

Polio Victim Judy Bellows Spends Entire Day Breathing Without Respirator Or Rocking Bed

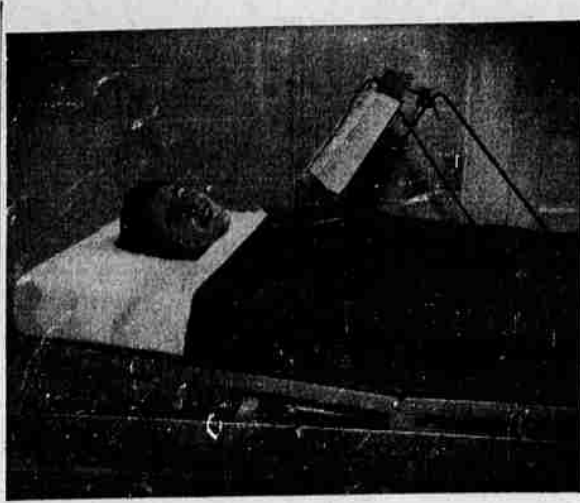
Today marks the end of an intensive month-long campaign over the nation to raise funds to fight poliomyelitis, infantile paralysis. Vaccines are being perfected, which, it is hoped, will mark the beginning of the end of the dread disease which has struck down thousands of boys and girls like Judy Bellows.

Judy, as all Douglas County knows, was a victim of the disease three years ago. Since that time she has spent all of her waking and sleeping hours in an iron lung, or more recently in a rocking bed, the mechanical contrivance that forces her weakened lungs to take in the necessary supply of air to keep them functioning.

On Friday Judy reached a milestone in her battle to regain her health. For the first time in three years, she spent an entire day-time day (14 hours, 8 a.m. to 10 p.m.), breathing on her own without assistance from either respirator or rocking bed.

Only as recently as last summer Judy needed 12 hours in the iron lung, six hours rocking on her bed, and could breathe freely only two or three hours at a stretch without suffering exhaustion.

Judy has been working with a therapist, Miss Dorothy Curtis, R.N., K.T., who has been treating her with the Sister Kenny method, using various exercises to enlarge lung capacity and strengthen chest muscles weakened by the disease.

Miss Curtis works with Judy about five or six hours a day, four of which are devoted to actual therapy. The rest of Judy's day is given to study and at present she stands at the top of her class. Recently she was named at the first of the honor roll.

One milestone passed, Judy is ready to try for the next. That of learning to sleep without her iron lung. "With her courage and patience," Miss Curtis says, "she will accomplish it. That is the secret of our wonderful success."

Alaskan Electronic Eye Keeps Ceaseless Vigil

AN EARLY WARNING RADAR STATION, Alaska Eye, is a weird, mountaintop site, where an electronic eye scans the skies in ceaseless vigil, may come the first alarm to the United States that enemy bombers are on the way.

Senators Oppose Ike On Formosa, Morse Declares

DENVER — A majority of senators were "privately opposed" to President Eisenhower's Formosa resolution, in the opinion of Sen. Wayne Morse (Ind-Ore). Morse, one of three senators who voted against the resolution, told a press conference here:

"The majority of senators unquestionably regretted the resolution that was before them and they had been about it privately, the majority would have said no."

Morse termed the resolution "a complete surrender to the preventive war theory of one Adm. Arthur Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff."

Morse attacked Chinese Nationalist leader Chiang Kai-shek, saying:

"I don't propose to risk 165 million American lives in a situation where Chiang's intrigue could create an explosion that would send the world to war. I don't trust him."

John Day Dam Funds Foreseen By Patterson

PORTLAND — Gov. Paul Patterson said on his arrival here Sunday from Washington, D.C., he believed funds for planning John Day Dam on the Columbia River would be available this spring.

The governor said he had discussed with White House and Bureau of the Budget officials a plan to use excess funds—not yet spent on other projects—for John Day planning. He said the administration probably will ask Congress to authorize this use of these funds.

He said the amount to be sought was not discussed.

Some \$500,000 for John Day planning is called for in the 1956 federal budget, which, if approved by Congress, would be available after July 1.

The governor also said he believed funds for the Talent Dam, located on the Southern Oregon river, would be added to the new budget as a supplementary item.

Former Polio Victim's Trek Raises \$20,000

SPOKANE — Winnie Lou Puls, a former polio victim, went back to high school at Reardan, Wash., Monday after raising \$20,000 for the March of Dimes with a 37-mile walk from Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.

Winnie Lou, 17, who recovered last fall from a mild attack of polio, moved faster at 10 cents a foot than the contributors and showed up Saturday afternoon. The goal was reached early Sunday morning.

When donations lagged Saturday, it was decided to have her come in and get a flag pole sifter. Edwar Schulte, age 70-foot tower atop a 12-story hotel building here. Schulte pledged to stay aloft until the \$20,000 was reached. He had to be treated for exposure.

Mother, Four Children Die In Burning Home

ROSSVILLE, Ga. — A 29-year-old mother and her four children perished early Monday in a fire which destroyed their three-room frame house in nearby Lakeview.

The husband and father, George G. Sledge, 32-year-old automobile mechanic, escaped but suffered burns while trying to rescue his family.

Dead are Mrs. Alta Wright Sledge, Roy Lee, 10; Larry Paul, 8; Brenda Fay, 6; and John Terry, three months.

Million-Dollar Blaze Guts Automobile Agency

BALTIMORE — A 12-alarm fire burned out of control for two hours here early Monday, gutting a four-story automobile agency just north of the city's downtown section.

More than 250 firemen and 70 pieces of equipment were called out to fight the blaze at the Martin Motor Corp. in the 1300 block Cathedral Street.

Thomas Martin, owner of the building, estimated damages would run more than a million dollars.
