A former Roseburg man, Lee

Thornton, died at Lakeview, Ore.,

Tuesday night. He was 76.

Thornton was born in Roseburg

Dec. 2, 1877, the first son of Mr.

and Mrs. S. I. Thornton. He at-

tended Roseburg schools and was

later graduated from Oregon State

College in pharmacy.

He was married to Kathleen Can-

field of McMinnville in 1903. In

1905, he and his wife moved to

Lakeview where Thornton entered

the drug business. They have lived

there ever since.

Thornton is survived by his wife,

Kathleen; a son, A. L. (Buck)

Thornton Jr., one grandson and a
