

Spy Ring Chiefs Hanged In Egypt

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—A big black flag hoisted over the old Cairo prison Monday announced the hanging of two Jews convicted of leading a spy-sabotage ring for Israel.

Press and public were barred from the executions of Dr. Mussa Lito Marzuk and Samuel Azar, convicted with six others Jan. 27. The death sentences brought a wave of clemency appeals and protests from Jewish groups abroad.

The other defendants, one a woman, were given prison terms including two life sentences. Two men were acquitted, two fled the country before their arrest and a 13th defendant committed suicide during the trial.

Marzuk was convicted of heading a spy and sabotage ring in Cairo, while Azar was convicted of leading a similar ring in Alexandria. The government charged that their organizations set fire last July to U. S. Information Service libraries in Cairo and Alexandria in an attempt to damage Egyptian-American relations and plotted to set the Cairo and Alexandria motion picture theaters ablaze to spread panic.

Union Splits With Bridges Over Judgment

HONOLULU (AP)—The executive board of the International Longshoremen and Warehousemen's Union Local No. 142 has voted immediately with the ILWU international, the union's public relations officer, E. C. Yadao, announced.

The action, subject to a referendum of Local 142's 23,000 members in the islands, was not the result of any dispute with the international.

Suspension of affiliation with Harry Bridges ILWU international was decided on because of the million dollar damage award to the Juneau Spruce Co. against the international. Bridges' union has been fighting the award in the courts and has not yet paid off.

'Most Wanted' List Names Robber, Ex-Con

WASHINGTON (AP)—Kenneth Darrell Carpenter, an Ohio desperado wanted for the \$9,300 robbery of a Kansas bank, was put on the FBI's list of "10 most wanted men" Monday.

The FBI described Carpenter, 42, a native of Wyandot County, Ohio, as "a hardened, desperate criminal," a habitually crying criminal. He has served time in a number of prisons, and was conditionally released from Leavenworth federal penitentiary just about a month before the robbery of the bank at Oswego, Kan., last Nov. 27.

Two men looted the Oswego bank in five minutes, and one of them, LeRoy Adolph, was caught two weeks later at Webb City, Mo. He confessed, named Carpenter as his companion, and got a 15-year federal sentence.

Carpenter is brown-eyed and brown-haired, about 5 feet 11 inches and has a slender build. He has a "true love" tattoo on the fingers of his right hand.

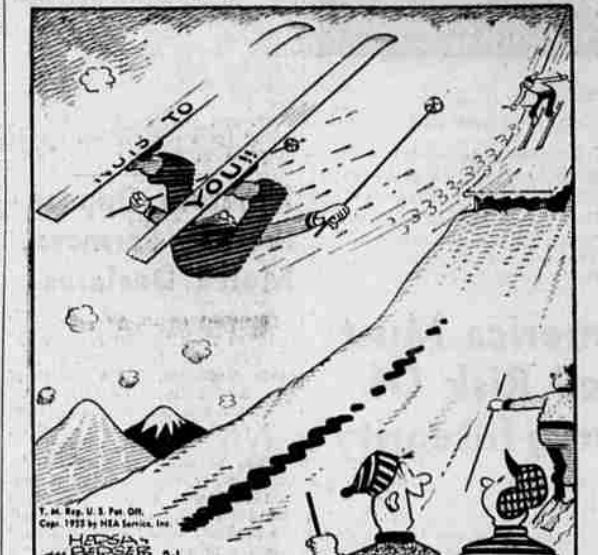
New In Roseburg

Robbery Seen As Motive In Triple Murder, Fire

MOUNT PLEASANT, Tenn. (AP)—Charred evidence indicated today Mr. and Mrs. Dudley Moore and their guest walked one at a time into a dead-shot ambush Saturday night.

Each had bullet holes in the face or head. The three bodies were sprawled in the charred living room of the Moores' home, a scant two steps from the front door. Police said the motive probably was robbery.

The guest was a bachelor farmer, James Cooper, 47, who customarily watched wrestling on television with the Moores on Saturday nights.

The coroner's jury said the three were murdered. Police found no pistol, no stray bullets, no bloodstains. Fire Chief J. E. Hardison said there was no evidence of arson, "but to catch as fast as it did, the fire had to be set."

After a check of the store's receipts, Homer Copeland, assistant police chief, said the Moores probably were carrying \$500 to \$600.

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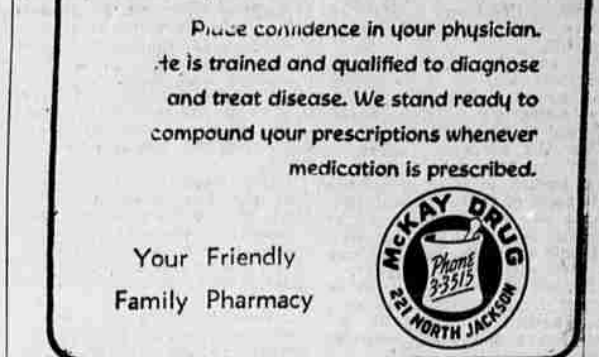
