A Grants Pass state senator, Gene L. Brown, has introduced into the Legislature four measures intended "to streamline certain procedures in obtaining hunting and fishing licenses and strengthen conservation practices for fish and game."

ONE MEASURE would remove the necessity of the county clerk of Oregon to keep full facilities for issuing licenses for fishing and hunting by allowing him to issue these permits only at his discretion.

Practice in recent years has been that most licenses have been issued by sporting goods stores.

The other three bills are directed towards strengthening fish and game conservation practices.

FIRST of these would prevent the killing of game animals to remove only the head, hide, antlers, horns and tusks. The only exception is for those animals taken for fur.

This bill is intended to prevent "wastefulness in allowing the rest of the carcass to be left after the particular parts had been removed by the hunter."

Another proposal is that the State Game or Fish Commission be allowed to issue a special permit for the taking of no-game or non-food fish by netting or trapping from the various waters of the state.

A FOURTH measure "would allow the commissions dealing with fish and game to have some discretionary authority over what streams and lakes would be used for fishing through ice during periods when the waters are frozen."

Under present laws there are only a few streams and lakes in which fishing through a hole in the ice is allowed, mostly

in the Willamette country. Literature from the mags: In the Jan. 31 issue of Sports Illustrated, an author urges U.S. fishermen to "Get off their bellies." Russian, and fishermen of other nationalities, are continually outshooting us in competition he contends. Wildcats Stay Atop AP List

San Francisco Five Runs Close Second

Kentucky's Wildcats were atop the Associated Press basketball poll for the seventh successive week today, but there's likely to be some changes made by next election time.

On the basis of games through San Francisco's 1,031 to 953 points.

The Wildcats received only 15 more first-place votes — 48 to 33 — than the West Coast five, now working on a winning streak of 12 games.

And if everything continues to go smoothly for San Francisco, Kentucky's lofty spot could well be in jeopardy when the nation's sports writers and sportscasters cast their votes again next Monday. For Kentucky lost its second of the season last night and once again it was Georgia Tech that turned the trick, 65-59. That left the Wildcats with a 12-2 season mark compared to 14-1 for San Francisco.

LaSalle moved up from fifth to third in today's poll but still was far back of the Dons with 541 points. Duquesne, which beat Niagara last night for a 10-3 record against college rivals, was right at the Explorers' heels with 532 after being idle all last week.

Utah, with a long lead in the Skyline Conference race, advanced from seventh to fifth. The Utes were followed by North Carolina State, George Washington, UCLA, Marquette and Illinois. N. C. State skidded chiefly because of its second defeat of the season by Villanova.

Medford Keeps First Place In Associated Press Ratings

Medford, which didn't play last week, still is the No. 1 team in the Associated Press Oregon high school basketball poll but there are two newcomers to the top 10.

It was a rough week for the ranked teams. Five of them suffered losses. Pendleton fell from the select 10 and South Salem barely stayed in.

Ten of the 12 sportswriters voting in the poll rated Medford the best team in the state. Nobody gave Milwaukie, defending state champion, a first place vote but it received enough secondary support to be No. 2.

Eugene, which got one vote for first, moved up a notch to third place. It edged North Bend, which fell to No. 4.

St. Helens, the state's only major undefeated team, with 14 victories, polled the only other first place vote and moved up from No. 6 to fifth.

Franklin, a co-leader in the Portland league, vaulted from nowhere into sixth place despite a poor showing in pre-season when it lost six of eight games.

The rangy Quakers, paced by 6-9 Bjarne Jensen, polished off two rivals last week.

Besides Pendleton and South Salem, Cleveland of Portland and Astoria lost games. The defeats cost all of them prestige except Astoria, whose loss was to Milwaukie. The Fishermen jumped from eighth to No. 7.

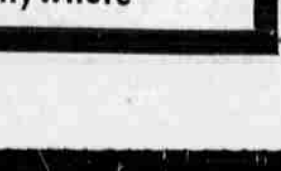
Behind Astoria are Albany, Cleveland of Portland, South Salem and Beaverton, making its first appearance in the top 10. South Salem and Beaverton tied.
