougars, 82-71, at Eugene as Jim Loscutt set an Oregon scoring record.

Idaho's victory sent the Vandals from the cellar into third place behind Oregon, Washington State remained in fourth place while Washington slid from third to last in the standings.

Oregon State held a 37-18 half-time advantage, but Washington started hitting at the start of the second period and went ahead at 43-30.

Eugene, No. 4 in the poll, rolled over Oakridge 95-50 behind Center Mike Moran's 41 points. This remarkable effort wasn't a district record, though. It is held by Dean Parsons, University of Washington center, who scored 48 points while playing for Eugene several years ago.

Albany both won and lost a game Friday night. In regular play the Bulldogs defeated Lebanon 65-54. But Albany lost a decision when the Oregon School Activities Assn. Board of Control reversed a referees' decision in a double-overtime game between Albany and Corvallis a week ago.

At the time the officials ruled that the winning team had to be two points ahead in the second overtime. This gave the game to Albany, 57-55. But the OSAA interpreted the rules as saying the first team to score two points in the second overtime is the winner, awarding the game to Corvallis, 55-54. It was the fourth loss against 10 wins for Albany, the No. 5 team in the poll.

Top State Prep Teams Win
The two top teams were idle but six of the other eight leaders in the Associated Press poll won their games in Friday night's round of Oregon high school basketball. Cleveland of Portland, No. 7 team, and Pendleton, No. 10, both were defeated.

St. Helens won its 14th game in a row by trimming Vernonia 69-52 in a district 14 contest. St. Helens, No. 6 in the poll, is the only undefeated class A team in the state.

Medford and Milwaukie, the first and second place teams, did not play Friday night. North Bend, the No. 3 team, won its 15th game against one loss, 78-55 from Bandon.

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Indians Falter In Closing Seconds Of Contest, Fall To Pelicans, 48-44

The roughest game of the year played locally found Klamath Falls opening a two-night stand Friday night by outscuffing the Roseburg Indians 48-44.

The beefy visitors couldn't put their height advantage to much use through the first three periods of the game when Coach Bill Harper's rangiest quintet almost matched them in board play. But in tell-tale moments of the fourth period, the Pels were able to com-

inate enough rebounds to get in and stay there.

Klamath Falls, playing without two of its strongman regulars, 6-3 Martin Causey and 6-2 Guy Munsell, 185 and 185 pounds, respectively, chose before the game to play the Indians a running game by fielding their speediest quint. Roseburg, by contrast, in pre-game strategy, decided to sacrifice speed for size. Speed-boy guard Bill Oerding was benched in favor of a sprained ankle.

The entire effect was one of little speed, but plenty of collision and much plodding.

Klamath Falls shot into 4-8 lead near the end of the first period to which they added another four markers before quarter's end for a 13-8 difference. From there until 3:15 was gone in the third quarter, the visitors led by close margins until Roseburg tied it up 28-28.

Score Evenly
The teams scored evenly in the second canto when each got 10 points for a 23-18 Klamath lead. Just before Roseburg's end-of-the-half field goal to make it 23-18, the red-shirted team revealed in the first half's biggest lead, seven points, 23-16.

Roseburg caught up and went ahead in the final four minutes and 45 seconds of the third period on successes by Nub Beamer, Punk Biddington, Howard Backen, Freddy Hargis and Ron Sanders.

The Indians first tied the count 28-28 on Beamer's foul shot. They tied it 30-30 on Biddington's rebound and went in front when Backen hit expertly from the corner.

Klamath then missed five of six free throws to help the Indian cause along, and Roberts missed one of the foul throw chances which eventually provided the difference in the final score.

Outshoot Pels
Roseburg outshot their rivals 15-13 from the field but made 14-30 free throws to Klamath's 22-38.

Following Roberts' missed attempt, Orin Perkins got loose for a Pelican layin and Denny Todd (6-3 and 200 pounds) collected a foul throw on Biddington's infraction.

Hargis then two-handed from the free throw line to tie the score again 34-34, and right before the intermission, Sanders hit a gift for Roseburg's last lead.

The issue was decided in less than two minutes of the fourth quarter when the large men from the south hit five out of six quick free throws and added a layin foul goal for a 41-35 lead. With 3:50 remaining, the Klamaths took a 45-37 advantage, for the game's biggest lead on a layin and a brace of charity tosses.

Roseburg whittled away at Biddington's two free throws and
